Roseburg's Lockwood Motors American Junior Legion champs travel to Medford today for the first game of a best-of-three-game series to determine the Southern Oregon berth in the state league baseball playoffs.

The teams engage in a second game, and a third one if necessary, tonight. Winner of this series meets Albany, the Willamette Valley champion and last year's state title, in the first game of the state playoffs Sunday at Albany.

The Dalles has won the Eastern Oregon title and Grant and Milwaukie meet for the Portland metropolitan title and the other state semifinal berth.

Roseburg earned the right to meet Central Point-Medford in the mid-week playoffs after beating North Bend in two straight games over the weekend. The locals won games of 4-1 and 12-4. Earlier they won the district league title with a 3-1 record.

Dick Smith, winner of the first North Bend playoff game with an overall record of 5-0 for the season, is slated to draw the starting mound job in tonight's contest which begins at 4:30.

He was treated for the cut at a hospital and while still there, suddenly collapsed and died.

Hometown Boy Leads Western

ROCKFORD, Ill. (AP)—The rest of the field was chasing the hometown boy Wednesday as the third round of the Western Amateur golf qualifying marathon opened.

Breaking into the halfway lead with a brilliant 67 for 138—four under par—was Alex Welch, 35-year-old attorney who has won the Rockford city title six times and has been a member of the host Rockford Country Club most of his life.

Welch, finalist in the North-South at Pinehurst last year, still had a fight on his hands for the seven allotted qualifying spots after the 27-hole trial.

One stroke behind were Harold Brink, 43, a used car salesman and four-time Grand Rapids, Mich. champion, and 20-year-old Don Bispinghoff of Orlando, Fla., winner of the 1953 North-South crown.

Brink fired a steady 70 to go with his opening 69. Bispinghoff hooked up four straight birdies in rounding out a 68 to go with a 71.

Bob Brue, 20, of Milwaukee, defending champion Bruce Cudd of Portland, Ore., Jim Tom Blair of Jefferson City, Mo., and Walker Cupper Jim Jackson of Glendale, Mo., were grouped at 140 Jackson's Walker Cup teammate, Dale Morey of Indianapolis, as well as Bispinghoff, cracked out 68s. Morey moved into contention at 142.

Cudd qualifies automatically but the seven other places figure to develop into a battle. The daily 36-hole match-play competition among the final eight players for the title will start Friday, continuing through Sunday.

Fred Besana, whose entire professional baseball career has been spent with the Oakland A's, has finally racked up victory No. 1 after two years of trying.

After losing four games in Pacific Coast League play last year and five this year, Besana finally made it by edging the league-leading Seattle Rainiers, 3-2 Tuesday night. And he whipped one of the league's best pitchers in doing it—Larry Jansen, ex-New York Giant mainstay.

Bevos White-washed

In other games, Sacramento blanked Hollywood, 1-0, and Los Angeles whitewashed the Portland Beavers, 4-0. San Diego, now just half a game behind Seattle, and San Francisco were idle.

Besana, a southpaw, narrowly missed winning his first PCL game shortly after signing with the A's last year. He had a one-hitter after eight innings against Portland, but was relieved before Portland won out in extra innings.

Both Besana and Jansen struck out six men. Jansen allowed but six hits to Besana's nine.

Both teams scored single runs in the seventh. The Rainiers went ahead again in the ninth, but Oak shortstop Russ Rose doubled in two runs in the last half of the game in the win.

Angies Win

It was whitewash in Los Angeles as Jim Brosnan and Don Elston pitched the Angels to a 4-0 win over Portland. Brosnan left the game after seven frames because of a finger blister. Elston held the Beavers hitless in his two innings on the mound.

Steve Biko, Angel first baseman, sparked the 12-hit attack on Portland pitchers Bob Alexander and Bob Hall with his 27th homer in the third, his fifth round-tripper in five games.

The Angels' win, which put them within two games of the first division, was their third of four in the Portland series and their seventh victory in the last eight starts.

Marino Pieretti, hurling a two-hitter for Sacramento, blanked Hollywood 1-0. The 33-year-old right-hander had a no-hitter going until the seventh when Lee Walls singled sharply to left.

Sportsmen Harvest Big Meat Crop

Based on current market prices, Oregon's wildlife provided over nine million dollars worth of "meat in the pot" to hunters and fishermen in 1954, according to figures released by the Oregon Game Commission.

Kill records returned by hunters and punch cards returned by fishermen show that deer provided the most meat poundage followed by salmon and steelhead, then by ducks, pheasants and elk.

The total value of the 11,248,000 pounds of meat provided by 112,480 deer harvested was \$3,961,690. Sports fishermen recorded a total of 91,683 salmon taken for a poundage of 1,375,245 and a meat value of \$1,237,720.00.

Broken down into their respective categories, big game animals provided 13,248,000 pounds of meat valued at \$5,961,690; upland game birds provided 670,750 pounds of meat which was valued at \$402,815.50; waterfowl provided 1,230,000 pounds for an \$851,000 value; and salmon and steelhead (trout) provided 1,375,245 pounds valued at \$1,237,720.00.

It is stressed that this is only the meat value of the wildlife harvested last year. It does not include expenditures made in connection with harvesting the fish, animals, and birds, and it does not consider the factor that cannot be evaluated in dollars and cents, but which most sportsmen place above all else—the recreation obtained in quest of the creatures of the wild.

For the ladies, Bev Fish had a 506 (173-173-160) series and high games were registered by Lucille Shepard, 186; Eunice Noel, 180; Del Mix, 179; Sylvia Anderson, 178, 179.
