Exhibition Ends 12-7 In Favor Of Coast Team

Coquille hitters combed Roseburg pitching for 16 hits Wednesday night to trim the Chiefs 12-7 in a non-league game at Coquille between the Southern Oregon League foes.

The winners came from behind to tie the count 3-3 in the second inning, 4-4 in the fourth and then scored six times in the fifth to ice the issue.

Larry Buss, newcomer to the Chiefs, led hitting for both teams with four singles in five trips to the plate. Joe Niro had 2-4 as did Les Winders.

For Coquille, leading hitters were Roy Harrington, ex-Douglas High school coach, now residing on the coast and Manager Dave Douglass. Harrington had 3-5, including a triple, and Douglass hit 3-4.

In Roseburg's three-run first inning, Buss singled and Manager Hal Zuercher doubled for one run, Luby singled for another and Niro doubled in the third, all with none out.

Coquille picked up its game-winning total in the fifth on the combination of three singles, a walk, a single and a sacrifice flyout.

Roseburg next plays Medford at Finlay Field Saturday night and Sunday afternoon. These games will open the second half of play.

64 Survive Seattle Play; Carole Jo Wins Another Match; Steelsmith High

SEATTLE (AP)—The 64 survivors of three days of rugged competition headed into the playoff round of the 54th Pacific Northwest Golf Assn. Tournament Thursday, paced by a 19-year-old from Southern California.

The eight top scorers after Thursday's play will tee off Friday in the first round of matched play for the championship.

Still leading the pack as they set out over the 6,537-yard par 73 course Thursday was Jerry Steelsmith, Southern California amateur champion but a virtual unknown in the Northwest until he took the role of pace-maker Tuesday.

Playing with the coolness of a veteran, Steelsmith fired a 73 Wednesday to maintain his lead with a 54-hole total of 216.

In second place, three strokes back, was Irv Parent of Seattle, who also carded a 73 Wednesday. And bunched at 220 were Bob Roos, Palo Alto, Calif.; Tal Smith, San Lorenzo, Calif.; George Beecher, Ontario, Ore., and Rod Funnell, Spokane. Roos had a 73, Smith 73, Beecher 78 and Funnell 75 Wednesday.

Only three men broke par. Phil Getchell, Medford, Ore., posted a 70, George Harrington, also of Medford, a 71, and Frank Dolp, Seattle, a 72. Getchell and Harrington were in the 221 bracket at the end of 54 holes along with Dick Yost, Seattle, and Jim Shriver, Seattle. Dolp had a 223.

In the women's tournament at Sand Point Country Club, ex-tilist Pat Lesser of Seattle moved up with a 5 and 4 victory over Mrs. Robert Hlanfeldt, Seattle. Miss Lesser was paired Thursday against Carol Jo Kabler, Oregon state junior girls' and women's champion from Roseburg, who beat Mrs. J. W. Long, Seattle, 8 and 6.

First place San Diego pulled three games ahead of Seattle in Pacific Coast League baseball Wednesday night by taking a 4-3 decision from Portland while the Rainiers were losing at Sacramento, 3-2.

At San Diego an intentional walk to Milt Smith after Al Federoff had singled and advanced to second on a sacrifice set the stage for Earl Rapp's clutch ninth inning single. Rapp's hit delivered his 105th run batted in.

At Sacramento, pinch hitters came through in the last inning rally scoring two runs to beat Seattle. The Rainiers' two runs were produced on consecutive homers by Bob Balcera and Vern Stephans, in the sixth.

Seattle's Ewell Blackwell hurt his arm on a throw to first in the eighth inning. Reliever Van Fletcher was greeted with a single by Solon Bud Heslet in the ninth.

Southpaw Bill Kennedy then took over and pinchhitter Tommy Glaviano doubled, driving in a run. Glaviano stole third and scored on Jerry Streeter's single to center.

Stephens' homer was his third since joining Seattle a week ago after a long major league career winding up with the Chicago White Sox.

George Piktuzis, Los Angeles southpaw, pitched and batted his best game of the season as the Angels beat Oakland twice 4-1 and 8-1.

Piktuzis threw a two-hitter in the seven-inning first game and decided the contest with a three-run homer in the final inning.

The San Francisco seals won 6-2 over the Hollywood Stars, who committed four errors.

Major League Pennant Races Get Back In Swing

The major league pennant races get back to action tonight with two big questions to be answered: Can Cleveland and Chicago survive the one-two invasion punch of New York and Boston in the American? And, just how secure is Brooklyn's 11 1/2-game lead in the National?

New York's Yankees top the AL by five games as the All-Star Game break comes to an end, while only one game separates each of the other first-division teams — Cleveland, Chicago and Boston. That means the runner-up Indians, who had a half-game lead on the Yankees at this point in '54, and the third-place White Sox have to worry about kicking off the Red Sox as well as catching the New Yorkers.

Manager Al Lopez, naming Bob Lemon (12-6) to face Tommy Byrne (7-2) and the Yankees tonight,

claims his pitching staff is back in shape. It better be. After facing the Yankees for two, the Tribe must then take on the huslin' Boston, who have lost only six of their last 34, for three games Saturday and Sunday.

The Yankees will have a three-

game "breather" against fifth-place Detroit over the weekend, then start the one-two punch all over again at Chicago. They play the White Sox Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with the Red Sox barging into Comiskey Park Friday, Saturday and Sunday in a four-game series.

The National presents a different picture. It hardly seems possible, but the Brooklyn, a league and a half ahead of the pack, are hurtin'. The only thing that's kept them away out front is, oddly enough, the even-Stephen makeup of the circuit.

There's no panic yet, but a team that loses 10 of its last 19 games can't be sleeping too well — even with that 11 1/2-game bulge.

Roy Campanella insists he's ready to go back to work behind the plate tonight when the Dodgers take on the St. Louis Cardinals at Ebbets field, but Manager Wall Alston indicates he has other plans.

Charles Ezzard Charles plodded to a split 10-round decision over young Paul Andrews last night to keep grinding away on the comeback treadmill.

He proved he still has the heart of a champion if little else. He was decked by a short right for the eighth count in the second round.

But he weathered Andrews' savage left hooks and right uppercuts and fought back. He earned the decision from referee Frank Sikora, 94-91, and Judge Frank McAdams, 96-95. Judge James McManus gave it to the 25-year-old ex-paratrooper from Buffalo, N.Y., 85-89.

Charles' outweighing Andrews 193 pounds to 189, opened a gash under his opponent's right eye in the fourth round and it kept bleeding most of the way. He battered Andrews in a sledging body attack to slow him down from the fifth on. But Charles' only impressive punch of the fight was a long right that staggered his lanky foe in the first round.

The Cincinnati fighter, who outside the ring shows little wear and tear for a 34-year-old veteran of 104 bouts, appeared to have lost all the finesse that once carried him to the heavyweight title.

Asked bluntly why he goes on, he said: "Fighting is my business. I don't have another job. Besides, how can you turn down money?"

Charles' next stop on the comeback treadmill? Probably in Syracuse Aug. 3 against Hurricane Jackson.

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Ketch Morning Star Establishes New Record

HONOLULU (AP)—The 98-foot ketch Morning Star, its sails tight with a brisk 25-knot trade wind, flashed across the Diamond Head finish line Thursday to establish a new record of 9 days, 15 hours, 5 minutes and 10 seconds for the 2,225-mile Transpacific yacht race.

The race started July 4 from San Pedro, Calif.
