They report seven thousand members and that they maintain five institutions; one for students, one for orphans and widowed mothers and three for unfortunate girls. The old stockings make employment for the needy widows.

Carol Fray brought an interesting account of her attendance at the Youth's Temperance Council camp held at Jennings Lodge recently. Mrs. C. N. Currier and son, Beryl, Rosemary McConnell and Carol represented the local council at the camp.
