East Douglas Wool Pool Sells To Portland Man

The East Douglas Wool Pool Monday sold about 100,000 pounds

of wool to Jack Stanfield of Portland through his agent Steve Inda of Oakland, reports spokesman Lynn Beckley. He said the 53 cents a pound received was about three cents above the Roseburg price. The pool includes about 45 ranchers from Roseburg to the Glade area and southeast to Roberts Creek. Beckley said most of the sheep have been sheared and the wool contracted for is ready for delivery. It will be brought to Roseburg in a few days to be shipped to Portland.

Idaho Postpones Salk Polio Shots

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—The Idaho polio mass vaccination program—faced new delays today as state health authorities announced they had "lost confidence in the Salk vaccine." State Health Director L. J. Peterson told newsmen that Idaho "will not sponsor another mass inoculation program" because of new doubts about the effectiveness and safety of the vaccine.

He told newsmen he holds the vaccine—along with its manufacturing instructions—responsible for a polio outbreak which has killed seven Idahoans and hospitalized 79 others since the mass immunization program was started in April.

But he added that the department does not blame the Cutter Laboratories, of Berkeley, Calif., which produced the vaccine used

Personal Liberty In U.S. Declines, Executive Claims

PORTLAND (AP)—Paul Hoffman, chairman of the Studebaker-Packard Corp. board, lamented here this week what he said was a decline of personal freedom in America.

"We are faced with a newly evolved process of trial by innuendo or public accusation," he said. Hoffman, former administrator of the Marshall Plan and ECA, was sharply critical of "self-confessed ex-Communists." He said they can do irreparable damage to the reputation of innocent citizens.

Speaking at the opening session of the annual convention of the Advertising Association of the West here, Hoffman called on advertising men to have the courage to examine publicly such controversial issues as the entry of Red China into the United Nations.

Hoffman said the "free enterprise system" is the logical outgrowth of American principles of freedom. He told the advertising executives "we must portray to the world the true story of America and our nation's peaceful and constructive desires."

July Fourth Fireworks Display Being Readied

A \$1,100 fireworks show is being prepared for the Fourth of July at the fairgrounds, according to Warren A. Woodruff, in charge of a Junior Chamber of Commerce committee presenting the display.

About 40 ground pieces have been set up at the grounds by Jaycees and a fireworks supply man, Woodruff said, and 180 aerial shells will be part of the show.

The gates to the fairgrounds will open at 6:30 p.m. on the Fourth of July, Monday, and the display will start at dusk.

Cooperating to make the show possible are the Jaycees, Rotary Club, Lions Club, West Side Lions Club and the City of Roseburg. Woodruff said admission to the fairgrounds will be without charge, but a donation to help pay for the fireworks will be asked of the public.

A concessions stand will be set up by the Lions Club.

The reference was to Dr. Jonas Salk, developer of the antipolio vaccine.

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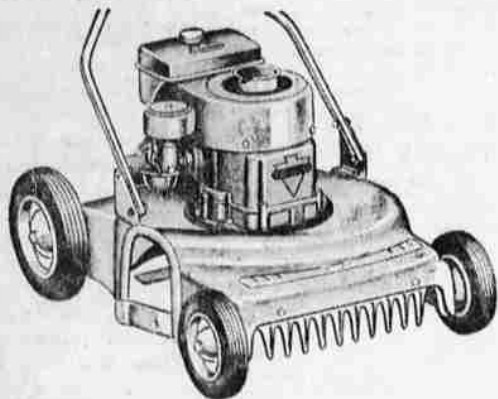
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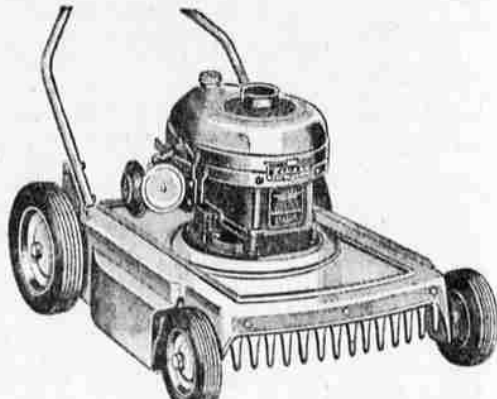

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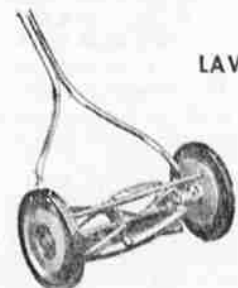
