Tito Will Visit Moscow In Wake Of Big 3 Confab

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, (AP) — Belgrade Radio said Monday President Tito has accepted an invitation to visit Moscow.

The radio made the announcement shortly after a conclusion of a conference of the Big Three Western powers and Yugoslavia on international questions.

An official communique said the United States, Britain and France had reached a wide measure of agreement on international issues and stressed the need for a strong and independent Yugoslavia.

The communique, issued after three days of conferences on the ambassadorial level, pledged continued cooperation among the four nations.

It said the exchange of views confirmed "the wide measure of agreement among the four governments in their approach to the various international questions under review."

The communique did not specify the matters discussed at the conference. It concentrated on general terms of agreement without saying a word of any disagreement.

U. N. Charter Followed
It endorsed the method of negotiations based on "full respect for and recognition of the right of all nations to independence, equality, self-defense and collective security in conformity with the Charter of the U. N."

The communique said that the four governments will continue to do all in their power to promote such solutions.

Perhaps significantly, the communique did not mention the policy of "active coexistence" one of the favorite principles of Yugoslav foreign policy.

The four powers agreed that there is "a more favorable development in the international situation."

Inoculations Face Permanent Taboo In Idaho

BOISE (AP) — State Health Director L. J. Peterson said Monday there would be no more mass polio inoculations in Idaho.

"We believe very strongly we must go back to a physician-natant relationship," Peterson declared. "We would not sponsor another mass inoculation program."

Idaho has had 97 polio cases so far this year, compared to 17 in the first six months of 1954. The department has listed 54 of these as associated with the vaccination program. Seven persons have died.

Twenty children inoculated with Salk antipolio vaccine have contracted the disease.

The department has said that defective vaccine evidently was a cause of the outbreak. It had previously announced that the antipolio vaccination program was indefinitely suspended.

First shots of Salk vaccine were given to Idaho first and second grade children in April.

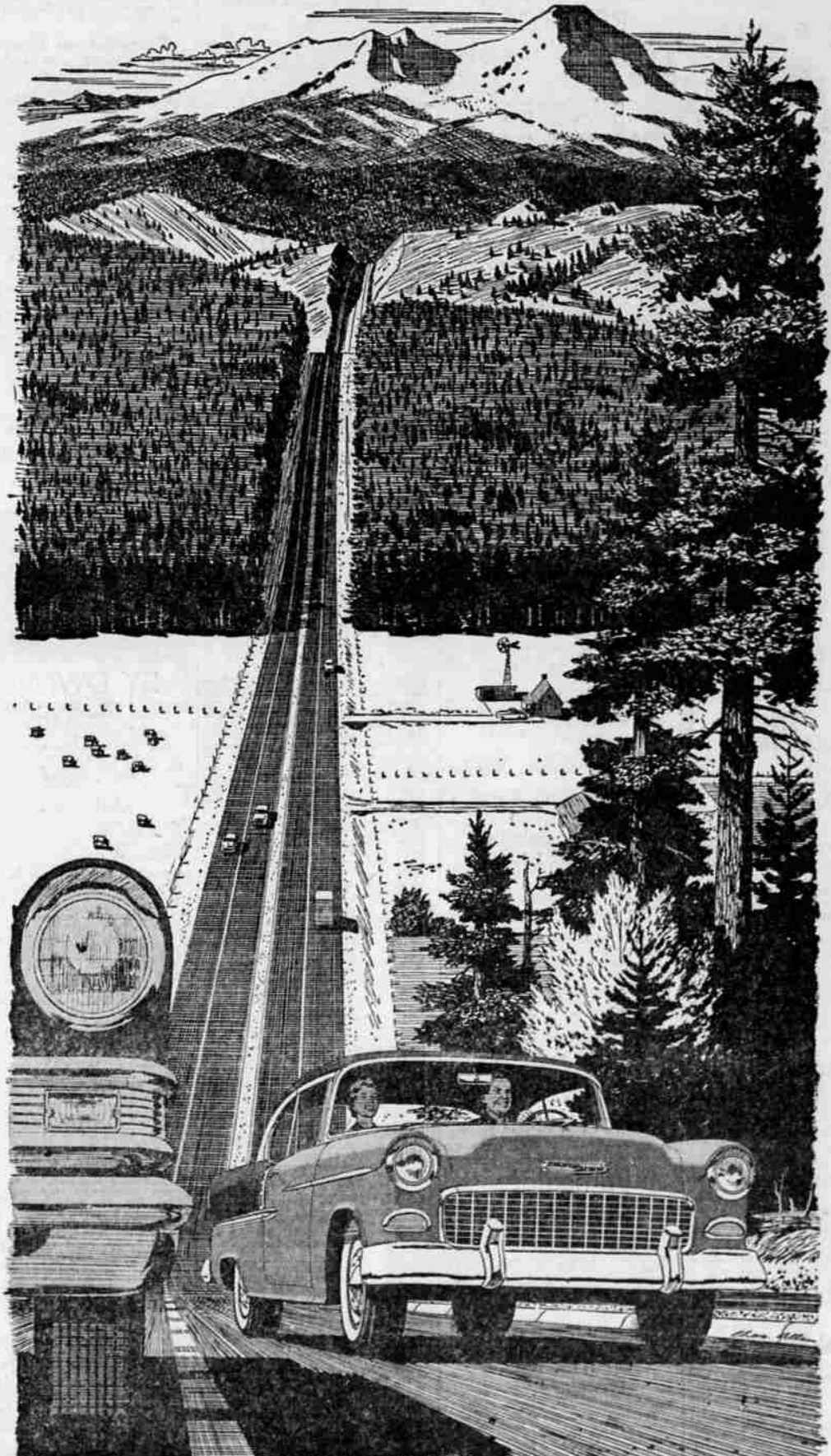
STRIKE SPREADS
