Thousands of persons attended community Fourth of July celebrations throughout Oregon Monday, despite cool weather and overcast skies.
There were an estimated 20,000 on hand for the finals of the 11th annual Timber Carnival at Albany. Malcolm Harper, 39, of Cheshire, won top prize money of \$400 in the contest of woods skills.
There were 4,000 at the final show of the Klamath Basin Round-Up at Klamath Falls. Bill Ward, an Angels Camp, Calif., bronc rider rode Miss Klamath, the notorious buck, for the full 10 seconds.
The biggest crowds in the 32-year history of the Molalla Buckaroo—13,000 on each of three days—saw Casey Tibbs, Pierre, S. D., win the title of best all-around cowboy.
Another attendance record was set at the St. Paul Rodeo where 35,000 saw the four shows.

Jones Estes Is Victim Near Azalea

Cause Of Crash Still
Unknown; Authorities
Are Still Investigating

Clarence Rasmussen, who lives two miles east of Azalea, turned away Saturday from his window after noticing a plane flying very low over the rugged Starvort Creek area.
A moment later, he came running out of his house. The plane had crashed into the ground in a swirling cloud of dust a few hundred feet from his house.
Killed on impact in the wreckage was Jones Isaac Estes, 51, Box 508, Glendale. Rasmussen arrived first at the scene and found Estes was beyond saving. Coroner L. L. Powers of Roseburg later said Estes had died on impact. He said he suffered a crushed chest and his head was badly mangled as the propeller and nose were shoved back into the pilot's compartment of the two-place Luscombe.
Minutes after the crash, the narrow Starvort Creek Road was clogged with sightseers. The plane had crashed into the ground about 25 feet from the road. Hanging 60 feet in the air from a tall fir

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5 Trainmen Killed As 2 Trains Crash

FORT SUMNER, N. M. (AP) — Two Santa Fe Railway freight trains smashed head-on in the Eastern New Mexico plains early Tuesday and five crewmen perished as roaring flames engulfed the mass of wreckage.
Santa Fe officials said one of the freights moved through a red light off a siding onto the main line and into the path of the other. Diesel oil burst into flame and a car of acetate added to the raging fire. Rescuers were unable to approach the engines for several hours.
Three men were injured and two escaped without injury. All the trainmen were from Clovis, N.M. The wreck was on a high embankment. Although each engine was moving only an estimated 20 miles per hour, all the cars involved were derailed. The 33 cars in the eastbound train and the 10 on the westbound left the tracks and plunged down the embankment, stacking on top of each other.

Six More Cloverdale Homes Set For Auction

Six more houses in the Cloverdale Addition will be sold at auction by the U. S. Marshal on Aug. 2, making 12 of the homes to be sold within the next month.

They will be auctioned on the Douglas County Courthouse steps at 10 a.m. Aug. 2. The FNMA reserves the right to bid in the amount of judgment on each of the houses.
On July 22, six houses against which judgments of \$40,419.67 have been decreed, will be sold, also on the courthouse steps.

16 Killed In Accidents

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U. N. Command Accuses Reds Of Violations

PANMUNJON (AP) — The U. N. Command today accused the Communists of repeated and flagrant violations of the Korean truce agreement, and demanded a strict accounting of combat material brought into Korea by the Reds.
Maj. Gen. Harlan C. Parks, senior U. N. member on the Military Armistice Commission, said the Reds were guilty of "complete insincerity, dishonesty and utter lack of integrity" in maintaining the armistice agreement.
A few hours later, Parks barred Allied newsmen from a press conference called by the Communist delegate, North Korean Gen. Lee Sang Cho. Parks told the newsmen:
"I do not consider it appropriate that representatives of the enemy side enter my camp to attend my press conference. Conversely, I do not think a accredited correspondents of the UNC should enter their camp for similar conferences."
It was the first such prohibition in the four-year history of the Panmunjon negotiations and conferences.

In a full-dress meeting of the armistice commission, Parks read into the record a 17½-page list of alleged Red violations of the truce.
He charged collusion by Communist Czech and Polish truce inspectors in making the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission ineffective.

Frank Pike was moving into the Kohlman Apts. Friday evening when someone lifted several items of jewelry from his parked car, he complained to police.
Missing were: A wrist watch, pocket watch, two rings, two sets of cuff links, several the clasps and a key chain. Several of the items were marked by Elks insignia, he told police.
Pike said he didn't miss the jewelry until the following day, when he reported the loss.

Washington State Prisoners Rioting; Six Hostages Held

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) — Rioting prisoners at Washington State Prison on the outskirts of Walla Walla took six hostages, including an assistant warden, Tuesday.
Telephone lines to the big prison were dead and details of the cause of the riot were meagre.
The prison has a population of 1,700 and first reports to the Washington State Patrol said most of the inmates were participating.
First reports said the prisoners would make demands at 3 p.m.

