Robyn Gets Sixth Chance To Halt Gene Andrews

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Walter Robyn, a Maplewood, Mo., insect exterminator, Thursday had the sixth chance to stop Gene Andrews' drive toward a second straight USGA Public Links golf championship.

Andrews, insurance agent from Pacific Palisades, Calif., was 1 over par for 30 holes Wednesday in eliminating Foster Bradley of Los Angeles, 1954 USGA Junior champion, 5 and 3, and Bill O'Brien of Seattle, 5 and 4.

Two members of Maimai's Harding Cup championship team were among the 16 survivors in the Public Links tournament, which started last month with 2,007 entries at 39 sectional eliminations.

Billy Joe Lauer, 17, of Spokane, Wash., upset Don Sekrabulis of Kewanee, Ill., in the third round, 4 and 2, but lost to Jack H. Gregory of Detroit in the fourth, 1 up in 21 holes. Sekrabulis was low man in Harding Cup competition last week with a par 70 and Gregory was second best with 72.

Eugene batters were ruts in the baselines and the fans headed early for the exits as the Emeralds clobbered Spokane 22-0 in Northwest League baseball Wednesday night.

Only the hardest of the 903 Spokane fans in the stands at the start of the game were still there after the third inning. By that time, Eugene was ahead 13-0 and the Indians had their third pitcher on the mound.

Eugene wound up with 20 hits including homers by Whitey Thomson and Cliff Dapper. Berlyn Hodges, the winning pitcher, allowed Spokane only four.

Tri-City and Lewiston also put on a slugfest, won by Tri-City 10-5. The winning Braves pounded 18 hits and Lewiston came back with 10. A one-on homer by Hillis Layne sparked a four-run Lewis rally in the ninth.

By contrast, Yakima and Wenatchee played it close to the vest, battling 11 innings before Yakima pulled out with a 4-3 decision.

Wenatchee Chiefs Draw 38,099 Baseball Fans

YAKIMA (AP) — The Wenatchee Chiefs drew 38,099 fans through the turnstiles during the first half of the Northwest League split season, topping all other clubs, president Orin E. Hollingbery said Wednesday night.

Salem was next at 30,363 and Eugene third, 28,806.

Other team totals were Tri-City, 28,180; Yakima, 17,614; Spokane, 16,687, and Lewiston, 14,369, for a league total of 172,018.

Wenatchee had the highest paid series, 6,206, and Eugene the best single game turnout, 2,986.

Hollingbery said the league expects attendance to improve in the second half, with better and warmer weather.

Field Of 132 Top Golfers Open Fire

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A field of 132 top professionals and amateurs opened fire in the \$35,000 Milwaukee Open today over the Blue Mound Country Club par-70 layout, which was taken apart in practice rounds yesterday.

Best reported scores in the warmup were 6-under-par 64s turned in by Tommy Bolt, Chattanooga, Tenn., and Bill Casper, San Diego, Calif.

Casper tuned up for the 72 holes of medal play by blasting six birdies and an even dozen pars. Sam Snead missed a short putt on the final hole that kept him out of a tie with the dry-run leaders. His 65, on nines of 31-34, was one of four.

Julius Boros, former National Open champion of Mid Pines, N.C.; Mike Fetchick, Lake Mahopac, N.Y.; and Walker Inman Jr., Augusta, Ga., had the other three.

Jack Fleck, victory over Ben Hogan in a man-to-man playoff for this year's National Open title, fared in 66. He was matched by EA Furutog; Paul O'Leary, Bismarck, N.C.; and Eric Monti, Los Angeles.

Excellent Fishing Forecast For Most Oregon Sections

PORTLAND (AP) — Fine fishing is to be had in Oregon waters this weekend, the State Game Commission said in its weekly report.

Sea run cutthroat have been showing up in the north coast streams, although few have yet been taken. Summer steelhead are arriving in the Columbia in substantial numbers.

The report by districts:

Northwest
Tillamook, Nestucca and Salmon River areas have been poor to fair. Offshore salmon angling has been poor but should improve. Upper areas of the streams in Lincoln and Lane counties have been fair to good. Lakes of the Florence area have been good. Salmon fishing in Yaquina Bay has been fair to good on both silvers and chinooks. The McKenzie and its tributaries should be good to excellent and so should the upper Willamette and its tributaries. Lookout Point, Dexter and Dorena reservoirs continue fair. Clear Lake has been fair to good. Snow still is heavy in the McKenzie Pass area although some lakes there are opening up.

