Farmers Begin Fight Against Grasshoppers

HEPPNER — Farmers began putting up cash Wednesday to start the fight against hordes of grasshoppers threatening to devour Morrow County grasses and grain. Some 40 at a meeting called Tuesday night by the insect control committee of the Morrow County Livestock Growers Assn. signed up 70,500 acres. They will pay 25 cents an acre.

The United States Department of Agriculture requires a block of at least 60,000 acres before it will enter the campaign and share one-third of the cost.

Bob Flynn of Twin Falls, representing the agricultural research service of the USDA, said the county is seriously infested in some areas and has lesser degrees of infestation almost everywhere. There are no real boundaries, he said.

Veteran Army Division Replaced On Continent

BREMERSHAVEN, Germany — The first shipload of U. S. 1st Division troops, now being replaced at their front Curtin post by the 10th Division under "Operation Gyroscope," said goodbye to Europe Wednesday.

The division has seen 13 years of service on the continent.

The airplane has opened new avenues of picture opportunities for many photographers.

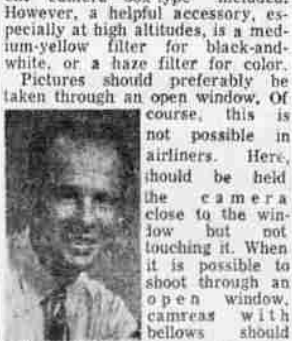
For the amateur, this work requires nothing more than his present camera—box-type included. However, a helpful accessory, especially at high altitudes, is a medium-yellow filter for black-and-white, or a haze filter for color.

Pictures should preferably be taken through an open window. Of course, this is not possible in airliners. Here, should be held the camera close to the window but not touching it. When it is possible to shoot through an open window, cameras with bellows should still be held inside, as the wind may tear the fabric.

Neither the camera nor the upper part of the body should contact the plane, as vibration will blur the picture. In smaller craft, it may be possible to have the pilot throttle down for the exposure, further reducing vibration.

At altitudes less than 4000 feet, exposures are the same as for average ground scenes. Above this, decrease exposure one stop (on adjustable cameras). Box cameras should be limited to use above 4000 feet in airliners, or 1000 feet in slow planes; otherwise blur may result. With other cameras in fast aircraft, use a shutter speed of 1/100 above 3000 feet, 1/400 below 1000 feet, and 1/200 at distances in between. On slow craft, use 1/100 above 1000 feet, 1/400 below 500 feet, and 1/200 in between.