Jail Escapees Recaptured After Brief Escapade

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Three men who escaped from the Polk County Jail and robbed a rural Eugene family after holding them captive for five hours, were caught near here Monday.
Although armed, they did not resist.
The trio, booked on charges of armed robbery, are Alfred Peterson, 46, of Rockaway; Raymond Lowe, 22, of Everett, Wash., and Burton Bryson, 20, of Junction City.
Carl E. Anderson, state policeman, gave this report of their escape: The three men sawed their way out of the jail at Dallas, Ore., Friday night, escaping through an air vent. They took three guns from the sheriff's office as they left.
At nearby Independence they stole an automobile and drove to an area 25 miles west of Eugene. There they forced their way into the home of Edward Zinkler, a farmer, and held him, his wife, Annabelle, and their five-year-old daughter, Rose Ann, captive for five hours Saturday night.
Then they took a quantity of canned food, kitchen equipment and blankets and left in Zinkler's car.
Bloodhounds aided a search party of state police and sheriff's deputies in combing the wooded area near Zinkler's abandoned car was found nearby.
The dogs lost the scent at a road and railroad intersection, however. The trio apparently hid out in a cabin in the woods but left there and got another car.
Anderson said he and another officer, on a routine patrol, Monday afternoon, saw an automobile carrying the three men coming out of a farmhouse driveway.
The car sped away but Anderson was able to overtake it. The three men, though heavily armed, gave up without resistance.
Other officers were summoned and the men were taken to the Lane County jail here.

Two-Year Old Tot Found After 2 Hours Search

LIBBY, Mont. (AP) — Found unharmed in a wooden hollow, 2-year-old Ida Mae Curtis bounded to her father's arms with a cheer. "Hi, Daddy," she cried Monday after she was lost for 22 hours in a rugged mountain area south of here.
Searchers found her only 300 yards from where she disappeared Sunday evening.
Fearful his daughter might have been carried from their tent by one of several bears seen in the vicinity, Mortimer Curtis, the child's father, broke down and cried upon embracing her.
Mrs. Curtis, mother of seven, had said she saw two bears near the camp where Curtis works as a logger shortly after Ida Mae vanished.

Segni Appears Winner Of Italian Premiership

ROME (AP) — Left-of-center Christian Democrat Antonio Segni appeared today to have won his fight to rebuild the four-party center coalition with which Mario Scelba governed Italy for 16 months.
The scholarly, 64-year-old advocate of land reform must report to President Giovanni Gronchi by tonight on whether he can become Italy's sixth postwar premier and end the nation's 13-day-old government crisis.

A one-car accident on the first curve past MacDonald's Cafe at the base of Rice Hill Monday night injured two servicemen returning to McChord Field. One, Henry Sherman Fisher, 23, Grants Pass, was reported in fair condition at Douglas Community Hospital, Roseburg. The other, Harold Francis Shepard, 22, Russell Springs, Ky., was in good condition.
The accident occurred about 10:45 p.m. Shepard told state police the right rear wheel came off the car, sending the vehicle in and out of the ditch before it overturned. Both men were given emergency treatment by two passing physicians. Hospital personnel said Fisher suffered multiple rib fractures and a broken left shoulder. Shepard was being X-rayed Tuesday.

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President Sends Personal Wishes To Sen. Johnson

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Tuesday sent personal wishes for a speedy recovery to Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.), hospitalized after a heart attack Saturday.
The Senate Democratic leader was reported at Bethesda Naval Hospital to be still in serious condition with "no change in the last 24 hours." Monday's bulletin said he was "making satisfactory progress."
The President, who returned after midnight from his long holiday weekend in the Catoctin Mountains of Maryland, sent a letter to Johnson as his first business Tuesday.
The letter was not made public but press secretary James C. Hagerty said the President expressed hope for a speedy recovery.
Mr. and Mrs. Eisenhower also sent flowers.
It has been less than a week since Johnson and the White House were exchanging politics-tinged comments on the question of accomplishment by administration Republicans and majority Democrats in the present session of Congress.

Funds May Be Held In Reserve

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) predicted Tuesday the Senate will vote to appropriate, but hold in reserve 6½ million dollars for a transmission line to the proposed Dixon-Yates power plant.
Knowland, the Senate Republican leader, told an informal news conference as the Senate took up a bill to provide TVA funds that he believes there will be "bipartisan support" for such a course.
The Senate Appropriations Committee approved last week a provision under which the funds would be withheld if the City of Memphis makes a commitment in 90 days to build its own plant.

