

Moore's Splits Games With Salem And Eugene

Moore's Cafe, Roseburg's top softball team, split with Eugene and Salem softball teams in a four-game weekend series held here and at Salem.

Saturday night, at Schermer Field, the locals absorbed their first setback of the season when Phillips' Electric, Eugene's best softball team, humped them 10-7 in the first game of a doubleheader. In the nightcap, the Roseburg team came back to win 5-1 behind Larry Bishop's five-hit pitching.

Moore's played at Salem Sunday afternoon, losing the first game there also, this time by a 2-0, no-hit margin. Frank Johnson pitched two-hit ball for the locals, but Salem's Randle Oil team combined a pair of singles, an error in the outfield and a passed ball into two runs.

Bishop again came on to win Sunday's nightcap, this time by 3-2 over Randle Oil. The winners outlasted Salem 8-5 in this one with Harry Johnson hitting 2-3.

Moore's also had eight hits in the 10-7 setback to Eugene Saturday night with Frank Moore and Jake Leicht accounting for home runs. The locals fell behind 3-1 in the fourth inning of that contest when Phillips' Electric scored eight times in the fourth inning on the combination of four errors by Moore's, four singles and a walk.

The Broncs, who finished the first half two games out of the cellar, forged to the top of the pack by taking three of four games at Yakima over the weekend.

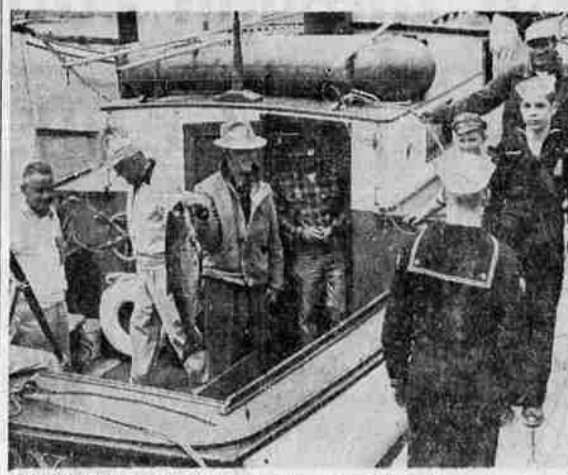
Spokane moved into second place after a 2-2 split at Wenatchee. Salem clung to third despite a 1-3 series at Eugene.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—For the first time in years, the American and National League squads come up for the annual All-Star Game tomorrow with "rested" pitchers and a minimum of injuries. Whereas in other years, all-star

pitchers were called upon within 48 hours after working a nine-inning game on Sunday, only five of the 16 saw action yesterday. A year ago, five of the seven National League pitchers and four of the eight American League pitchers had worked on Sunday.

One Injury

Outside of Brooklyn's Roy Campanella, who was scratched several days ago because of a damaged knee, neither side reported any injuries. Last year, Al Rosen, Yogi Berra, Allie Reynolds, Mike Garcia, Campanella and Harvey Haddix all were crippled although some were able to play. In fact, Rosen, despite an injured index finger, hammered two home runs and drove in five runs to lead the Americans to an 11-9 victory in Cleveland.

Managers Al Lopez and Leo Durocher, who will direct the American and National League squads, respectively, have a wide choice of pitchers. Most likely starter for the Americans is Early Wynn (11-4), Cleveland's strong-armed right-hander, who probably will be opposed by either Don Newcombe (14-1) of Brooklyn or Robin Roberts (13-7) of Philadelphia.
