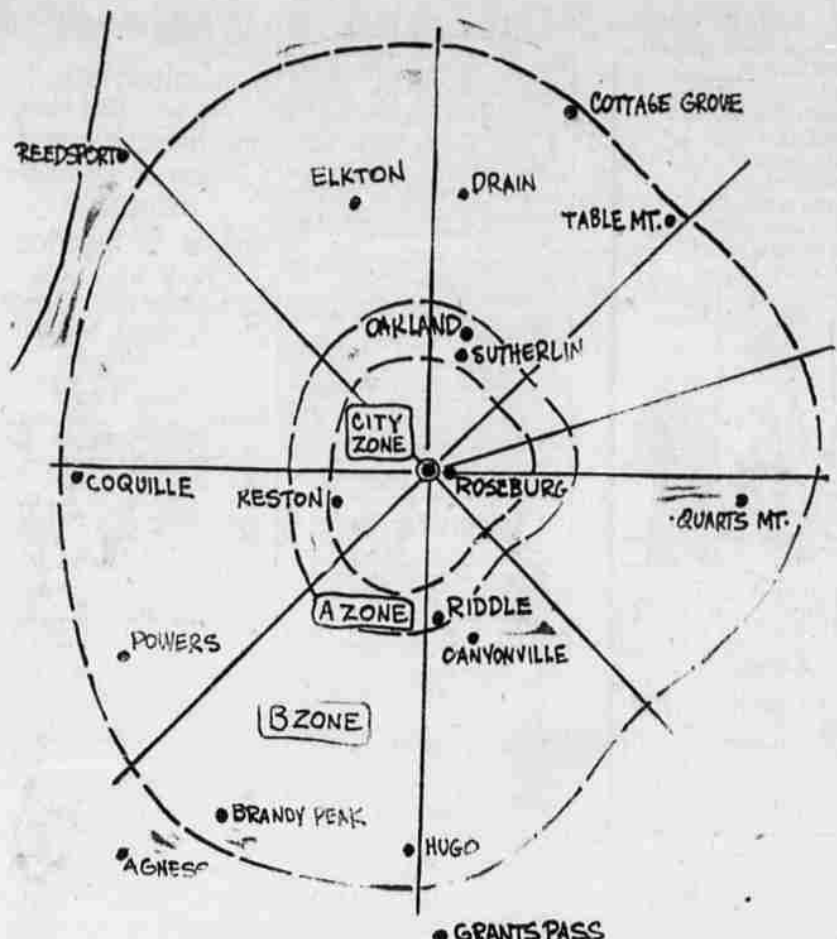

Death Claims Victim Of Polio At Pendleton

PORTLAND — For the second time in two weeks death has claimed a victim of a 1952 Pendleton polio attack. Ronald Lewis, 25, who was stricken at Pendleton in the fall of 1952, died at a convalescent home here Friday with a kidney ailment the primary cause. His physician said the kidney ailment was due to long immobilization because of polio. On June 21 Mrs. Ray Eckles, also stricken in the fall of 1952, died at Pendleton and her death too was reported due to kidney complications. Lewis' funeral services were Wednesday afternoon at Pendleton.

Attempt To Settle Strike Called Publicity Stunt

SHEBOYGAN, Wis. — A meeting aimed at lessening mob tension in the 15 month old UAW-CIO strike against the Kohler Co., ended abruptly Wednesday when Kohler representatives walked out in a huff after accusing the mayor of "pulling a publicity stunt."

The meeting in the mayor's office included union and company representatives along with mayor Rudolph Ploetz and local law enforcement authorities.

The meeting came after a mob estimated as high as 1,000, Tuesday night packed the Sheboygan docks where a freighter is docked with clay for the Kohler Co., manufacturers of plumbing ware. The mob beat up one non-striking worker and overturned the car and broke windows in the darkened house of another.

Lyman Conger, general counsel for the company, got up and said heatedly that the mayor was "pulling a publicity stunt."

Longview Fibre Co. Will Expand Its Production

LONGVIEW — The Longview Fibre Co. announced here plans to expand its Kraft paper and container board plant to step up its production of light weight paper and container board.

R. S. Wertheimer, vice president, said the company has ordered its seventh paper machine capable of producing 150 tons daily of light weight paper and 250 tons daily of container board. He estimated approximately 60 employees will be needed to operate the new equipment.

Addition of the machine, scheduled to go into production late in 1955, will bring the daily production of the plant to from 1,000 to 1-100 tons a day, depending upon the grades of paper run.

The plant now employs about 1,900 men and women.

Welfare Recipient Admits Perjury

VANCOUVER, Wash. — John Herman Gum, who has been receiving welfare payments since 1938—and who had \$19,700 in bonds in a safe deposit box has pleaded guilty to perjury.

He admitted in Superior Court here that he was not telling the truth in an affidavit to get the welfare payments.

Gum related that he actually has been drawing monthly welfare payments in Oregon since 1938. He got on the Washington relief rolls in 1939 and since then had received \$8,072 in welfare payments from Washington.

Gum, who according to his naturalization papers is 82, was released without bail. Some \$9,000 of his bonds were deposited with the court pending decision on how much should be required to repay the state.

The state recommended that he should not be jailed if restitution is made because of his age and frail health.

Children's War Games Take Life Of Boy 13

NORTH SACRAMENTO, Calif. — War games which erupted into a fiery explosion killed 13-year-old Jimmy Whitley this week.

Jimmy's brother, Michael, 10, told firemen:

The boys were playing war games, using a small shed containing gasoline, kerosene, paint thinner and paint as their ammo dump.

Suddenly there was a fire. Michael thought he kicked over a can of gasoline in scrambling out. Jimmy was trapped inside.

Firemen found a fireworks cap which they presumed started the fire.

Peron Charges Enemies Still Spreading Rumors

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina — President Juan D. Peron said in a broadcast this week the enemies who failed to assassinate him in the June 16 revolution are now circulating rumors in an attempt at "sedition by telephone."

Speaking to his people for the fifth time since the abortive revolt of navy fliers and marines, Peron appealed to opposition political parties to come to an agreement with him. He asked his followers for a truce in Argentina's political struggle.

The speech was broadcast by the Argentine Radio network.

Peron declared those who took part in the revolt, which cost hundreds of lives, were infamous. He said some navy units had sought the help of civilians outside political parties.

Peron invited "responsible men" from the opposition to come to terms with him for reunification of the country.

He called for "a truce in the political fight" no matter what criticisms and rumors might be spread by "bad-intentioned enemies."

Peron delivered his 11-minute address from his Government House office, reopened Tuesday for the first time since a rebel air bombardment wrecked much of the building.

Peron told his radio audience the situation in the federal capital is completely normal and that the June 16 revolt never extended beyond the General Paz highway which marks the city limits.

He promised just punishment for "the criminals" he blamed for the deaths of "many innocent persons" in the revolutionary bombardment.

Medford Voters Defeat Special Tax Measure

MEDFORD — Medford voters Tuesday turned down a special tax levy of \$86,510 and a proposal to increase the tax limit from 12 to 15 mills. The vote was 636 no to 207 yes.

A proposal for annexation of a 3,000-acre area south of the city was rejected \$18-96. But the annexation of a smaller area north of the city carried 24-19.
