'Forgetful' Lev May Face New Bribe Counts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate investigators today asked the Justice Department and the Internal Revenue Service to study a hearing transcript containing new bribe accusations against Harry Lev, wealthy Chicago maker of caps for the armed forces.

Forgetful Lev told the Senate Investigations subcommittee Tuesday he still cannot remember what he did with \$20,000 in cash he acknowledged withdrawing from his Chicago bank in June and July 1953.

But he insisted that "not one cent" of it went to pay bribes to help him get government contracts. The subcommittee has been digging for evidence of possible graft in the landing of profitable contracts by Lev's Mid-City Uniform

PHOTO TIPS

Aside from providing transient enjoyment, vacations usually store up lasting and pleasant memories. The camera can play an important role in keeping these memories vivid and alive.

To serve this function effectively a few suggestions, directed primarily at those traveling by auto, may be of help. An important one is to have the camera loaded and ready at all times. Often the most interesting pictures are those that turn up at unexpected moments, requiring quick action.

Because high temperatures adversely affect films, loaded cameras and film should never be kept in glove compartments, or trunks where extreme high temperatures exist. And, for the same reason, if camera and film are to be left in a closed car, it should be parked in the shade.

Dust, always plentiful on the open road, is a bane to the photographer. A carrying case will offer protection against it. Before taking pictures, it would be well to check the lens for cleanliness.

Worry is a poor vacation companion. If loss of expensive equipment is a source, insurance will eliminate it.

All in all, time spent stopping for a picture on a tour is repaid threefold: the tourists are given a needed break, enjoyment in capturing the scene is provided, and a particular high light of the trip is permanently preserved.

On the road, photo supplies usually run out at an inopportune time. It is inconvenient—at times impossible—to procure them in remote places; so, before leaving on your trip, it would be wise to come in and have us check your needs.
