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Contractors Delay Start Of Northwest Pipeline

DURANGO, Colo. (AP) — Fish Northwest Constructors, Inc., has delayed by four days from July 1 the starting date for construction of a 150-mile segment of the proposed San Juan Basin to Pacific Northwest natural gas pipeline.

J. Don Krevelling, land operations chief, said Tuesday the protests of about 40 Montezuma farmers to the offered price of five cents for right-of-way has caused the delay.

He said the Salt Lake City firm, which is designing and building the pipeline for Pacific Northwest Pipeline, Inc., is surveying an alternate route to avoid land owned by the farmers.

"We'll start on whatever route we can buy first," Krevelling said.

Progress Said Rapid Toward Nuclear Power

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — W. Kenneth Davis, reactor chief for the Atomic Energy Commission, said Wednesday progress is being made "at a surprising rate" in the United States toward achieving economic nuclear power.

"But a great deal remains to be accomplished," he said.

In an address to the Canadian Electrical Assn., Davis declared: "I have every confidence we will solve the problems of economic nuclear power reactors as well."

Davis said the United States has directed its power reactor development program in the direction of "power-only" reactors. This is distinguished from "dual-purpose" reactors which would produce both power and the fissionable material plutonium to be used either for fuel or weapons.

No Smoking Regulations Become Effective July 1

PORTLAND (AP) — "No smoking while traveling" and "forest fire fuel" requirements become effective July 1 in Oregon and Washington national forest protective areas and remain in effect until Oct. 31, the regional fire control chief of the U.S. Forest Service announced Wednesday.

Campfire permits will be required only in the old Yacolt Burn near Vancouver on the Gifford Pinchot National Forest or if camping in private lands in Washington. Campfire permits will not be required in Oregon.

Permits to burn trash or other forest debris are still needed in both states.

Argentina Lifts State Of Siege, Says Radio

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — The government radio announced Wednesday the state of siege in Argentina has been lifted.

In a broadcast communique the Army Ministry said that, with the lifting of the state of siege, the "Command of Repression" has completed its tasks. This command, created after the June 16 revolt against Peron, gave the army complete charge of the armed forces.

The communique said the national and port police have been restored to the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Interior.

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Portland Cement Plant Expansion Announced

PORTLAND (AP) — A three-million-dollar expansion program was announced Wednesday by the Oregon Portland Cement Co.

Frank E. McCaslin, president, said the firm planned to double the output of its Oswego plant to produce about 700,000 barrels of cement per year.

Other planned improvements of the firm's holdings include the re-equipping of its rock quarry in Polk County at a cost of \$250,000.

Factory Worker Faces Charge Of Bilking Logger

CHICAGO (AP) — A case of an Oregon logger who allegedly bilked a factory worker of \$25,000 was wheeled out Wednesday by a grand jury indictment here.

Sidney Francis, 53, a factory worker here, was indicted. Bond was set at \$1,000 and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

The bilked loggerjack was Ewart Emmys, now a Long-Bell Lumber Co. employee at Keasbey, Ore. He said he formerly worked in camps in Washington and California.

The government charged Francis with writing a series of 36 letters over a 14-year period to persuade Emmys to advance money to him on the assurance that he soon would inherit a fortune from his mother, but needed money to tide him over. Emmys said he sent money from the various camps

Communists Said Trying To Shield Mystery Fleet

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The China News said Thursday the Communist MIGs which Monday downed a Nationalist Chinese jet plane and damaged a commercial flying boat were trying to prevent detection of "a Red mystery fleet."

The Nationalist newspaper said flights of Chiang Kai-Shek's fighters and bombers tried to attack the fleet Monday night after the MIG aircraft were driven off by heavy antiaircraft fire.

A bigger mission was flown to the same area the next night, the paper said, but found no trace of the mystery fleet.

Official quarters refused to confirm or deny the China News report. The paper sometimes carries information from official sources who do not want to be named.

It did not describe the "mystery fleet" but speculated that it was trying to make the river port of Poonchow opposite Formosa on the Red mainland coast. It was reported made up of Red navy vessels, including destroyers.
