Weather Bureau Opens Positions

An expansion program in the U.S. Weather Bureau has opened up a number of jobs for trained meteorologists and weather observers, according to Mark Lander, resident meteorologist for the bureau in Roseburg.

Needed are meteorologists, meteorological aides and radar and electronic technicians for stations to be added to the weather service throughout the United States. Some stations also will be overseas.

Aides for both surface and radar-sonde observing and map plotting are needed as well as trained men for forecasting and research. Technicians will be put to work in installing and maintaining instruments.

Salaries, according to qualifications and experience, will range between \$3,670 and \$5,440 a year, and many of the jobs will offer career opportunities, Lander said. Information may be obtained from the bureau's personnel division, Washington D.C. Applicants should state their qualifications and experience, Lander advised.
