Yoncalla Ready For Rodeo

Congress Sends President Big Defense Request

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress Thursday sent President Eisenhower the year's biggest money bill — nearly 32 billion dollars for the armed forces — without debate and by voice vote.

The House acted first. Immediately afterward the Senate also adopted the conference agreement on the bill.

President Eisenhower is expected to quickly sign the measure financing defense forces for the fiscal year starting Friday.

The final package earmarks \$7,329,556,000 for the Army, \$9,118,179,556 for the Navy and \$14,739,763,170 for the Air Force, including an extra 356 million dollars tacked on at Secretary of Defense Wilson's request to speed the output of B-57 jet bombers.

That, plus \$694,920,000 for the Defense Department and inter-service activities comes to \$31,882,515,726 — about 350 million less than what President Eisenhower asked.

But the legislators threw in an extra 46 million dollars to countermand Eisenhower's planned 22,000-man cutback in Marine Corps strength.

Staff Attorney Joins Protesters Of Dam Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Federal Power Commission staff attorney has joined lawyers for the Idaho Power Co. and public power groups in criticizing an examiner's decision in the Hells Canyon case.

The lawyer, John C. Mason, Wednesday filed with FPC exceptions to examiner William J. Costello's recommendation that Idaho Power be permitted to build only one dam in the Hells Canyon reach of the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon.

Costello's initial decision, which has been appealed to the FPC, would give Idaho Power a construction license for Brownlee Dam, upstream from the site of the proposed federal Hells Canyon Dam. Idaho Power seeks to license three dams.

Mason recommends that they be licensed. He took issue with Costello's statement that the federal dam would be superior to the company's 3-dam plan for comprehensive development of the Snake River, a Columbia tributary.

Mason said the federal and 3-dam plans appear to be about equally suitable for development of the river and declared Idaho Power's projects could be built in a few years to meet expanding power requirements in the Pacific Northwest, without cost to the federal government.

He said also there's no basis for Costello's contention that Idaho Power would be unable to sell power from its proposed Oxbow and low Hells Canyon projects. The market already exists, Mason contended.

In other briefs filed Wednesday, the public power groups urged the FPC to reserve Hells Canyon for the federal project and Idaho Power argued all three of its dams should be approved.

The FPC will consider all the arguments in reaching its own finding, expected some time this year.

Meanwhile, it was reported that contestants in the rodeo, which is scheduled the afternoons of July 3 and 4, must be entered for both days by 9 a.m. Sunday.

As in the past, the parade is scheduled July 4 at 10 a.m. Also on the agenda are buckaroo breakfasts the mornings of July 3 and 4 from 6 to 11 a.m. It will be served at the Yoncalla Lions Club booth.

For the rodeo itself, a free-for-all horse race has been added to the list of events, which also includes the men's cowhorse race. Crowning of Queen Pat St. Dennis is scheduled in the arena after the grand entry July 3.

The Lions Club has charge of general admission tickets. The rodeo is sponsored annually by the Yoncalla Saddle Club.

Roseburg Police Warn Of Unlicensed Solicitors

Roseburg police today warned that a company claiming to sell music lessons in the city is operating without first having obtained sales licenses for its solicitors.

The warning came after a 48-year-old Portland man, Glenn V. Howard, was arrested for having no solicitor's license Wednesday afternoon. He was freed after his company, the American School of Music Co., posted \$150 bail.

Police said the salesmen were using the names of Roseburg people as references. Several of the local people, when contacted, denied knowledge of the company, it is revealed.

An investigating officer said he believed there were about five salesmen operating in and around the city.

Nehru In Yugoslavia, Returning Tito's Visit

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru arrived by plane Thursday for a seven-day visit to Communist Yugoslavia. The green, white and gold flag of India flew over Belgrade in his honor.