Khushchev Says Russians Want Agreement On Honest Basis; Will Remain Strong

MOSCOW (AP) — Communist Party Secretary Nikita Khrushchev said yesterday that Russia wants an agreement "on an honest basis" at the Geneva summit talks but is strong enough to wait if the West is not prepared to negotiate seriously.
Khrushchev's host at the U. S. Embassy's Fourth of July party, Charge d'affaires Walter N. Walmsley, replied: "I do not think the President of the United States would go to Geneva without serious reasons."
The Communist party chief and other top Russian officials, including Premier Nikolai Bulganin, put in a surprise appearance at the party. No such high-ranking group of Soviet leaders have ever before attended an embassy function.
In a speech he said he wanted to make to the guests, Khrushchev said the Russians are not going to the July 18 conference "with broken legs" — crippled by harvest failures or other breakdowns in the Soviet economy.
"We are going upright like soldiers to meet with worthy partners and that is the only right way," he declared. "If we talk on an equal basis, all parties, and if the talks are honest and sincere, equal to equal, something will come of it."

2 Accused Of \$112 Robbery Of Dillard Resident On Friday

Two men are being held in the county jail on robbery charges after the Friday night strong-arming of a Dillard man, Nyal Henry Boyd, who said he was robbed of \$112.
The men, arrested Saturday afternoon by the Sheriff's Dept., were identified as: William Charles Keady, 26, Gazley Rd., Myrtle Creek, and Ralph Raymond Lee, 30, who gave his address as Winston.
Arraigned this morning, Keady asked for a preliminary hearing, while Lee waived hearing and was held to answer to the charge in circuit court. Bail of \$5,000 was placed on each by Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff.
Boyd told investigating deputies that he was standing outside a restaurant in Dillard Friday night when the man he identified as Keady invited him to Winston for a beer. There, they joined a couple later identified as Lee's brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Lee, Winston, and by Lee. After taking the married couple home, Keady and Lee decided to "go to Oakland." Boyd told officers. The three drove off.
When they reached Roseburg, the victim related, Keady, driving the car, turned onto Garden Valley Road, stopping near the overpass at the new highway.
There, they said, Keady stopped and asked Boyd to get out. Boyd said Keady hit him, and accused both men of knocking him to the ground. Keady, he said, took his billfold containing \$112 in currency. The arrests were made through contact with Mr. and Mrs. Lowell

Plane Pilot Kills Poisonous Snake

LONDON (AP) — Airline Capt. Cameron T. Walker, who landed a plane of passengers safely last year despite a jammed nose wheel, seems to be making a habit of escapes from ticklish situations. This time it involved a poisonous snake.
Walker, who hails from Massapequa, N.Y., killed the reptile with a jungle knife yesterday as it slithered across the forward luggage hold of his airliner toward the crowded passenger cabin. The incident occurred just before the New York-to-London Pan American plane landed at Shannon, Ireland.
The snake apparently had escaped from a crate containing 28 rattlesnakes, copperheads, coral snakes and some unidentified varieties being shipped to Duesseldorf, Germany. All of them were believed poisonous.
The passengers were unaware of the incident.

Fireworks Show Draws Big Crowd

People from central Douglas County jammed the fairgrounds grandstand Monday night to be treated to a Fourth of July fireworks show conducted by the Junior Chamber of Commerce with the co-operation of several other service groups.
No estimate was made of attendance, according to Warren A. Woodruff, chairman. However, the fairgrounds parking lot was crowded with cars. The Douglas County Sheriff's Reserve handled parking. Spectators also lined the new highway above the grandstand and the highway across the river from the fairgrounds.
About \$1,100 in fireworks, purchased by service clubs and the City of Roseburg, were used in the display, which lasted nearly two hours.

A traffic jam was created along the new highway by spectators driving home after the show, but city police reported no serious mishaps.

Stunter Dies As Bicycle Misses Ramp

Seven Persons Victims
Of Traffic Crashes;
Three Killed In Planes

A bicycle rider, performing at the Hillsboro Fourth of July Community celebration, plunged to his death before more than 1,000 horrified spectators Monday evening.
He was one of at least 16 accident victims in the state over the long holiday weekend which began at 6 p. m. Friday and ended at midnight Monday.
Seven others died in traffic accidents, three were killed in plane crashes, three drowned, one died in a fire, and one was run over by a train.
The cyclist, Dean Pitcher, about 50, of Goshen Ind., also known as Mike Kelly, rode his bicycle down

Traffic Accidents Set All-Time High

Traffic deaths climbed to a new high for the Fourth of July holiday period as at least 393 persons lost their lives.
The over-all accident death toll also was the heaviest ever for a three-day Independence Day holiday period.
The traffic accidents, compiled from 6 p. m. (local time) Friday to midnight Monday, were higher than the 380 estimated by the National Safety Council and compared with a previous high of 368 for the three-day Fourth of July period in 1952.
In the 78-hour period, 239 persons drowned and 141 were killed in miscellaneous accidents. The over-all total of 773 was a record for a three-day period and compared with a record of 733 for a four-day Fourth of July period in 1950. The traffic toll in 1950 was an all-time high of 491.
