

Subdivision To Get Cables From Phone Co.

Pacific Telephone Co. soon will start construction of aerial and underground cables to the new West Slopes Subdivision in West Roseburg, according to Jack McGuire, exchange manager.

About 10 houses are in various stages of construction in the area, with expectations that 90 homes eventually will be built.

One, two and four-party line services will be provided by the project, which will be completed in September. About 5,300 feet of aerial and underground cable is to be installed at an estimated cost of \$4,850, McGuire said.

Ike Hands French Premier Verbal Slap At Geneva

WASHINGTON (AP)—There have been times at Geneva when President Eisenhower must have wished the French Premier, Edgar Faure, had stayed home. He slapped the Frenchman down in public Thursday.

Faure, because of his performance, is the strangest figure at the conference although representing the United States and Russia far overshadowed by Eisenhower, and the British and Russian Prime Ministers, Eden and Bulganin.

Twice—with his proposals on disarmament and European security—he seems to have set Eisenhower's teeth on edge. Americans at Geneva made it clear Eisenhower neither joined in Faure's ideas nor was happy about them.

The one on European security played into the Russians' hands before they said a word. And the Russians quickly seized on Faure's ideas about disarmament, saying they were worthy of consideration.

The Big Four should work out an inspection system to prevent cheating in any arms cut, Eisenhower followed this up by suggesting the United States and Russia exchange blueprints on their arms and permit mutual aerial checks.

But Faure followed Eisenhower with a proposal that disarmament might be achieved by budgetary controls. The Russians, with their kind of government, could conceal arms spending better than the West, if either side cheated.

And Thursday, as if to show how little he thought of Faure's idea, Eisenhower told Bulganin in front of Faure: The United States hasn't yet found a way in which budget figures can be used as a sure way to control disarmament.

Faure also envisioned an all-European system which would absorb, meaning abolish, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, the West's military alliance against Russia and its chief hope of defense.

The United States and Britain have insisted on keeping NATO. Russia has long demanded it be abolished. So Faure made about as big a concession to the Russians—before they opened their mouths in Geneva—as he could make.

And when Bulganin did speak he called for an all-European security system and the end of NATO. He went into more detail than Faure. But both men's ideas on that point wound up in the same place.

Faure opened discussion on the fourth item on the formal agenda—improving contacts between East and West.

On this matter, the President called for:

1. Removal of barriers he said are impeding the interchange of information between peoples of East and West.

2. Elimination of barriers to permit greater travel for friendly and peaceful purposes.

3. Creation of conditions to encourage exchange of goods for peaceful purposes.

Eisenhower also spoke of improving international radio communications. He said that, in some cases, there had been extreme forms of interference with such communications.

The President was said to be definitely committed to leaving Saturday evening for Washington and the summit conference was running far behind schedule.

Some quarters saw a possibility that the Eisenhower proposals might get shunted aside, along with other proposals on disarmament, German unification and European security for discussion after the summit conference.

Meanwhile, the French premier circulated a draft resolution calling for a disarmament program under a joint East-West inspection and control system. The plan apparently attempted to combine his own budgetary control ideas with British Prime Minister Eden's plan for disarmament in a limited area of Europe and with Eisenhower's call for new talks on an inspection system.

Molotov's silence on the Eisenhower proposal to exchange military information left unanswered the big question: Would Russia accept it or even promise further discussion on it?

Two Letters Involved The subcommittee is currently concerned with two letters involving facets of the Dixon-Yates controversy:

1. Adams' letter, which in effect confirmed that he had asked the Securities and Exchange Commission to put off last month a hearing on Dixon-Yates financing, at a time when the House was considering a 6½-million dollar appropriation for a transmission line to hook up TVA and the proposed Dixon-Yates plant. The House approved the item and the hearings subsequently resumed.

2. One from AEC General Manager Kenneth E. Fields to Refauser which subcommittee members contended was confirmation that Adolphe H. Wenzell served in a dual capacity as unpaid consultant to the Budget Bureau on Dixon-Yates at a time when he was an official of First Boston Corp., which later became Dixon-Yates' unpaid financial agent.
