Emery Neale Has 8th State Men's Singles Title

PORTLAND — Emery Neale, the Portland veteran, had his eighth Oregon State men's singles tennis championship safely in hand Tuesday.

The fifth-seeded Neale survived a shaky start to finish strong and whip Jack Neer, a fellow Portlander, 2-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-1, in their men's singles windup match Monday.

The women's singles crown went to Joan Johnson of Los Angeles, a 6-2, 6-1 winner over second-seeded Geraldyn Shepard, also of Los Angeles.

New Rules Hold On Handicaps

NEW YORK — Golfers who want to play in the 1955 National Amateur Championship at Richmond, Va., Sept. 12-17, will have to study up on a new handicapping system as well as practice their golf shots.

For the first time this year, the handicaps of the entrants must be computed under the new U.S. Golf Assn. handicap system for men. It's explained on the entry blanks sent out today by the USGA. Entries are limited to amateurs with handicaps not greater than 4, computed under this system.

The big difference between the new system and the old is that each course must be rated by a committee according to its difficulty and the golfer's scores are compared with the course rating to establish a handicap differential. A golfer may use either a "basic" or a "current" handicap for his tournament entry.

Gene Andrews Is Only Former Champ To Stay

INDIANAPOLIS — Gene Andrews, Pacific Palisades, Calif., was the only former champion left in the 30th USGA Public Links Tournament Tuesday. He had a fierce struggle in the first round Monday before subduing policeman Wallace Smith of Pontiac, Mich.

USGA Junior champion Foster Bradley of Los Angeles, Andrews' opponent Tuesday, sat out the first round.

The 42-year-old Andrews, 1954 winner at Dallas, won on the 19th hole when Smith three-putted for the second time in the match. Both shot 2-over-par 72s for 18 holes.

Daffy Dean's Son Eyed As Pitcher

DALLAS, Texas (AP) — Paul Dean Jr., son and nephew of one of the greatest pitching combinations, signed a letter of intent Tuesday with Southern Methodist University.

Young Dean, son of Paul (Daffy) and nephew of Jerome (Dizzy) Dean, said he hopes to do a little pitching for the Mustangs.

The son of the old St. Louis Cardinal Gasbouse Gang pitching family of the 1930s is now 6 feet, 5 inches tall and weighs 183 pounds. The 18-year-old Dean was carefully groomed toward a big league pitching career, but not, Paul Sr. said, "until he's had a college education."

This spring Dean won six games and lost none for Lakeside, Ark., averaging 13 strikeouts per game.

Paul Sr. said he had brought his son along slowly, but thinks he "will improve by leaps and bounds."
