Carole Jo Golfs Way Into Semis

PORTLAND — Defending champion Bruce Cudd and underdog Dick Stearns led the field Thursday in the quarterfinal round of the Oregon Golf Assn. championships.

Cudd was carried to the 19th hole before he defeated Dr. Leonard Holmes, a Portland dentist, in Wednesday's round. Stearns, a 24-year-old Air Force lieutenant, went 21 holes before downing Bob McReynolds, twice a runnerup in the OGA.

Favorites advanced to the semifinals in the women's tourney.

Carole Jo Kabler, 17-year-old, junior champion from Sutherlin, beat Barbara Snook, Portland 3 and 2; Mrs. Harry Stepp, Portland, defeated Mrs. Charles Duffy, Portland, 2 and 1; defending champion Mrs. Francis Rowell ousted Mrs. Rose Montgomery, 4 and 2, and Mrs. Dick Grubbs, Portland, 2 and 1.

Also in the championship flight, Leighton Tuttle of Eugene defeated Ray Isaacs of Portland, 1 up.

Californians Ahead In B. C. Golf Meet

VANCOUVER, B. C. — Two Californians, a stroke apart, Thursday led a field of 39 par-crackers and 53 other golfers into the second round of the \$15,000 British Columbia Open here.

Calling the pace was 29-year-old Bob Rosburg of San Francisco who finished the par-72 Shaughnessy course with 34-51-65.

Right behind him, having taken one more stroke on the back nine for a 66 total, was Laguna Beach, Calif., player Jimmy Clark.

Tommy Bolt of Houston, Tex., smiled affably at the growing gallery after his first-half 33, four strokes better than par and best on the day, and finished strategically in a three-way tie for third place at 67.

The other 67s were big Dow Finsterwald of Athens, Ohio, and Marty Furgol, No. 3 golf tournament winner last year, from Leamont, Ill.

Bunched in behind at 68 were Boris, the 1952 U. S. Open champ who didn't bother to play a practice round here, cool Bo Wingard of Oklahoma City, Okla., and bulky Mike Souchak of Durham, N. C.

Souchak drew nearly as big a gallery from the 3,000 paying spectators as Sam Snead, who managed a one-under 71.

The Rogue Basin has been improving for trout with the best spots in the Union Creek area and on the upper Rogue. The Gold Hill to Grants Pass section has been fair and improving for evening fly fishing. Fish Lake in Jackson County has been consistently producing both large and small rainbows. Trout angling along the North Umpqua continues good, especially in the fly area. Above Steamboat the road is rough and closed some weekdays. The South Umpqua has been fair above Days Creek. Although few summer steelhead have been taken, water conditions are improving.

Roseburg's Umpqua Post American Junior Legion baseball team clinched at least a tie for the district 3 legion championship Wednesday, with a 7-0 win behind Dick Smith's two-hit pitching at Springfield.

The Roseburg team combined Smith's mound effectiveness, which included 12 strikeouts over the seven-inning route, with heavy clubbing at the plate that included five extra base hits.

Outfielder Bill Oeding led the base hit barrage by the local forces with three doubles in as many official trips to the plate and two batters in. Oeding scored twice himself.

Hargis, Rudzik Triple

Roseburg also got two triples in the runmaking when Freddy Hargis hit for three bases in the third inning to drive in one run and Billy Rudzik drove a three-bagger over the left fielder's head to drive in Oeding in the seventh frame.

The locals tallied twice in the third inning, three more in the fifth and an additional pair in the seventh.

Springfield's deepest penetration off Smith came in the fifth inning when a runner reached third base after singling. No other Springfield runner got as far through the contest.

Springfield Man Hits

Lindell got Springfield's only clean base hit, hitting past third base to open the fifth frame. He got to second on Oeding's outfield error and advanced to third on an infield out following Smith's strikeout of Brown. A flyout to left field ended the side, however, and ended the threat.

In the fourth inning, Nixon got the losers' only other hit, a scratch hit in the infield. The only other batter to reach base off Smith came on a walk.

The home team used three batters in an attempt to subdue Roseburg's batting power. The three were touched for seven walks in addition to eight hits.

Roseburg Scores Two

Roseburg opened scoring with two in the third panel as Smith opened by walking and stealing second. Hargis then tripled to left center to score Smith and Oeding doubled to right center to bring Hargis in.

In the fifth, Oeding opened with a walk and the locals went on to register three times.

Rudzik followed Oeding by getting on an error and Jerry Broscher walked to fill the base. Oeding scored the game's third run as Allen Lindbloom bounced out for the second out and then Ron Beamer hit to right field to score another pair.

In the seventh inning, Oeding again led off by getting on base, this time with a two-bagger down the right field line. Rudzik then tripled over the left fielder's head to score Oeding and then scored himself on Lindbloom's flyout to left field.

Cottage Grove On Top

In racking up his third Legion win of the campaign, Smith twice retired the side on three strikeouts, once in the second inning and again in the sixth.

Roseburg meets Cottage Grove there Sunday at 5:30 in the final league game of the season. A win would clinch the title for the locals.

In the day's second legion district 3 game, Eugene defeated Cottage Grove to stay in the running for the title.

NEW YORK — Rocky Marciano was expected to agree today or perhaps tomorrow to place his heavyweight boxing crown on the line against Archie Moore in September but one thing seemed certain—the fight likely will not be held on the West Coast.

Boxing promoter Cal Eaton of Los Angeles offered yesterday to guarantee \$14 million dollars for the heavyweight title scrap if the International Boxing Club would stage it either in Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum or in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena.

But Truman Gibson, secretary of the IBC, immediately threw cold water on the offer by saying the IBC "is not too interested" in promoting a heavyweight title fight on the West Coast.

Smith Wins Split Decision To Take Lightweight Title

BOSTON — Wallace (Bud) Smith, master of the short, slashing left hook, hoped his "Gypsy" days were over today as the new lightweight champion of the world.

Smith, the 26-year-old Cincinnati Negro, gave Jimmy Carter the worst beating of his career last night at Boston Garden but had no easy time in gaining a split decision in 15 blood-splattered rounds. It was the third time Carter has lost the lightweight crown.

"I want to be a fighting champion," Smith said afterward.

Campy Denies Fault In Liquor Bribe Probe

NEW YORK — Brooklyn Dodgers' catcher Roy Campanella questioned for three hours yesterday in a State Liquor Authority bribery probe, said: "I've been clear from the word 'go'."

Campanella was called by the office of State Investigation Commissioner J. Irwin Shapiro in connection with the transfer of his liquor store license from Queens to Harlem. Authorities contend that many such transfers were possible only through bribery of liquor authority agents.

"I assure you there was nothing under the table," Campanella told newsmen as he emerged beaming after the questioning. "I can truthfully say that there's nothing to be ashamed of. My books are on the up and up."

Musial Reaches 2,500-Hit Mark

ST. LOUIS — Stan (The Man) Musial, whose name is inscribed in most of baseball's batting records, reached the 2,500-hit milestone in his brilliant career and then set his sights on 500 more.

The St. Louis Cardinals' veteran outfielder-infielder slammed a single and two-run homer Wednesday night off Cincinnati pitcher Rudy Minarcin for hits No. 2499 and 2500.

Only 36 other major league players have passed the 2,500-hit mark during their careers and there have been only seven who've made it past the number 3,000.

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
