New Grass Pest Found In Oregon's Fields

CORVALLIS (AP)—Entomologists at the Oregon State College experiment station have discovered a new grass pest in Oregon fields. "This is the first time the insect, 'Miris Dolabratus,' has been found west of the Mississippi. The pest was found in Clackamas grass seed fields by a research team investigating heavy infestations of silvertop.

The experiment station reported that it is too late to try control measures this year, but that control will be developed for 1956.

Oregon's Income Tax Gather Upped

SALEM (AP)—A slight upward trend in state income tax collections was noted Tuesday by Tax Commission Chairman Ray Smith. He reported receipts for the fiscal year 1953-55 totalled \$56,822,264, compared with \$56,334,163 for 1951-53.

Personal income taxes accounted for \$42,798,459 during the two years just past compared with \$41,522,927 paid in the fiscal years 1951-53. Corporate excise tax receipts fell slightly below the previous biennium dropping from \$14,811,236 to \$14,023,805.

Smith also reported a campaign by the Tax Commission against employers who withhold taxes from employee paychecks and then fail to turn over the money immediately to the tax office. He said his department was attempting to build the auditing of employers' books up to date in order to keep a closer check.
