

House Approves Foreign Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House here has approved a \$3,285,800,000 foreign military and economic aid program for the year starting this month.

The measure, which merely sets a ceiling for future appropriations, now goes to a Senate-House committee to adjust differences. The Senate previously approved an authorization 139 million dollars larger. President Eisenhower had asked about 3 1/2 billions. The actual appropriation still to be acted on, may be trimmed further. Strong Democratic support enabled the President's House backers to beat down 21 attempts to limit the program, including proposals to restrict help for Yugoslavia and India. On final passage, by a 273-123 roll call, the bill was supported by 159 Democrats and 114 Republicans; opposed by 48 Democrats and 80 Republicans.

Oregon's Polio Cases Now Reported At 53

PORTLAND (AP) — Three new cases of polio reported last week brought the number in Oregon so far this year to 53, the State Board of Health reported here.

There were 46 cases at this time last year. As reported earlier, only three of the 63 victims had received inoculations of Salk antipolio vaccine produced by the Cutter Laboratories of California.

There have been no cases of polio reported among first and second grade school children who more recently have received vaccine prepared by another firm, a spokesman for the board said. The board reported so far some 43,000 eligible children have received their first shot of the vaccine. That is 97 per cent of those wishing to take the shots, the board said. Some 5,453 children have received second shots.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Interior Affairs Committee here has approved a bill to authorize a 60 million dollar Upper Colorado River project. The vote was 20-6. The committee eliminated all mention of the controversial Echo Park Dam in the bill.