Southwest
Salmon angling in Winchester Bay has been good. Tenmile lakes and Smith River trout angling, however, has been slow. All forks of the Coquille have been fair for trout, and so have the south fork of the Smith River and Williams Creek. Between Railroad Bridge and McCullough Bridge striped bass angling has been fair. Salmon angling on the Coos Bay bar has been good to excellent, with silvers predominating. Chinooks have been large and at Brookings and off-shore where most of the catch has been of chinooks, results have been excellent. Angling elsewhere, though, along the south coast has been poor. Fish Lake in Jackson County is fair to good. Warner weather is expected to improve. Willow Creek reservoir which has been only fair. All Rogue River streams have been poor but there has been some recent improvement with flies in the evenings. The warm weather should be helpful. Salmon angling has slackened in the Upper Rogue but some small quantities still are taken. Trout angling is good in the North Umpqua above Rock Creek and fair below. The upper South Umpqua has been fair. In the Steamboat

Central
Hood River east fork has been good for 8 to 10-inch rainbow with best catches in the mornings and evenings. Kingsley Reservoir has been good. Lost Lake fair, Frog Lake fair to good. Twin Lakes have been good for small Eastern brook while rainbow have been hitting well at Blue Lake. Still fishing has also been good. Some nice catches continue at Suttle Lake. Big Lava was slow for a while last week but has been picking up. Although water has been low in Crane Prairie Reservoir, angling has been fair to good. Sparks Lake has been only fair with most fish small. Todd Lake has been poor. Evening fly fishing in Elk Lake has produced fair results. Fishing has been good on the Deschutes. Deschutes, dry flies have brought good results. East and Paulina lakes have been fair to good.

Northeast
Wallowa Lake has been producing good catches of rainbow on troll, while bank fishing and kokanee catches have been spotty. The lower Wallowa River has been good. In the lower Imnaha River, a few salmon are being taken. Hurricane Creek, Lostine River and Bear Creek have been low and clear but catches have been poor. Limit catches of Eastern brook have been taken from Twin Lake. The North fork of the John Day has produced a few summer steelhead. Bass fishing in the Columbia backwaters has been excellent. The Umatilla and Walla Walla rivers have been fair for trout.

Southeast
Lake County: Deep, Twenty Mile, Honey and Chewaucan are good. Campbell and Deadhorse lakes are fair; Camas Creek fair. Loflon Reservoir fair. Most of the other small streams have been poor. In Malheur County the small streams in the southeast part have been excellent. Willow, Trout and McDermitt have been producing the limit of rainbows. Malheur Reservoir has been poor. In Harney County, Blitzen River and East Side Canal remain very good. Fish Lake has been fair and Delintment and Moon lakes poor.

Los Angeles Man May Purchase Seals Team

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Oscar Salenger, Los Angeles industrialist, will be here this weekend to talk terms on buying the San Francisco Seals, limping at the gate and in the Pacific Coast League cellar.

If a deal is made, Salenger told The Chronicle, Wednesday, Rogers Hornsby would be a co-owner and general manager. Salenger said he talked with Hornsby in Chicago.

"Hornsby thinks he can take over this club and make real money," said Salenger, former owner of the Sacramento Solons, now tied with the Seals in eighth place.

Salenger said the Seals Stadium lease is a major problem to work out. Paul I. Fagan owns the Stadium and leases it to Damon Miller, president of the Little Corp. at 10 cents per admission plus taxes.

Ex-Basketball Star Of Idaho Dies Of Shot

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — John Oswald Thompson, prominent Pullman-Moscow auto dealer and a member of the champion University of Idaho basketball team in 1922-23, was found dead Wednesday, a bullet through his forehead.

Thompson, 56, was shot by a bullet from a .22 and a .38 Smith & Wesson. His daughter, Donna Jean, found the body four hours later in a storage room in the basement of his house.

The county coroner said later he would list the death as accidental and that no inquest is planned. A rifle was found at his side.