Nehru is returning a visit which President Tito paid New Delhi last winter. The Indian leader is on a tour which has already taken him behind the Iron Curtain to large parts of the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia and Poland. In Vienna he presided at a meeting of Indian ambassadors to various European nations.

Power Stand Dominates Hoover Report

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Hoover Commission wrapped up its two-year job today embroiled in controversy, but claiming its reorganization plans, if adopted, would balance the budget and permit tax cuts.

Former President Herbert Hoover, its chairman, issued a 19th and "final" report — it isn't quite final because another will be along in mid-July — and prepared to withdraw from public life at age 80.

The group's final formal name is the Commission on Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government — is due to go out of existence at midnight.

The power issue caused the commission to expire in a blaze of conflict. A Hoover report on "water resources and power" issued yesterday urged a drastic curtailment of federal power development and larger scope for private utilities.

It drew sharp dissents from 4 of the 12 members, including both Atty. Gen. Brownell and Defense Mobilizer Arthur S. Flemming.

James A. Farley, former postmaster general in the Roosevelt administration, charged that the report came "dangerously close" to inviting the government to "abdicate" its responsibilities in development of the nation's resources.

Rep. Holtfield (D-Calif.) wrote 84 pages of stinging dissent and promised to press his attack on the floor of the House.

Holtfield charged that a 1,800-page report of the commission's task force on power — which he said cost the taxpayers \$430,000 — was withheld "deliberately" from public distribution at this time, but is destined, he said, to become.

Paul Cacy Gets Supervisory Post At Post Office

Due to the growth of Roseburg postal service, the Post Office Dept. has created a fourth supervisory position at the local office, according to Postmaster Clyde W. Carstensen.

Paul E. Cacy, a regular clerk, has been promoted to the position, that of clerk-in-charge. Other supervisors are the assistant postmaster, superintendent of mails and foreman.

Cacy, a Navy veteran of World War II, resides at 38 N. Jackson St., with his wife and two children. He entered the postal service on Nov. 13, 1945.

He is also vice president of the Roseburg Chapter of SPEBSQSA (barber shop singers), and has been active in promoting the annual Parade of Barber Shop Quartets held in Roseburg.

Cacy's appointment to the new postal position is effective July 1.

Complaint Against CIO Recommended Dismissed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Dismissal of a complaint against CIO Woodworkers for refusing to handle logs from what they considered an unfair operation, was recommended Wednesday by a National Labor Relations Board trial examiner.

Howard Myers, the examiner, said that the union employees of the Long-Bell Bridge mill at Redwood had refused to handle logs from the Fitch Bros. Logging Co.

But Myers said that Long-Bell had not tried to force its employees to handle the logs and that this, along with other facts in the case, indicated no violation of the National Labor Relations Act. On this basis he recommended dismissal of the complaint.

Canadian's Take-Home Pay To Be Increased

OTTAWA, Ont. (AP) — Canada's 3,800,000 taxpayers get a little more take-home pay starting Friday when a federal tax cut on personal incomes goes into operation.

The cut is small, roughly 10 percent this year since only six months remain. But it is the government's third successive year of snipping levies in this field and reduces tax payments by income earners to the lowest since 1950.

Federal authorities say it will keep Canadian taxes well below those paid in the United States.

Herman Elroy Acree, 24, Pleads Innocent In Court

Herman Elroy Acree, 24, Springfield, pleaded innocent in circuit court Thursday to a charge of larceny of property worth more than \$75.

Acree, indicted by the grand jury June 17, delayed his plea when arraigned before Judge Carl E. Wimberly Tuesday. Thursday, the judge said Acree's trial would be set down for sometime in September.

The defendant is accused of stealing a car on April 15.

Fourth Airman Lost In Search Over Pacific

TOKYO (AP) — The search for four Marine airmen down in the Pacific went into its fifth day as dawn broke on closed in again Thursday night.

An Air Force spokesman said a voice signal — so weak it was impossible to determine just what was said — was heard about 4:30 p.m. He said that was the last and only report the Air Force has had since 5:40 a.m.

