Ashland Festival Observes 20th Year

The fourth of July weekend marked the twentieth anniversary of the premier weekend of Ashland's Oregon Shakespearean Festival.

Twenty years ago, on July 2 local citizens witnessed a unique event in the small southern Oregon town. It was "Twelfth Night" performed in an open-air theater on an authentic Elizabethan stage in authentic Elizabethan costume.

This year, when the festival opens a month-long run of plays, about the only thing reminiscent of the first season will be the authenticity of stage, staging, and costume.

Approximately 200 people saw the first festival. The actors were townspeople and Southern Oregon college students and the audience was entirely local.

Concerts of Elizabethan music and other special events will round out a month of festivities, in which 25,000 people from every state in the nation and a number of foreign countries will participate. A national broadcasting network will air part of the festival program, coast-to-coast.

Missing will be one special event from the 1935 season, though. In the first season, Director Angus Bowmer's local backers were so sure that Shakespeare was poor box office that they insisted that boxing matches be held in the theater in the afternoons to defray expenses of the shows. The plays' take at the box office paid the loss on the boxing matches and no one has doubted Shakespeare's drawing power in Ashland since.

Ticket sales for the season are running about 30 percent ahead of sales on this date last year, according to William Patton, festival general manager.

Patton said that sales are particularly heavy for weekend performances and for the first and last weeks of the season.

The festival season opens August 1 and runs throughout the month. A performance is given every night, and the four regular plays are presented in rotation, so that visitors to Ashland may see all the plays by staying four days. All of the outdoor theater's 1,100 seats are reserved in advance.

As festival officials expected, the greatest demand for tickets has been for performances of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and "Macbeth." Surprise of the season in the box office so far has been the demand for tickets for the rarely produced "Timon of Athens," which will be seen in special performances on August 23 and 29.

CLEMENTS TAKES OVER

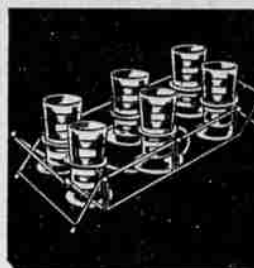
