Washington Fisheries Department Looking For New Spawning Areas For Salmon In Columbia, Snake

SEATTLE — Old Maw Salmon is a housekeeper with a built-in broom. She's neat and she's choosy. But in spite of her tidy tenancy she's about to be evicted from the middle Columbia, the lower Snake and some lesser rivers of the Northwest.

The Washington State Department of Fisheries Maw's best friend has looked into the situation and is trying to provide some no-rental housing in the suburbs. The Fisheries men call it "artificial spawning ground."

Part of Study

The project is part of a comprehensive study of the Columbia River system directed by Army's Corps of Engineers. This phase was farmed out to the Fisheries Department. A crew of 8 to 10 men has been on it for two years, piloted by Richard T. Pressey, assistant supervisor of research in charge of Corps projects.

Actually the Department was a thinking about Maw Salmon's problem previously and had made a study on its own hook up the North Fork of the Stillaguamish River, which is continuing. It learned that Maw is no sloppy housekeeper, but a pretty particular sort, too. Salmon pair off like quail and people; they don't set up harems.

When Paw and Maw go home-hunting they locate a spot where the water is 1 to 3 feet deep and flows steadily and where the river bed is nicely gravelled. Nesting spots also may be found in water 20 feet deep and more, but this is where springs bubble up from the river bottom through the gravel. Eggs and newborn salmon must obtain oxygen from flowing water.

Maw starts sweeping the place out. Fanning her tail (the built-in broom), she cleans the silt out of the gravel, scooping a hole in the river bed that may be 10 feet long, half that wide and from six inches to two feet deep, depending upon the species.

Dig Big Holes

"For a salmon," says Milo Bell, the Department's technical coordinator, "that's equivalent to a 6-foot hole dug by a human being."

As she moves she deposits eggs deep in the gravel of the porous nest. The male fertilize the egg and this story never has a lived-happily-ever-after ending. Maw and Paw die. But they have provided well for the orphans, who hatch in a couple of months and remain in the protective gravel for another month before swimming free.

And now we come to the problem. Dams backing up the water increase the depth and check the flow, cutting off the vital supply of oxygen.

"If all the dams now proposed are completed," says Bell, "there will be a slack water pool from Bonneville nearly to Chief Joseph Dam on the Columbia, and up the Snake from Pasco to Lewiston, Idaho."

Moore Nominated As No. 1 Heavyweight Fistic Threat

NEW YORK — A flurry of knockouts in important fights during the past month brought in a new champion, three fresh top contenders, and resulted in a reshuffling of several divisions by Ring Magazine Wednesday.

Light heavyweight champion Archie Moore's third round kayo of middleweight king Carl (Bobo) Olson earned the 38-year-old veteran "The Fighter of the Month" award and solidified his already strong position as the No. 1 heavyweight contender.

Carmen Basilio of Canastota, N. Y., dethroned Boston's Tony DeMarco as welterweight champion with a 12th round TKO. The chunky

Bostonian took over the top contender's berth vacated by Basilio.

France's Ray Fenech became the No. 1 contender among the featherweights because of Percy Bassett's retirement and Italy's Mario d'Agata moved into the top contender position among the bantamweights.

d'Agata was promoted when Mexico's Raton Macias, NBA-recognized bantamweight king, was stopped in three rounds by Billy Peacock of Los Angeles in an over-weight scrap. This helped the position of France's Robert Cohen who is recognized as world champion by most boxing groups. Macias fell to fourth among the elite.

In the heavyweight division, Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson of New York, with six straight victories, moved into the fourth berth, dropping Cuba's Nino Valdes to fifth. Moore is first, followed by Bob Baker of Pittsburgh and England's Don Cockell.

State Baseball Tourney Scheduled At Seaside

WICHITA, Kan. — The 1955 Oregon state championship tournament of the National Baseball Congress will open at Seaside July 25.

The congress announced a definite starting date Tuesday. Earlier it had been tentatively scheduled July 5. The Oregon winner will go to the national tournament opening August 19 in Wichita.
