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PHOTO TIPS

In man's many ways of recording the daily happenings of life, the motion picture ranks supreme in approximating reality. It is superior in this respect because of its ability to portray motion and the fourth dimension—time.

Through the elements of time and motion, a story is told more effectively; past events are recalled more accurately and vividly. To those interested in self-expression, an entirely different creative approach is offered.

Movies, of course, require projection; but this slight inconvenience is offset by its very result: the allowance of group participation. When pictures are seen simultaneously by all present, there is a psychological reaction that actually makes them more enjoyable.

The only needed equipment for motion picture work is a camera, projector, and screen. Equipment that operates with box camera simplicity is available at low cost. The more expensive cameras offer such features as slow and fast motion, and a choice of lenses. Amateur equipment is available in two film sizes: 8 mm and 16 mm. 8 mm film costs roughly one-fourth that of the larger size, but the picture is not as sharp. However, it is more than adequate for home projection. 16 mm is ideal for projection in auditoriums, and for other uses where maximum detail and sharpness are required.
