Douglas Fir Shipments Announced By Association

Douglas fir lumber shipments, orders and production figures for June were released today by Harris E. Smith, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association. The weekly average of West Coast lumber production in June was 188,568,000 b.f. or 100.6 per cent of the 1950-1954 average. Orders averaged 199,844,000 b.f.; Shipments 204,968,000 b.f.; Weekly averages for May were: Production, 189,805,000 b.f.; 101.3 per cent of the 1950-54 average; Orders 187,753,000 b.f.; Shipments 192,108,000 b.f.

Six months of 1955 cumulative months of 1954, 4,795,305,000 b.f.; Six months of 1953, 5,181,817,000 b.f.

Orders for six months of 1955 break down as follows: Rail & truck 3,777,348,000 b.f.; Domestic Cargo 1,611,511,000 b.f.; Export 136,977,000 b.f.; Local 190,869,000 b.f.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at 831,915,000 b.f. at the end of June, gross stocks at 886,458,000 b.f.

Republicans See Hope Of Adjournment Aug. 1

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican leaders said after a White House conference Wednesday there still is "fair hope" for adjournment of Congress Aug. 1.

Between now and then they added, administration leaders will fight for the President's legislative program, including the road building proposal, reserve training bill, and atomic peace ship.

PLANS SPECIAL FUND

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Austria is planning to set up a special fund to compensate persons persecuted during the country's Nazi occupation who now live abroad.

Austrian Finance Minister Reinhardt Kamitz said Tuesday night the government intends to submit a draft bill to set up the fund to the Austrian Parliament this fall.

'Me First' Auto Driver Principal Crash Offender

Accidents involving only one vehicle accounted for most of Oregon's eight percent traffic death increase last year, Secretary of State Newberry reports.

Statewide accident records show 175 fatalities resulted from single-car smashups in which the vehicle struck a fixed object, overturned in the roadway, or ran off the roadway. The death toll from mishaps of this type was 147 in 1953. Fatalities from collisions with other motor vehicles increased from 141 to 149.

Most of the non-collision crashes occurred on highways in rural areas, Newberry said, and most of the blame is placed on drivers who permitted their speed to exceed their ability to control.

"Worst offenders," the secretary said, "are drivers with a 'me first' attitude who feel they must be in front of everyone else on the road. They crowd their luck at the expense of other drivers and the results are often fatal when they crowd it too far."

If a "me first" driver succeeds in staying out of an accident, safety men say, it's usually because of alert defensive driving by other, more competent operators.
