YMCA Builds Moral Fiber And Muscle Among Youth In New Summer Program

The YMCA summer recreation program for youngsters in the Roseburg and Winston-Dillard areas has caught on like wildfire, reports director Bob Shewbert.

As a matter of fact, the program has grown to such bounds that funds are not available to cover it, says YMCA Executive Secretary Don Naden.

"The program is apparently needed, and yet finances are inadequate to meet the need," Naden said. He related that the need is evident from the turnout. He reported that 128 boys have enrolled in the Roseburg program and 38 boys and girls are participating in the Kiwanis-sponsored program at Winston-Dillard.

He asked that anyone interested in keeping the program operating can contribute to the depleted "Y" coffers at the YMCA office in the Roseburg Armory.

The program itself is not limited to the physical and team aspects often found in such programs. It also includes strengthening of the moral fibers along the lines stressed by the YMCA.

Through movies and pamphlets, the program is tied with Christian living and the kinship of Roseburg youths with the youth of the world. They are also urged to take a direct part in aiding the YMCA activities in other countries. It's a training in what one man calls "America's best export."

The swimming courses follow a nationally standardized series of tests pointed toward pushing the youngster to his greatest capacities. He has a host of tests in several categories of increasing difficulty which he must pass before he reaches the next highest stage. The tests start with "minnows" and progress to "sharks," the designation for a proficient swimmer.

In the gym and in the athletic field, the youngster competes against himself. On the basis of height and weight, he practices on ten tests ranging from basketball throws to pull-ups. The purpose here is to strengthen muscles and achieve maximum coordination. He also plays softball and works on such track and field events as broadjumping.

"This phase of the program is itself aids in making a strong healthy youth."

But possibly more important is the moral phase of the program. It is the contention that "the future of the free world depends on what happens to the free world's youth."

In the newly-instituted program in Roseburg and Winston-Dillard, training in the moral concepts of the Bible, leadership, and the kinship with other youth of the world is stressed. Of the program, Reader's Digest says: "Youth in many parts of the world is finding better aims and a better leadership for the future."

Shakespeare Group From Many Areas

The 1955 Oregon Shakespearean Festival company includes students and faculty members from 41 of the nation's leading colleges and universities.

Forty-six cities are represented by the company, which includes many professional actors. Universities contributing the largest number of actors and technical workers include Carnegie Tech, Franklin and Marshall College Pa., University of Texas, University of Colorado, Stanford University and the University of Wisconsin. States with the largest representation are Oregon, California, Colorado, New York and Pennsylvania.

As rehearsals speed through their second week, newcomers hold the spotlight on the huge outdoor stage. According to producing director Angus Bowmer, the unique requirements of the Elizabethan stage have apparently presented no problems to the large contingent of newcomers playing top roles.

Five plays will be presented this year, one as a bonus. On alternating nights Aug. 1 through Aug. 31, these will be shown: "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Macbeth," "Henry VI, Part 3" and "All's Well That Ends Well." The first-named will be shown eight times; the others seven each.

The rarely produced "T. I. M. O. N." will be the fifth play, and it will be shown twice, on Aug. 23 and 29.

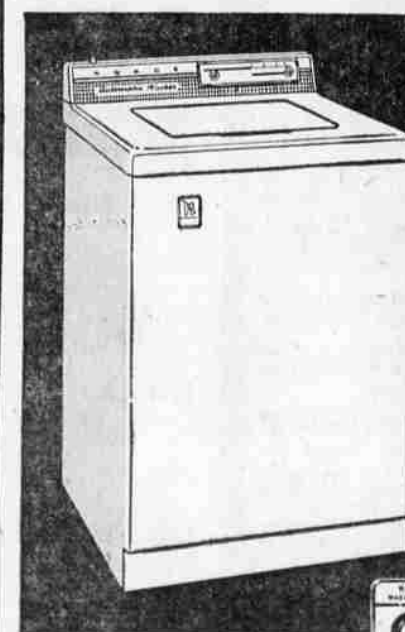
