Warden Relates How Prison Riot Was Undertaken

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (U.P.) — The outbreak in which rioting inmates seized control of the Washington State Prison three days ago apparently began when one of the ringleaders dropped from an overhead walk and overpowered a correctional officer, Warden Lawrence Delmor Jr., said.

The warden, disclosing some of the results of his investigation, identified the inmate as Roddy Erb, of Tacoma. The officer was Harold Innes.

Innes had opened a barred door, leading to an anteroom in the segregation center, to allow men to enter the shower room, the warden said. The shower room serves about 500 men.

As Innes stepped through, Erb, hiding above on the walkway, dropped onto his shoulders and overpowered him. Other inmates soon took over the prison's control room.

An armed guard who should have been assisting the correctional officer on the other side of the door apparently was not there, the warden said.

The warden announced results of his preliminary investigation after some 1,600 of the 1,700 inmates

Oregon Payrolls Soar To New Record Amount

SALEM (U.P.) — Payrolls of Oregon employers soared to a new record of \$288,192,000 in the first three months of this year, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported.

The total was 8 per cent above the similar period in 1934, and was the largest first-quarter total in history.

The figures are for the 18,000 employers covered by the unemployment compensation law.

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