"It just wasn't audible enough to make out," said Maj. William James, deputy public information officer for Far East Air Forces. The Navy said it had no information of other radio contacts during the day.

"Darkness once again turned the search into a blind game of dropping flares and listening for radio signals that did not come."

The missing airmen are: Capt. Hodgins P. Montague, Jackson, Miss., pilot of a Marine Sky Knight jet which ran out of gas while lost in fog Sunday.

Second Lt. David Winton Bell, of Wayzata, Minn., his ordnance officer.

Lt. Alan Murdoch McAneny Jr., of Yonkers, N. Y., whose Marine Fury jet vanished Tuesday night in the search.

A still unidentified crewman of a Marine helicopter which crashed at sea in the search yesterday. Three fellow crewmen were rescued.

Green Teacher Suffers Auto Accident Injuries

A Green fourth grade teacher, Mrs. Adeline Adams, 43, Roseburg, was reported in good condition at the Newport Hospital, Newport, Thursday. Mrs. Adams was injured in an auto accident Tuesday afternoon on the coast highway, three miles south of Waldport. She received a spiral-fractured left leg, relatives said.

With her was her husband, Robert Adams, son John, daughter, Sally, Roseburg, and niece, Roberta Jo Nichols, Waldport. John received a fractured skull and a badly sprained ankle. Others were not injured.

Adams and John are staying with relatives in Waldport and Sally is at home in Roseburg. Mrs. Adams will be in the Newport Hospital for two weeks, it is estimated.

Revision Of County Budget Centers Around Request For County School Aide

Final figures in the slightly-revised 1955-56 Douglas County Budget will be ready in a few days, according to Judge Carl C. Hill.

A public hearing held Wednesday in the County Court offices in Roseburg disclosed only minor changes from the budget published earlier.

Judge Hill said the final figure needed by taxation would still fall under the 6 per cent limitation. The tax base for the budget has been estimated at \$534,183.49. This includes a 6 per cent increase of \$29,670.76 over the 1954-55 figure of \$494,512.73. The total county budget is \$4,728,228.19.

Major discussion at the hearing centered around the suggested increase of \$4,800 for hiring of a field deputy in the county school superintendent's office. Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg quoted figures to back his request for additional help.

He told the county court and the few citizens present that school age children in the county had increased from 13,688 in 1949 to a possible 15,000 for 1954-55, while the teaching staff has increased from 402 to 735.

He said his department is unable to adequately handle the necessary school visits in the county and said addition of a deputy would only keep services at a minimum. His request was originally approved by the budget board but later eliminated by the county court. At a recent meeting of the Douglas County Taxpayers' League, members requested the sum be put back in the budget.

They made a similar request at the Wednesday hearing, voting 5-2 in favor of it. Judge Hill said the requests would be carefully considered.

League member Arthur Marsh said he believed the deputy would.

Wounded Youth's Condition Fair, Hospital Reports

A 19-year-old Visalia, Calif., youth, shot during a fracas at Drain last Sunday morning, was reported in "fairly good" condition at Eugene's Sacred Heart Hospital today.

James L. Ketcherside was seriously wounded by a .22 rifle bullet which hit him near one hip and disintegrated in the intestines. He underwent surgery Monday.

Charles B. Cain, 23, Drain, who allegedly fired the shot that wounded Ketcherside, was released from jail on \$5,000 property bond Wednesday. He appeared in district court with his attorney, and waived his right to a preliminary hearing on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

The shooting occurred after an argument, on Highway 99 near a railroad crossing at the south edge of Drain, between two cars of youths. Cain was with Robert O. Farley, 23, and Colin B. Spencer, 30, both of Drain. With Ketcherside on a vacation trip to California were Raymond C. Brown, 18, Tacoma, and Wayne A. Wilson, 16, Sylvan, Wash., according to Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

2 Children Killed In Auto Accidents

Two children were killed in separate traffic accidents in Oregon Wednesday.

