HAMILTON AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. — For four tense, 10 1/2 hours last night Capt. Theodore Roosevelt held his mind and nerves ready to ditch a Globemaster and 87 men in the fog-covered Pacific.

Bulganin Declares Effort Sincere To Secure Peace

MOSCOW (AP) — Premier Bulganin declared Friday the Soviet delegation is leaving for Geneva Saturday to make "a sincere effort" to solve international problems.

The prime minister told a news conference that if the Western Big Three delegations make a similar effort at Geneva there is "no reason to believe that the basis of a future peace cannot be assured."

Bulganin received reporters inside the Kremlin. He was accompanied by the other four major members of the 10-man Soviet delegation to Geneva.

Earl C. Phillips Dies Thursday

Roseburg School District Ends Fiscal Year In Black

The Roseburg School District ended the 1954-55 fiscal year in the black.

Clerk V. J. Micelli told board members in his annual financial report to them and residents of the district Thursday that the year ended with a net cash balance of \$162,467.24. The sum was not all gray.

Micelli pointed out the district started the year with a cash balance of \$98,033.88. He attributed the remaining plus sum to "better collections than ever before."

The clerk and his staff were commended by Supt. M. C. Deller who noted that "budgeting this year was closer than ever before."

Portlander Dies At Vets Hospital

Charles J. Christensen, 58, resident of Portland, died Wednesday in the Roseburg Veterans Hospital.

He was born July 26, 1896, in Portland. He was a veteran of World War I and was a member of the Catholic Church.

He is survived by his stepson, Melvin Daniels, Portland; and two cousins, Mrs. Florence Huber, Portland; and Mrs. W. J. McDonald, Oakland, Calif.

The body was shipped to Portland for funeral services and interment. The Roseburg Funeral Home was in charge of the local arrangements.

The district's school lunch program shone brightly in the report. It had a net profit of \$961.91.

Micelli listed education costs per pupil in the district as follows: 96 cents per day; \$169.92 per school year.

Uranium Hunting Is Major Topic

LAKEVIEW (AP) — Prospecting was a major topic here Friday in the wake of confirmation from the U. S. Bureau of Mines Laboratory that samples from a local claim were rich in uranium.

Don Peters, Forest Service ranger, said many prospectors were out, and some of them reported reactions from their Geiger counters about a mile from the site of the strike reported by John Roush.

Roush's report that samples from his claim about nine miles northwest of here were rich, was confirmed at Albany by H. D. Hess, in charge of the laboratory's section that examines mineral samples.

Hess said the laboratory had no field information but that the samples sent by Roush were rated 1.4 per cent uranium for the best and .66 per cent for samples which were described by Roush as average.

ACTRESS MURDERED

NEW YORK (AP) — The mutilated body of a middle-aged actress and theatrical makeup artist was found late Thursday in a Manhattan hotel room. A man's leather belt was wrapped around her neck.

Police said they had "some evidence of rape" in the death of Adlyn Woodington, an attractive, grayish woman whose age was estimated between 30 and 35.

General fund costs were: General control — budgeted \$50,610, spent \$48,484.33; instruction — budgeted \$1,181,335.25, spent \$1,152,977.16; operation of plant — budgeted \$205,957.50, spent \$200,956.76; maintenance and repairs — budgeted \$69,364.94, spent \$37,253.27; auxiliary agencies — budgeted \$199,635, spent \$196,632.63; fixed charges — budgeted \$78,337.65, spent \$86,011.92; capital outlay — budgeted \$71,559.82, spent \$69,056.71.

Total expenditures applicable directly to schools were \$1,822,272.78 instead of the budgeted \$1,856,820.96.

In a final reconciliation of funds the clerk listed the total cash and receipts of \$2,251,205.96. That figure less expenditures of \$1,822,272.78 and transfer to other funds of \$266,465.94 gave him his surplus of the aforementioned \$162,467.24.
