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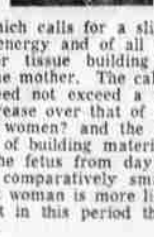

During the early part of pregnancy the materials needed for the growth of the fetus are so small in amount that any increase in need for fuel and building materials is practically negligible. That is the pregnant woman should eat during this period just what any woman should eat who would preserve her health and vitality. On the other hand, a great many women are apt to experience nausea and digestive disturbances in the early part of pregnancy, to special care should be taken to avoid overtaxing the digestive tract with un-needed food difficult to digest, as well as to guard against such factors as fatigue, excitement, worry and constipation, which have an unfavorable influence on digestion. The diet should be limited to moderate amounts of simple, easily digested foods which may often be better utilized if taken in small amounts at shorter intervals than usual.

The nausea that is apt to occur at this time is not due to any difficulty in the alimentary tract itself, but to readjustments necessary in establishing the union between the maternal and fetal circulations through the placenta. As soon as this connection is well established the nausea should disappear and the mother's appetite and digestion improve.

During the period of the fifth to the seventh months there is moderate rate of growth on the part of



the fetus, which calls for a slight increase of energy and of all the materials for tissue building in the diet of the mother. The calories taken need not exceed a ten per cent increase over that of the nonpregnant woman and the actual amount of building materials needed by the fetus from day to day is still comparatively small. The pregnant woman is more likely to overeat in this period than to undereat.

Probably at least half of the total gain in weight of the fetus will occur during the last eight to ten weeks of pregnancy. This is the period of rapid fetal growth, when considerable extra energy and tissue-building materials must be furnished in the food intake of the mother less either the mother or the child or both, is to suffer. Even in late pregnancy, however, the need for extra fuel foods will not exceed by more than one-fifth or twenty per cent the amount required by the woman when not pregnant, that is a sedentary woman who ordinarily needs about two thousand calories will require four hundred extra calories in late pregnancy, or a total of twenty-four hundred calories to provide for a gain of eighteen to twenty pounds in weight, which will cover the weight of the baby, placenta, water, membranes, etc., as well as a slight gain in the mother's own weight. Huge Globemaster Sets Paratroops Down In Japan

ASHIYA AIR BASE, Japan—Three huge C124 Globemasters loaded with paratroopers from the United States arrived Saturday in the vanguard of the largest aerial troop movement in history.

The three sky giants, ahead of schedule, were the first of 43 C124s which will shuttle 7,000 troops between Japan and America in the next few days. Forty others were due at two-hour intervals.

The first plane, 6 hours 6 minutes ahead of schedule, landed at 3:54 p.m. at this base 700 miles southwest of Tokyo.

First paratrooper off was Cpl. Daryl Roark, Albuquerque, N.M., a driver for the 508th Airborne Regimental Combat Team, which is coming to Japan en masse from Ft. Campbell, Ky. Next was Pfc. Billy Lane, a cook from Lawrenceburg, Ind.

The second huge Globemaster landed exactly two hours later, at 5:54 p.m. The third flew in at 8:20 p.m.

"The trip was uneventful," said an arriving pilot, Capt. Gregory E. Loucks, Oakland, Calif. Flying time from Wake Island was 10 hours.

The same 43 planes now bringing the 508th Airborne RCT to Japan will, starting Tuesday, shuttle 3,000 men of the 187th Airborne RCT over the Pacific to a new assignment at Ft. Bragg, N.C.

Order Now Being Restored At Washington State Prison

WALLA WALLA—Steps toward the establishment of normal operations at the state prison were being continued Saturday as a political riot entered the picture.

Some 1,600 prisoners who were forced to spend Thursday night in the open while guards searched for weapons concealed during the revolt were moved back into their quarters Friday.

Temporary repairs on damaged locking systems, warden Lawrence Delmore Jr. said, made it safe enough to move the prisoners back into their cells.

The 33 prisoners who spearheaded the riot early Tuesday and acted as ringleaders until the revolt ended Wednesday were placed in the bottom tier of cells in wing six, which Delmore said was the safest wing of the prison.

