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Brahman Cattle Cannot Survive E. Oregon Cold

BURNS — Brahman cattle, popular in the Southwest because of their hardy qualities, aren't hardy enough for Eastern Oregon's winters.

Two years of experiments at the Squaw Butte-Harney Branch Experiment Station near here have convinced the station's experts that crossing Brahman cattle with Herefords doesn't work.

The Brahmans, whose male sex gives rodeo performers one of the roughest rides known to man, were brought to Texas to develop a beef cattle strain that could stand the heat. Their long legs give them the ability to cover much more range with less effort.

The experiment station, using 34 Herefords and 34 Brahman-Hereford crossbreds, found that the crossbreds couldn't stand the rigors of winter as well as the Herefords.

The Herefords also produced a much better grade of meat. Eighteen of each type were butchered, the Herefords grading 11 choice and 7 good, and the crossbreds grading only 4 choice and 1 good.

The findings were announced in a bulletin published by Oregon State College.
