Hillevi Rombin, Swedish Beauty, Gets Judges' Nod For 'Miss Universe' Title

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Miss Sweden today is Miss Universe, the world's most beautiful woman.

The judges, true to form, picked a short-haired blonde, but there was little else they could do—blonde, blue-eyed, 21-year-old Hillevi Rombin was just that beautiful.

But the race was a close one. Miss El Salvador, blonde Maribel Arrieta, was only a few points behind. The other runners up were—in this order, Ceylon, Germany and Japan.

For Miss Sweden—one of the biggest girls in the contest at 130 pounds—the title means a host of prizes, most important of which is a \$250-a-week contract at Universal-International Studios.

Hillevi is a college graduate and hails from the town of Upsala, about a half-hour's drive from Stockholm. It is Sweden's greatest university town and Miss Universe is a representative citizen. She speaks five languages.

One of the judges disclosed it was her reserved bearing, plus her intelligence, that helped swing the title to her.

How many beauty contest winners can speak five languages? She is fluent in German, French, Spanish, English and her native tongue.

For those who like statistics, her vital measurements are 36 inches in the bust and hips, and 23 in the waist.

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Deadlock Sticks; Ike Coming Home

Conference Windup Set This Evening

Unsolved Problems Left To October Meet Of Foreign Ministers

GENEVA (AP) — The Big Four leaders have agreed on the handling of all points before them, referring many of the toughest to a session of their foreign ministers in October.

The agreement was announced by James C. Hagerty of the U.S. delegation, on behalf of all four powers, shortly before the summit leaders were called into a final plenary session.

President Eisenhower, returning home Saturday night, will report to the United States on radio and television Monday night in a 15-minute address. He plans to meet congressional leaders of both parties Monday morning.

The announcement came after a day of efforts to break a stubborn deadlock to the conference could wind up on schedule.

Hagerty, who is President Eisenhower's press secretary, announced the agreement and said the leaders would meet at 6:30 p.m. to close the six-day conference formally.

There was no immediate word as to the nature of their agreements. However, it became known the foreign ministers would meet in Geneva in October.

Eligibility Of Droscher Issue In Protested Game

A decision on the eligibility of Roseburg American Legion baseball player Jerry Droscher will be reached by a board of Legion commissioners in Albany Sunday.

The question of Droscher's eligibility was raised following the Roseburg-Medford baseball series here Thursday. A Medford Legion commissioner filed a protest on the grounds that the Roseburg player had taken part in semi-pro baseball games this summer, which is a violation of Legion rules.

Droscher pitched for the Roseburg Chiefs in the first series of the Southern Oregon League season and defeated the Medford Chenev Stubs. Since Legion ball began in June, however, he has not participated in semi-pro games.

Coach Bill Harper would not comment on whether Droscher would play in the game with Albany Saturday night.

REDMOND (AP) — State Rep. Earl Hill of Cushman was injured Friday when his car plunged off the road after a tire blew out.

Sheriff's Aero Squadron Reactivation Planned

A special meeting to reactivate the Douglas County Sheriff's Aero Squadron will be held Tuesday at 8 p.m. at the sheriff's office in the courthouse, according to Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

The squadron has been inactive for some time, the sheriff pointed out.

Following activation, a joint exercise of the squadron and the Sheriff's Mounted Posse will be held, Byrd said. In the near future, the posse will make a two-day riding trip into the North Umpqua country, probably to Elk Meadows.

At that time, the aero squadron will get practice by dropping supplies to possemen, testing radio equipment and carrying out an air-to-ground communication exercise. In the exercise, a telephone will be lowered to the ground from the plane so that the fliers and men on the ground can talk to each other.

Lawrence Tucker Dies After Hardtop Victory; Autopsy Seeking Cause

An autopsy was being conducted today to determine the cause of the startling death of Lawrence Tucker, 29, Roseburg.

Tucker, a hardtop racing driver with no previous medical history of illness, died in the pits at the Roseburg Speedway Friday night, shortly after he had won the "B" main event race. He had just completed his most successful racing night of the season.

Coroner Powers said Tucker ran back to the car pits after the race and died on the spot. He said the cause of death was yet undetermined, but it was apparently an attack of some type.

Tucker had been driving a logging truck all day. He had had a job as a truck driver since June 1, Powers said. Tucker's wife said he had never complained of any illness and had shown no medical history of sickness except for arthritis.

Joe Cole, manager of the speedway, reported Tucker had been racing at the track for the last three years and was one of the most popular drivers in competition. He had consistently been among the top 10 drivers in winnings, Cole said.

Tucker was born in Lewiston, Mont., Oct. 16, 1925 and came to Roseburg first in 1928 with his parents. He resided here until 1937, when the family moved to Cottage Grove.

He enlisted in the Navy during World War II, returning to Roseburg in 1946 after his discharge. He was married to Nellie B. Tucker Nov. 19, 1947, and she survives him. The lived on Lookingglass Road.

Tucker was a member of the Pacific Racing Assn. and was employed by Upgrave Trucking Co. as a log truck driver.

