SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—A young wife whose husband told police she was kidnaped by two swarthy men showed up unharmed Tuesday to tell of a terror ride with her abductor.

### Police Seeking Local Man After Flight Monday

Police today sought a 23-year-old Roseburg man after his flight from arrest Monday afternoon in Roseburg, but a second 23-year-old man involved in the same case was jailed on a liquor charge.

Police said the girl was spotted drinking beer in a car in a parking lot near the Greyhound Bus Depot.

Two minor girls in company with the three were taken to the police station, but were released after questioning.

### 2 Killed, 39 Hurt As Bridge Breaks

CHEROKEE, N. C. (AP)—District Solicitor (prosecutor) Thad D. Bryson Jr., said Tuesday his preliminary investigation into the collapse of a suspension footbridge near here Sunday showed "no particular evidence of criminal negligence."

Two women were killed and 39 persons injured when the 150-foot bridge ripped loose from its moorings and dumped some 50 persons into the shallow Oconaluftee River 20 feet below.

### Crash Of Light Plane Kills Glendale Flier

100 yards away was the left wing of the plane as a mute testimony of the final phase of the accident. What had caused the crash was still undetermined. Civil Aeronautics Authority official C. J. Christensen of Medford said the airplane had bounced into some high tension and telephone wires along the road and had been tossed into the trees, carrying some of the wires with it.

The time of the accident was pinpointed at 4:18 p.m. Saturday. Electric clocks were stopped at that time when electricity was interrupted by the snapping power lines.

Adding to the puzzle of the crash was the testimony of people living in the area. They said the motor didn't sound as if the plane were in trouble. One explanation offered by State Policeman Fred Junwirth of Glendale was the possibility Estes was trying to land the plane in an open field near the spot of the accident.

Causing more uncertainty was the report that Estes had been flying for six years. This time, he had taken off as he had often before from Glendale Air Field.

Estes, who lived at Box 528, was a "gyppo" lover for Robert Dollar Lumber Co. at Glendale. He had lived in Glendale continuously for about six years.

He is survived by his wife, Elsie; two sons Harold and Bobby, and two daughters, Dorothy and Barbara Ann. The youngest son, Bobby, 12, often went flying with him, according to a son-in-law, D. J. Cooner, of Glendale.

The body was taken to Hull & Hull Mortuary in Grants Pass. The accident was investigated by both state police and sheriff's deputies. It was the second fatal plane accident in the county this year.

Estes was a veteran of World War I. He was born at Wagoner, Okla., May 16, 1904. Beside his wife and two sons of Glendale, he is survived by two daughters, Dorothy Blomme and Barbara Cooper, both of Glendale; six grandchildren; two sisters, Myrtle Newton of Ft. Worth, Texas and Lucille Davis of Redlands, Calif.; three brothers, Clyde of Hanford, Calif., Paul of Mesa, Ariz., and Leon of Biloxi, Miss.

Funeral services are scheduled Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the Olivet Presbyterian Church in Glendale. Interment will follow in the Glendale Masonic Cemetery.

Elder Norval Ketchum, assisted by the Rev. Wayne Waltman, will conduct funeral services.

O'Hara, 58, pleaded guilty to a charge of reckless driving when arraigned in district court Tuesday. He was committed to jail in lieu of \$75 fine. Mathis pleaded guilty to a vagrancy charge when arraigned later Tuesday and was sentenced to five days in jail.

A minor two-car accident Saturday evening found officers citing Myrvyn Russell Thompson, Butte Falls, for failure to stop at stop sign. Officers said his vehicle collided with another driven by Orville Gene Gulseth, Sutherlin, near the Sutherlin junction of Highway 99.

Shortly after noon Sunday, Robert Douglas Burr, Coquille, was cited by state police for operating in the left lane of traffic, north of Drain. Police said Burr attempted to pass two cars, one with a trailer, also traveling north. A southbound car driven by Orlando Marrion Mize, Drain, swerved to miss Burr and hit a third car driven by Edgar Gray Dyer, Sacramento, Calif. Police reported heavy damage to the Mize and Dyer vehicles. They reported no injuries.

The first Fourth of July accident occurred Friday evening at the Glendale Junction when two cars collided. Gene Rowe, Glendale, driver of one was transferred to a Portland hospital Saturday for additional treatment to an injured left arm. Occupants of the other car, Sgt. and Mrs. Otis G. Damron, Pittsburg, Calif., continued on to the servicemen's new base in California after receiving treatment at the Glendale Clinic.

Downey, Calif. (AP)—Enough, said truck driver George Di Peso, is enough, so he ended the saga of his burrowing garden hose with a pair of heavy shears.

The 50-foot green plastic hose began mysteriously worming its way down into the ground in his front yard last Thursday. It kept on disappearing in the general direction of China at a rate of 2 or 3 inches an hour.

Approximately 20 feet was gone by yesterday. Hundreds of persons tramped over the lawn to watch. Di Peso received batches of advice and suggestions; telephone calls from as far away as New York, Tokyo, Canada and England.

Finally, yesterday, he cut the hose and said: "If it wants to sink down farther and disappear completely, my prayers go with it. If it decides to stay the way it is and doesn't move any more, I'm going to bury it."

He and his family had planned to go to the mountains for the July 4 weekend but called off the outing.

"I couldn't stand it any longer," he said. "This thing was getting out of hand. My life has been made a big mess."

HONG KONG (AP)—U.S. officials are arranging a coldly correct reception for three American turncoat prisoners of war due to cross into Hong Kong Saturday from Red China.

The Communist Chinese Red Cross informed the Indian Red Cross in New Delhi Monday of the July 9 arrival date for the three Korean War veterans who stayed with the Communists after the 1953 armistice, then recently changed their minds.

The men are Lewis W. Griggs, of Jacksonville, Tex.; Olho B. Bell, of Olympia, Wash.; and William A. Cowart, of Dalton, Ga. Cowart originally asked to be sent to Japan but recent reports from Peiping have said he now prefers returning to the United States.

Lee, in his statement, told investigators that Keady threw the billfold away in a parking lot at Main and Mosher streets in Roseburg. He said he thought there was "\$70 or \$80" in the wallet.
