Reserve Program Purposefully Weak, Claims Thomson

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Thomson (R-Wyo) told senators Thursday the nation's reserve program "is dangerously weak" because most career military officers in the Pentagon want it that way.

Thomson, a combat infantry commander and instructor during World War II, said experienced young reserve officers were not called back in larger numbers during the Korean War "because it would break up the playhouse for promotion which we called 'WPA.'"

He explained that WPA in Army slang meant "West Point Protecting Assn."

Thomson was initial witness before the Senate Armed Services Committee as it opened public hearings on the controversial national reserve plan, pushed through the House after weeks of controversy. President Eisenhower has called the reserve program "vital."

Sen. Russell (D-Ga.), in opening the session, sharply criticized the administration plan approved by the House, saying it still would place the burden for active reserve duty upon young men who had served two years under the draft or a longer period of volunteer enlistment.