Wing one, where the riot started, was not used for prisoners but was used as the gathering place for scores of weapons—axes, hammers, baseball bats and knives—found during a cell-by-cell shake-down of the prison Thursday and Friday.

Politics entered the picture Friday in a statement released at Seattle by State Sen. Albert D. Rosellini, Senate Democratic leader during the last Legislature.

Rosellini charged that a bill which Gov. Langlie vetoed would have remedied what he termed one of the main reasons for the riot, "discrimination and favoritism shown by the parole board" in setting prison sentences.

"The last Legislature tried to remedy this," Rosellini's statement said, "by passing a bill which in effect would take the parole board out of politics and require the appointment of personnel on a basis of qualification."

Delegates chose Roseburg for the 1956 convention and elected these other officers: James C. Gilroy, Portland, senior vice commander; Albert H. Birch, Medford, junior vice commander; Jerry Leibel, Eugene, chaplain; John H. Schum, Portland, quartermaster; Walter W. Foster, Dallas, judge advocate; Eric Cross, Prineville, chief of staff; Leon Bennett, Portland, inspector; Dr. Roy Scofield, Salem, surgeon.

Mrs. Pattie Hopkins, Rogue River, was named president of the auxiliary. Serving with her will be: Lois Eldridge, Prineville, senior vice president; Mrs. Carl Shoenmaker, Portland, junior vice president; Mrs. Lillian Stanton, Cannon Beach, treasurer; Mrs. Lorene Kell, Medford, chaplain; Dorothy Smith, Gladstone, conductress; Gwen Thompson, Oregon City, guard.

Kay Salter, a student at South Salem High School, was named winner of the auxiliary's essay contest. She got \$59 and a silver medal.

French Assembly Votes Freedom For Tunisians

PARIS—Responding to an appeal from Premier Edgar Faure, France's National Assembly voted overwhelmingly today for agreements granting Tunisia internal self-government by gradual stages.

The Assembly recorded its approval 540-43 after Faure warned that refusal to carry out France's repeated promises of Tunisian autonomy would lead to distrust of French motives throughout the Arab world and among Western nations as well.

"The time of colonialism is finished," Faure declared.

Pierre Mendes-France, making his first appearance in debate since his ouster as premier last February, also urged approval of the agreements which grew out of negotiations he opened when he made his dramatic trip to Tunisia last summer.

Freighter Still Fast On Columbia River Bar

ASTORIA—The grounded freighter Santa Adela remained fast in the mud of Young's Bay near the Columbia River mouth Saturday after the morning high tide.

The tug Salvage Chief, whose efforts to free the Grace Line's vessel had been unsuccessful, still stood by and it was expected that the next try would follow removal of bunker fuel to lighten the ship.

The Santa Adela, of 6,500 gross tons, went aground Thursday while turning to head out of the river en route to San Francisco, Los Angeles and Central and South American ports.

An oil barge was brought alongside Saturday morning and the longshore hiring hall reported a crew ordered to take off 200 tons of bunker oil.

Man Loses Life As Boat Capsizes In Reservoir

PRINEVILLE—William Everett McLachlan, 47, lost his hold on a capsized boat Friday and drowned in the Ochoco Reservoir five miles east of here.

McLachlan, of Moro, had been fishing with Jerry Wilson, Moro, and Jack Lyons, Kent. They decided to quit when a strong wind roughened the lake.

Wilson and Lyons stepped ashore at a small cove, leaving McLachlan behind in the boat. They heard shouts minutes later and saw their companion clinging to the overturned boat about 50 yards offshore.

Kentucky Flash Flood Causes Heavy Damage

LANCASTER, Ky.—Flash floods in this rich barley tobacco-growing area of central Kentucky left one man missing Friday and damage estimated in excess of a million dollars.

Sheriff L.C. Daniel said Clyde Newby, about 54, remained unaccounted for and was presumed drowned. Two children reported to have drowned were found alive and unharmed.

Four inches or more of rain fell on Garrard County in less than two hours, glutting streams and sending an overflow down the valleys.

Tobacco, corn and young grasses washed away. Soil erosion was great.

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
