

Hungry Man Said More Interested In A Sandwich

SEATTLE (AP)—“A hungry man is more interested in a sandwich than in the four freedoms.”

With those words, the United States ambassador to the United Nations, Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., this week underlined the value of the U. N.'s technical assistance program to underdeveloped countries.

Speaking at the University of Washington, Lodge praised the technical assistance program of the U. N. and pointed out that the United States total contribution to the U. N. amounted only to 13 million dollars annually, “about half what it costs to keep the streets of New York City clean.”

Lodge, in a speech delivered under the auspices of the Seattle chapter of the American Assn. for the United Nations and the U. N. Institute of International Affairs, said:

1. The successes of the U. N. have outweighed the disappointments since the world organization was formed 10 years ago.

2. The U. N. should remain a recommendatory and persuasive body; it should not be turned into a world government.

3. The U. N. “has not found a cure to the scourge of war,” but it has prevented small conflicts from erupting into big wars.

Lodge left Tuesday for Washington, D. C. He arrived here Sunday night from San Francisco, where he attended the U. N.'s 10th anniversary commemoration.

Highway Travel Delays Reported

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Highway Commission announced this week that the following highways are not in normal condition:

Columbia River Highway—The Du'les Dam to Rufus, 24 miles of oil detours; between 2 and 4.5 miles West of Pendleton, occasional minor delays and one-way traffic during the day.

The Dalles California Highway—Sherman to Willowdale, oil detours.

Pacific Highway—For 4 miles north of Myrtle Creek, possible minor delay; 3 miles south of Yoncalla, possible minor delays.

Coast Highway—For 3 miles north of Otter Rock, minor delay and dusty; Gardiner north, minor delays; Clear Lake to El Lake, 2.45 miles of detour on old pavement; between 2 and 14 miles south of Port Orford, possible minor delays.

Umpqua Highway—For 4.5 miles west of Reedsport, reduced speed, rough; near Koepke Slough, possible slight delays.

Willamette Highway—Between 1 and 7 miles west of Oakridge minor delay.

Crater Lake Park—All roads are open except the rim road between East and South entrances.

Internal Security Probers Of Subversive Organizations Recommend Changes In List

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate internal security subcommittee said this week the attorney general's list of subversive organizations is “widely misunderstood and misapplied” and needs to be put in “proper perspective.”

Past or present membership in such organizations has been used to bar persons from jobs in government or private industry and to pin a Communist or Fascist label on them.

The subcommittee urged that the attorney general publish, as promptly as possible, a handbook giving additional information about each of the organizations so that membership in them can be evaluated “intelligently” for security purposes.

In another far-reaching recommendation, it proposed that persons turn down for jobs with the government or with government contractors because of unavaluated derogatory information be given an opportunity for a hearing.

At present hearing procedures are provided for job-holders but not for job-seekers.

The subcommittee's recommendations were set out in a report which also called for faster action by the Justice Department in bringing Communist-front groups and Communist-infiltrated labor unions before the Subversive Activities Control Board.

The board's job is to determine, after hearings, whether such organizations are in fact Communist-controlled.

The subcommittee's report was filed with the Senate Judiciary Committee, its parent body. Sen. Eastland (D-Miss) is chairman of the nine-member subcommittee.

Sen. Jenner (R-Ind) is the senior GOP member. The report was based in part on an unannounced, closed meeting May 3 with representatives of the Justice Department and two members of the SACB, Thomas J. Herbert, chairman, and former Sen. Harry P. Cain (R-Wash).

Recreation Uses Vs. Power Needs Hearing Issues

EUGENE (AP)—Recreational uses of the Beaver Marsh area on the upper McKenzie River will be weighed against a \$2.1 million hydroelectric power values by the Federal Power Commission.

This, said Joseph E. Hayden, FCC counsel, this week, is likely to be the central point in determining whether to approve an application by the Eugene Water and Electric Board for a permit to build three low level dams, a 7 million dollar proposal.

The city's position in opening arguments was that scenic beauty will not be harmed and that recreational uses will be increased. Outdoors groups, however, challenged this and added that needed hydroelectric power could be bought from the Bonneville Power Administration at about the same cost.

The hearing was expected to run through Wednesday.

Taft-Hartley Strike Damage Award Settled

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union has settled a Taft-Hartley strike damage award to an Alaska company with a \$250,000 wage-hour law settlement won from Hawaii sugar companies.

An ILWU attorney this week handed over the union's \$250,000 check. The Juneau Spruce Co. of Alaska accepted that as settlement of an original \$750,000 award in a 1948 jurisdictional strike damage suit. Interest had run the amount due to more than a million dollars.

In return, the Juneau firm's attorney handed over papers releasing ILWU bank accounts, frozen by federal court order.

Committee To Evaluate Employees' Suggestions

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Patterson appointed this week the members of the committee to weigh suggestions by state employees on how to improve efficiency of state departments.

The Legislature authorized the committee and provided money to pay for good suggestions.

The governor appointed Warner H. Nunn, assistant public utilities commissioner, as secretary of the committee.

Others are William F. Gaarenstroom, head of the services division of the State Finance Dept., G. S. Paxson, bridge engineer for the Highway Commission; and Melvin Cleveland, assistant civil service director.

The governor also made appointments including: Paulsen Kaseberg, Wasco, reappointed to the Oregon Wheat Commission.

Jack Sather, Clatskanie, and William Cooper, Union, appointed to the State Soil Conservation Committee.
