

Dammasch Files Appeal On Ban Of Double Work

SALEM — Dr. F. H. Dammasch, Portland legislator, filed notice of appeal to the State Supreme Court Tuesday against a decision by Marion County Circuit Judge Val D. Sloper banning legislators from working in other agencies of the state government.

Dr. Dammasch had filed a suit asking for a declaratory judgment when the Legislature opened last January, and it is this ruling by Sloper now being appealed. Dammasch had been employed on a fee basis by the State Industrial

Accident Commission to hear claims cases.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton ruled at the beginning of the Legislature that state lawmakers could not serve in two branches of the government. Judge Sloper held that the Oregon Constitution prohibits persons performing duties in more than one division of state government.

Senate Committee Votes Power Line Extension Funds

WASHINGTON — A Senate appropriations subcommittee Tuesday voted to give President Eisenhower the 6½ million dollars he asked for a connecting line between the TVA and the Dixon-Yates power plant.

This was confirmed by several senators on the group, although Chairman Ellender (D-La.) declined to make any official announcement.

The vote was a substantial victory for the administration. Several Democratic senators, including supporters of the Tennessee Valley Authority, have been waging a battle to knock out the money.

Ellender said the full Appropriations Committee will act on the matter this Friday. TVA supporters have conceded privately they have less chance there than they had in the subcommittee.

The 6½ million is to connect the TVA system with the Dixon-Yates plant which is to be built at West Memphis, Ark., across the Mississippi from Memphis, Tenn.

The 107 million dollar Dixon-Yates plant, strongly backed by the Eisenhower administration, is to feed power into the TVA system to replace electricity used elsewhere by the Atomic Energy Commission.

Govt. Ends Evidence Against Harry Bridges

SAN FRANCISCO — The government rested its case Monday in the civil trial in which it is trying to strip Harry Bridges of U.S. citizenship and pave the way for his deportation to his native Australia.

Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman, hearing the case without a jury, ordered a recess until Monday, July 11.

The government charges the head of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union (Ind.) lied in 1945 when he swore he never had been a member of the Communist Party.

Defense Atty. Richard Gladstein told Judge Goodman he would move to dismiss the action when the trial resumes.

The government called eight witnesses, including Bridges. The defense said it will have about 25 witnesses.

Government Aid Sought For Columbia Bridge

WASHINGTON — The federal government should pay half the cost of raising and improving the present bridge across the Columbia River between Vancouver, Wash., and Portland, Ore., two Pacific Northwest congressmen said Tuesday.

Reps. Green (D-Ore.) and Mack (R-Wash.) disclosed they have asked Army Engineers to make such a recommendation.

The cost of the work, they estimated, would be \$230,000 and they said they would introduce legislation if needed.

Increased navigation because of the government's dam building program make it necessary to raise the bridge, they explained.

Dockers Continue Strike In Britain

LONDON — Waterfront strikers voted this week to continue their six-week docks walkout "to the bitter end."

The action was taken at a London mass meeting after strikers from northern ports put picket lines at the major piers here.

The dockers' strike of 15,500 workers in Britain has tied up nearly 200 ships and millions of dollars in vital exports and imports.

For a few days it appeared the strike might be settled. London dockers voted to return if the northern strikers agreed. But several hundred northern men drove down to London during the night and established picket lines at the piers.

Some of the 7,000 men on strike in London returned to work, but only in trickles.

One bright spot in the British labor picture was the weekend settlement of the 27-day-old unofficial seamen's strike in Liverpool and Southampton. It had cost the shipping companies more than 5½ million dollars and inconvenienced more than 15,000 transatlantic passengers at the height of the tourist season.
