NEW YORK (AP) — Floyd Patterson's timetable calls for a heavy-weight title bout with Rocky Marciano June 1957 — provided the Rock still holds the title. But will the 1952 Olympic champ be ready? The 29-year-old Brooklyn Negro takes on his first full-grown heavy-weight tonight in Archie McBride, a 155-pounder from Trenton, N.J. The 10-round match at Madison Square Garden will be carried ABC radio and television, starting at 9 p.m. EST. Patterson has been in with heavyweights before but the biggest of them, Joey Maxim, weighed no more than 177 pounds. Pal Joey, of course, is the only fighter to beat Patterson in 23 pro

He won the fight but was gasping for breath from body blows when it was over. Next time they met, Patterson polished off Wagner in five rounds and chased him into retirement. Satterfield was subbing for Patterson that night in Chicago after Floyd pulled out because of pto-maine poisoning. At 26, McBride has won 20 of 29 starts with 8 knockouts. He was stopped twice, by Jimmy Walker and Boardwalk Billy Smith.