Gilda Conner, 6, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert L. Conner, Hillsboro, died in a three-car smashup 16 miles east of Seaside on the Sunset Highway.

Her parents, another daughter, Sharon, 15, and Frank Probst, 67, Jewell, driver of one of the other cars, were taken to a hospital for treatment.

State police said the Conner car rammed the rear of a car driven by Mrs. James Bray, 23, Portland, then glanced off and crashed head-on into the car driven by Probst.

Ronny Searls, 2, was crushed under the wheels of a logging truck after falling out of a car driven by his mother.

The mother, Mrs. Ray O. Searls, Kelso, Ore., east of Gresham, said the child was riding in the rear seat and that the wind apparently blew the car door open.

The boy's father is with the Air Force at Okinawa and had never seen the child.

Greater Self-Rule Voted By French For Tunisia

PARIS (AP) — Agreements to give Tunisia greater self-rule were approved Thursday by the National Assembly's Foreign Affairs Committee. The vote was 20-5, with 3 abstentions.

Under pressure from Premier Faure, the full Assembly is expected to ratify the agreements next week.

Tunisia is one of France's North African protectorates where nationalist demands for independence have flared into open rebellion in recent months. Morocco is another. Uprisings also have developed in Algeria technically a part of the French homeland.

A French parliamentary mission Wednesday night denounced government policies in Algeria and called for immediate changes to avoid "another Indochina."

Jewell has worked in Roseburg periodically for the past two years as a representative for Martin Bros. Co. He has been with the company for about three and one half years. Before that he lived in Salem 13 years.

He is married and has three children. He is also a new member of the Executive Club of Roseburg.

You'll Have To Pay Extra To See Las Vegas Shows
LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — The big-name shows at Las Vegas resort hotels aren't going to be available any longer for the price of a soft drink. Effective Saturday night there will be a \$2 minimum in most casinos. Owners said receipts were too low on second shows, when crowds of soft-drink-buying teen-agers often crowd into the casinos.

Times Reporter Acknowledges Red Activities

WASHINGTON (AP) — Charles Grutzner, a New York Times reporter, acknowledged to investigating senators Thursday that he was a Communist in the 1930s.

One of the committeemen told him an Air Force general had requested he be removed from the Korean War theater for filing a story disclosing F86 Sabre Jets had gone into action.

Grutzner, testifying before the Senate internal security subcommittee, said he never heard of this before and said that his story had been cleared by the Pentagon in Washington before it was published by the Times.

In telling of one time Communist membership, Grutzner said he quit the party in 1940 in a "clean break" having become satisfied in his own mind that it was not run on "Democratic principles."

Grutzner said he wasn't a dedicated party member, that "I could take it or leave it — and I left it when I got fed up."

Sen. Eastland (D-Miss.), the subcommittee chairman, said a request that Grutzner be removed from the Korean theater was made on Dec. 19, 1950, by Maj. Gen. L. C. Craigie.

Eastland said, however, he was not stating that Grutzner had been ordered out of Korea.

Grutzner denied that he was removed as a correspondent from the Korean theater. He said another reporter was on the way to replace him before he filed the story about the Sabrejets.

Eastland asked Grutzner if he knew Gen. Craigie had stated his story would cost American lives.

"No," replied Grutzner. "I had noticed that 'this public disclosure' about the use of the Sabrejets had lost the U. S. Air Force a tactical advantage over the enemy."

"I challenge that statement," Grutzner said hotly. "It's not a fact."

Grutzner followed Victor Weingarten, a one-time fellow worker on the Brooklyn Eagle, to the witness chair in the second day of the Senate internal security subcommittee's investigation into Red influences in the press.

Weingarten, who identified himself as a self-employed publicity man in Pleasantville, N. Y., swore he hadn't been a Communist since the November election in 1940, but refused to tell the committee whether he had known any of his former associates to be party members since that time.

