Atomic Research Reactor Operated By Eisenhower

GENEVA — President Eisenhower operated an atomic research reactor Wednesday. He sat at the control panel of the reactor at United Nations European headquarters shortly before going to the summit conference.

The reactor has been assembled by the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission for display in connection with an international atomic conference next month.

Eisenhower was fascinated by operation of the research reactor, known as the "swimming pool" type. It is similar to one which he inspected last month at Pennsylvania State University, where his youngest brother, Milton, is president.

Eisenhower walked from the "pool" to the reactor control room and sat down at a panel full of pushbuttons.

A guide explained how the reactor operates and invited Eisenhower to put it into action. When the President pushed the starter button bells changed and indicators in the control room showed the reactor rods were being immersed in the "pool."

"What are we making—plutonium or what?" the President inquired.

The guide said some plutonium was being produced, "but mostly waste fissionable materials." As he watched the automatic indicators, Eisenhower laughed and said that reminded him of a thermometer which he had to watch when he worked in a creamery as a boy at Abilene, Kan.

He noted that 24 nations of the free world already have signed agreements with the United States for participation in a America's atoms-for-peace program.
