Democrats To Win Presidency In '56, Sparkman Opines

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.) predicts the Democrats will win next year's presidential election with an upsurge of strength in the Midwest, New York and California.

Sparkman, the party's 1952 vice presidential candidate, said his travels have convinced him President Eisenhower's reputed popularity is not as great as Republicans contend.

"We can win next year's election if we put the kind of effort into the campaign that we should," he said. "It will be a different story from 1952. I don't think President Eisenhower could carry a Southern state as of today."

Sparkman said he expects Adlai Stevenson to announce this fall that he will seek the Democratic nomination again.

Sparkman said his optimism for 1956 is based primarily on what he called "dissatisfaction" in Midwest farm areas, the likely return of Dixie states to the Democratic column and a trend toward the Democrats in governor elections.

Since 1952 the Democrats have taken governorships away from the GOP in nine states.

Sparkman said he agrees with Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler that one of the principal issues in 1956 will involve what Butler called the administration's tendency to serve certain special interests.

Butler said on a television program Eisenhower has "knew himself away from the people" until only recently and has seen only "a few top-level men in his business who came to the White House dinners."

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A Miami couple with six children and another on the way were looking for an apartment or house today — as usual.

They said they had tried 135 times to rent a place since they moved here from St. Louis in January.

"You know these ads in the paper that say children are welcome?" Robert Allen said. "That's okay until they see those six kids of ours, with another on the way. That kills it."

Allen, 54, working as a \$75-a-week typewriter repairman, has moved his family into three small shacks offered rent-free by his boss, but the buildings have been condemned.

All eight Allens appeared before the Miami Commission Board of Appeals, however, and won a three-month delay in tearing down the shacks.
