Led by cagy Jerry Cade Drain relentlessly swung into the second half of Southern Oregon League baseball play over the weekend with a double win over the Grants Pass Elks at Grants Pass, The Black Sox posted the home team in 6-3 and 8-1 contests.

With Coquille's split series at Bend, Drain's double win allowed the Sox to move three games ahead of the Loggers, their nearest pursuers in the league. Bend was the only other team with a record of .500 or above in the league on a 6-6 mark.

Cade struck out a phenomenal 19 batters of the 27 who bit the dust in the nine-inning game for the Elks. He issued only three walks as the Sox registered their 6-3 win Saturday night.

Catcher Bill Beard homered for the winners in the ninth inning with two aboard to break a 3-3 deadlock. Glen Stetter had tripled and Pat Wohlers had reached base via an error. Beard hit 3-4 for the game.

In Sunday's 8-1 triumph, left-hander Dick Duerr fanned 13 for the Sox as the winners busted up the game with a four-run fifth inning. Singles by Vern Marshall and Bobby Buob, walks to Wohlers, Don Porter and Chuck Bafaro and Jerry Bettendorf's walk did the trick.

Leading Drain hitters in this game were Marshall with 3-6 and Buob with 2-5.

In the league's third series at Bend, Coquille and Bend butted heads in the highest scoring exchanges of the season.

The two teams smashed out nine homers as Coquille bashed the home team 2-4 in Saturday night's game. Melotte hit three circuit blows for the winners.

Medford Stud '9' Wins Two

Dropping Roseburg in 6-1 and 11-2 games at Finlay Field over the weekend, Medford evened the Southern Oregon League series between the two teams and dropped the Chiefs into the basement of the circuit.

Medford pitching set the locals down with four hits in each game and a total of three runs in the two games. Warren Noyes, ex-professional pitcher in the Western International League, and Terry Maddox, University of Oregon ace, hurled the two wins.

Roseburg beat Medford in both games of their first series in Medford.

Homer Hurts
The visitors made good on only six hits off Roseburg pitcher Frank Feller in the Saturday night game, but one of these hits was a three-hit homer by Jack Cooney in the first inning.

Roseburg's Les Winders responded with a circuit blow to right center in the bottom of the second inning to narrow the margin to 3-1. But that was as close as the Chiefs could get. Medford added another marker in the third inning on the combination of a Roseburg error, the only one of the game, a walk to Cooney and a single.

The winners picked up two more runs in the eighth inning for good measure. A walk to Cooney, a double by Maddox and Darold Webber's single tallied both.

Despite the score, Feller turned in a surprisingly successful stint, striking out 10 and walking four in addition to riving up six hits. Noyes, for Medford, fanned 12 Chiefs and walked eight.

Have Big Inning
Another big first inning in the Sunday game got Medford off to a winning start. This time the Studs got to starting pitcher Ben Whittaker for four first inning markers and then coasted in to their 11-2 triumph behind Maddox' hurling.

A walk, Whittaker's own error, a misplay by Ladeas, a triple by Maddox and a single by Wooten produced the runnning. Medford scored once more in the fourth and added six game-clinching tallies in a seventh-inning spree.

The Chiefs, meanwhile, were able to produce single runs in the first and fourth innings.

In the Roseburg first, Larry Buss reached first via an error and registered on Dan Luby's three-bagger. Luby's walk, a double by Jerry Waldrop and walks to Joe Niro and Les Winders forced in a fourth-inning run.

Medford's six-run seventh inning came off a walk, five consecutive singles and a double. Dave Gamble relieved at this point for the Chiefs.

SEATTLE (AP) — The Pacific Northwest Golf Assn.'s women's championship still is 18-year-old Ruth Jensen of Seattle.

She defeated Carole Jo Kabler, 17, of Roseburg, Ore., 3 and 2, in Saturday's 36-hole final match at the Ingelwood Country Club.

Miss Kabler is the Oregon junior girls' and women's champion. Miss Jensen was defending her PNGA crown.

The match ended on the 34th hole. Miss Jensen sank a chip shot from four feet off the green to register a deuce on the par-3 hole. Miss Kabler had driven into a trap, but chipped out with an 8-foot putt remaining when Miss Jensen ended it with her birdie.

Miss Jensen had piled up a 5-up lead at the halfway mark of the match, but the Oregon miss peeled three holes off the lead by the 27th.

Yost Snares PNGA Title

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle's Dick Yost canned a 10-foot birdie putt on the 34th green Sunday and for the second time in three years was crowned champion of the Pacific Northwest Golf Assn.

Yost, 25-year-old Walker Cupper who won his first PNGA title in 1953, picked up the hardware again with his 4 and 2 victory over Bob Roos of San Mateo, Calif., in their scheduled 36-hole final.

Eighteen-year-old Ruth Jensen of Seattle retained the women's championship, defeating Carole Jo Kabler, 17, Oregon junior women's and girls' titlist, in their 36-hole Sunday match.

Yost's triumph Sunday came at the end of 178 gruelling holes. Both contestants had waded through 71 holes of medal play and two 36-hole matches en route to the finals.

Yost and Roos were all even at one over par at the end of the first 18 holes in the finale. Yost went 2-18 after two holes of the afternoon round but Roos squared it at the 26th. Yost was 2-up again on the 31st when Roos missed a 3-foot putt. The Seattleite won the 32nd with par and the two halved the 33rd. Yost's birdie on the 34th wrapped it up.

Two Roseburg girls were selected to the all-star team at the Eugene Invitational Women's softball tournament in which the local women took second place Sunday. A third Roseburg player received honorable mention.

Cub Lupher, Drain, won the high overall championship at Yoncalla's \$3,200 registered state trapshoot Sunday with a final total of 432 birds out of a possible 450.

Of the six class championships, five went to Douglas County residents including the women's and juniors' title.

George Blum, Tillamook, was the only non-Douglas County class winner, taking high overall in double AA class with a total of 417 x 450.

High overall A class shooter was Bill Jones, Roseburg, with 417 x 450. High overall B class winner was George Voytella, Roseburg, firing 406 x 450 while high overall C class champion was Vern Solomon, Winchester, scoring 385 x 450.

Donna Wooley, Drain, captured the high women's trophy, while the high junior prize went to Ronnie Powell of Yoncalla. Wanda Blum, Tillamook, was second high lady for the shoot which began Friday evening and ended Sunday. About 75 shooters participated.

In winning the shoot's top prize, Lupher took first place in the third event, 100 yard handicap targets, scoring 96 x 100 and winning a shootout over Jones. Lupher took second place in Event II, 100 bird handicap, with 96 x 100 at 23 yards.

In the doubles event, Lupher took second with 47 x 50 and in the fifth event, a 50-bird night handicap event, he took third place with 47 x 50 at 23 yards.
