

Roseburg Outslugs Bandon

Chiefs Drop Second Contest By 6-2 Score

Roseburg's Chiefs outslugged Bandon for a 15-8 decision Saturday night, but then dropped Sunday afternoon game 6-2 as the two teams split a weekend Southern Oregon League baseball series at Bandon.

The decisions left the Chiefs with a 4-6 league record to Bandon's 3-5, enabling the Chiefs to stay in front of their weekend rivals in the standings.

Tall Dave Gambee went all the way on the mound in spite of being touched for eight runs in Saturday's game. The Chiefs, led by catcher Joe Niro, came up with some top-flight hitting in Gambee's behalf, bouncing three Miller pitchers out of the game.

Niro made the grand slam of hitting, connecting for a home run, triple, double and single in five times at the plate. Dan Luby hit three for six, including two singles and a four-bagger and Niro and Bill Harper each batted in four runs.

Bandon hitting was led by Clyde Blevins who had three singles in six trips.

The Chiefs took a 4-2 lead in the second inning, were tied 5-5 in the third and then blasted out six runs in the fourth inning to clinch things. The losers aided the Roseburg cause with seven game errors.

Roseburg scored four times in the second after the bases were loaded. An infield out scored one run, an error allowed another to count and then Harper singled for two more.

In the sixth fourth, both Luby and Niro connected for home runs. Luby hit over the right field fence with Harper on base and after Jerry Waldrup was hit by a pitched ball, Niro hit over the same spot.

The Chiefs scored four more runs in the sixth while Bandon continued to rack up single markers in the final innings to narrow the final difference. Gambee struck out 10 and walked 11.

Bandon beat the Chiefs at their home run game in Sunday's engagement. Bill Johnson reversed the procedure, hitting twice over the left field fence and driving in four runs in the home club's 6-2 win two with each homer.

The Millers added another pair to their fourth inning total on the combination of a single, an infield out, a walk and an error. All scoring came off losing pitcher Don White.

The Seattle Rainiers sent Brenner, a winning pitcher and manager in the old Western International League, to pinch-hit in the 10th inning of the second game of their Pacific Coast League doubleheader with Los Angeles Monday.

The score was tied 4-4 and the bases were loaded. And it was no

surprise to the Rainiers when Brenner whacked a single that drove in the winning run that gave Seattle a share of the twin bill. Los Angeles won the opener 5-4.

Portland won twice, beating Oakland 3-0 and 3-2, and dropped the Oaks into a tie for sixth place with the San Francisco Seals who lost to Sacramento 7-4 and 2-1. Hollywood beat league-leading San Diego 13-6, then lost 8-6.

At Oakland, in the opener Portland's Bob Alexander pitched a 7-hit shutout. The nightcap was scheduled for 7 innings but it stretched to 12 in a pitchers' duel that ended when Carl Povich broke a 2-2 deadlock with the winning run. Royce Lint went the distance for the winners and Al Gettel for the losers.

At Seattle, the Angels broke a 4-4 tie in the eighth of the opener and won on Gene Mauch's walk, a sacrifice and Piper Davis' single.

Hollywood coach Gordon Maltzberger suffered a heart attack in the opener at Hollywood and was hospitalized. Maltzberger, 42, is a former Hollywood pitcher.

NEW YORK (AP) — Detroit's Al Kaline and Richie Ashburn of the Philadelphia Phillies led the major league batting leads Tuesday and if the American League competition follows the pattern of 1954 Kaline still should be the No. 1 hitter at the season's end.

Kaline topped his average eight points to .375 in last week's games with 18 hits in 43 at bats. He increased his margin over runnerup Nellie Fox of Chicago, who dropped two points to .337.

Ashburn, the National League leader, lost four points to .349 with 10 safeties in 31 trips. Brooklyn's Roy Campanella, in second place, slumped three points to .335 before he was sidelined with a knee injury.

What in the world are the Boston Red Sox doing back there in fourth place? The way those guys look they ought to be away out front in the American League race.

They showed just about everything a manager could want—power hitting and great pitching—while whacking the league-leading New York Yankees in a doubleheader yesterday 4-2 and 10-3.

Ted Williams pounded a double and a towering home run in the opener. He walked as a pinch hitter in the nightcap.

But it wasn't all Williams. Willard Nixon made his record 7-2 over the New Yorkers, knocking home two runs with a single before retiring from the mound in the first game because of the 96-degree hit after five innings. Ike Delock took it from there.

A grand slammer by Jackie Jensen and a three-run homer by Norb Zuchow in the ninth were the big blows in the nightcap. Tom Hurd held New York to two hits in 6 1/3 innings of relief.

The sweep gave Boston 24 victories in the last 29 games.

Cleveland took second place in the league by beating Detroit twice, 6-5 and 8-5, while the White Sox slipped to third by splitting at Kansas City. Chicago won the opener 8-3, lost the second 4-3. Baltimore beat Washington 6-2 in the only single game action.

In the National, first-place Brooklyn rapped Philadelphia twice, 11-2 and 6-3; Chicago split with Cincinnati, losing 6-3 before winning 4-3; St. Louis took two from Milwaukee, 4-2 and 5-4; Pittsburgh beat New York 4-3 then lost 5-3.

The day's work left the Yanks atop the American League, five games up on Cleveland and Brooklyn ahead of the Cubs by 12 1/2 in the National. The Fourth of July rule of thumb has sent 36 American League leaders on the Fourth to the World Series in the past 54 years. Thirty-four of the National League leaders at this point have gone on to win in the last 55 years.

Both the Yanks and Dodgers, incidentally, have been among the more notable exceptions to the rule in the past.

Cleveland moved a half game ahead of the White Sox on Hal Naragon's pinch single to beat Detroit in the 15-inning opener with Bob Lemon winning No. 11 in relief. Larry Doby hit a pair of homers and Al Rosen one in the nightcap, but it was Bobby Young's two-run triple that broke up a 5-5 tie for the victory.

The White Sox had 16 hits to beat Kansas City in their first game, but the A's bounced back to win the nightcap on an unearned run in the eighth after Hector Lopez had tied it two innings earlier with a two-run homer.

There were a total of 37 homers.

It was a reversal of the 1954 finale when the Roseburg Country Club golfer lost by a 4 and 3 count to Mrs. Rowell. Last week, Carole Jo won the state junior women's championship. Her win made the 17-year-old one of the youngest titlist in the history of the OGA.

In the men's championship, George Beecher of Ontario defeated Medford's Phil Getchell 7 and 5. Matches were played at the Riverside Country Club in Portland.