Weingarten persisted in his refusal to discuss others although threatened with a citation for contempt.

Grutzner said he was recruited into the party in 1937 by a fellow Brooklyn Eagle worker named Nat Einhorn.

Highway Project Bids Are Opened

PORTLAND (AP) — Major construction bids in Oregon's highway program were opened Thursday with low offers totaling two million dollars.

About the same total is expected on more work on which bids will be opened Friday.

Among the major work up for bid Thursday were two Pacific Highway jobs — grading 3.14 miles of the new four-lane section north of Grants Pass — and paving 6.43 miles between Cottage Grove and Divide. The former had a low offer of \$278,899 and the latter one of \$489,533.

Even greater in amount was the low bid of \$596,233 for building to four lanes 4.69 miles of the Tualatin Valley highway west of Beaverton. This carries heavy traffic from the Forest Grove-Hillsboro area into Portland.

The apparent low bids included: Jackson and Douglas — Seal 56.5 miles of pavement on Pacific, Crater Lake and West Diamond Lake Highways, D-H Paving Co., Vancouver, Wash., \$63,770.

Josephine — Grade 3.14 miles of Louse Creek-Grants Pass section of Pacific Highway, north from Grants Pass, C. R. O'Neil, Creswell, \$278,899.

Lane — Pave 6.46 miles of Cottage Grove-Divide unit of Goshen-Divide section of Pacific Highway, south from Cottage Grove, Parker-Seram Co., Portland, \$489,533.

Logger Killed

EUGENE (AP) — Robert Crabb, 19-year-old Greenleaf logger, was killed Tuesday when a log rolled down a hill on which he was working and crushed him.

Crabb, a rigging slinger working near Swishome, was attempting to attach a cable to a log on a hillside when another log became dislodged and rolled down the hill onto him. Deputy Coroner E. A. Davidson reported.

Hopes Expressed Settlement May Still Be Made

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The steel industry moved Thursday toward an economy-crushing midnight strike as negotiators maintained tight secrecy on final peace efforts.

David J. McDonald, president of the strike-threatening CIO Steel Workers Union, was closeted at mid-day with John A. Stephens, principal bargainer for U.S. Steel Corp.

Stephens had hinted that "Big Steel" was preparing a new money offer, but he apparently was holding it back as a trump card.

McDonald already has rejected an average 10-cent an hour pay raise proposal for the union's 600,000 members in the basic steel industry. They now average \$2.33 per hour.

On the New York Stock Exchange, steel shares were active and higher, apparently on the assumption a strike would be averted. Up around \$1 a share in mid-afternoon were U.S. Steel, Bethlehem and Republic.

Major steel mills were gradually being shut down. They began well in advance of the strike deadline, cooling off furnaces and draining them of hot metal. Some workers already were reported off the job due to the gradual curtailment.

It appeared any showdown might be delayed until only a few hours before midnight. Industry strategy seemed aimed at delaying its final peace bid until the last minute to give the union a yes-no decision.

2 Roseburg Men Buy Bates Candy Co. Plant Here

Two Roseburg men have bought the local Bates Candy Co. plant and Douglas County operating area of the company.

They are L. C. Latham and Oscar Revell. Latham will manage the new company. Revell will take no active part in the operation.

Latham was manager of the Roseburg operation of Bates Candy Co. for nine years before he was boosted to the general management position this year of the company's entire southern Oregon area, which includes five plants.

He returned to Douglas County this month with his wife to buy the Roseburg plant at 704 Winchester St. The new local company has been re-named Latham Wholesale Distributors. Latham said the operation would continue with the same personnel.

His wife will also return to a job she held before. She will be in charge of the office.

The Bates company had operated in Douglas County nine years. Latham had worked with the company in Roseburg since it established its plant here.

He stressed the operation would be locally owned and operated.