Other survivors include his mother, Mrs. Elsie Tucker, Roseburg; father, Samuel Tucker, Cottage Grove; two brothers, Louis of Safford and William of Roseburg; and two sisters, Alice Tucker of Sutherlin and Mrs. Ervin (Maxine) Goetz, Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary Monday, July 25, at 2:30 p.m. with the Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Permanent Air Service Request Lists Roseburg

WASHINGTON (AP) — Permanent certification for service by West Coast Airlines has been proposed by the Civil Aeronautics Board for 25 Pacific Northwest cities. Eight others would get temporary certification.

The order, issued Friday by the CAB and subject to hearings on objections or proposals for change which may be made by the affected cities, was the first issued under recent legislation permitting certification of local service airlines.

Proposed for permanent certification: Oregon — Klamath Falls, Medford, Roseburg, North Bend-Coos Bay, Eugene, Albany-Corvallis, Portland and Astoria.

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House Cuts In Foreign Aid Bill Restored

Senate Vote Registers Victory For Ike; Torrid Joint Conference Next

WASHINGTON (AP) — A sizzling Senate-House conference on foreign aid was in prospect today after the Senate restored practically all the House cuts in President Eisenhower's bill.

The Senate stayed in session more than 12 hours to pass the \$3,205,841,750 measure Friday giving the President one of his important victories of the 1955 session. The final passage vote was 62-22.

The senators voted to restore \$567,100,000 of the slashes made by the House in the bill, granting Eisenhower all but \$60,800,000 of the sums he requested for U. S. friends throughout the world.

Defeated in the long debate were six separate attempts to make sharp cuts in the bill. All these votes cut across party lines but, reversing the traditional party roles on foreign aid, more Republicans than Democrats backed the President on the key tests.

Some of the House members insist they will not grant a penny of increase beyond what their branch originally voted — \$2,638,741,750. This compares with Eisenhower's request of \$3,286,641,750.

The Geneva summit meeting figured two ways in the Senate debate on the bill.

Some senators supporting the administration position argued nothing should be done to embarrass the President while he was at the crucial conference.

Others opposed the cuts with the argument that the smiles and friendly words of Russian leaders should not lead this country to let down for a moment in the mutual defense program it has carried on so laboriously.

Those who demanded reductions said it was now apparent foreign aid never would end unless congress chopped off the money. They said the administration has more than eight billions of unspent foreign aid money, and that three billion more was not needed.

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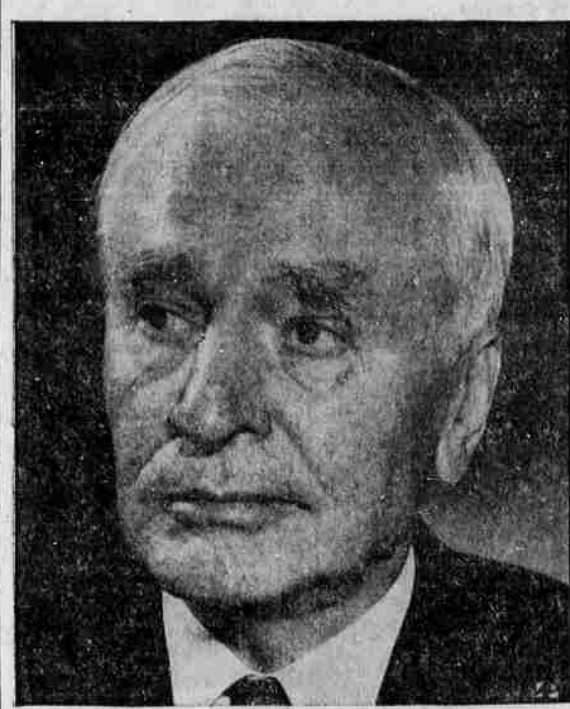
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Ex-Secretary Of State Hull, 'Father Of United Nations,' Dies After Notable Service

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cordell Hull, former secretary of state whom many hailed as "the Father of the United Nations," died Saturday. He was 83 last Oct. 2.

Death came at 9 a.m. EDT at the U.S. Naval Hospital in nearby Bethesda, Md., where the elderly statesman had been taken last March 26 after suffering a stroke in his hotel apartment. He had another stroke Friday.

Hull had long been in poor health, suffering from high blood pressure and ailments of old age. Mrs. Hull died in March 1954.

Until his stroke in March, and aside from periods of critical illness in recent years, Hull had steadily maintained an interest in national affairs.

As the original sponsor of the reciprocal trade program, going back to his days in the Senate, Hull had been especially interested in U. S. trade policy and had closely followed the ups and downs in Congress of pending legislation to carry on the trade program.

Hull, as secretary of state in three administrations of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, held the post longer than any other man in the nation's history — from March, 1933 to November, 1944.

Illness forced his retirement in the grim days of World War II, which he had labored to avert, then labored to use as a spring-

Two Teachers Resign From Yoncalla School

Principal Al Hoffman of the Yoncalla Grade School has resigned to take a principalship at Cloverdale in Tillamook County, reports correspondent Mrs. George Bess.

His wife, a teacher in the grade school, has also given her resignation. Both resignations have been accepted by the school board.

Principal Hoffman came to Yoncalla in 1941. He taught there from September of that year to February, when he enlisted in the U. S. Army.

After his discharge, he returned to Yoncalla as a teacher and has been there ever since. Mrs. Hoffman came to Yoncalla a year later and taught home economics at the high school. She married Hoffman in 1948 and a year later took a contract at Yoncalla Grade school.

Both have been active in elvise and social affairs.

Mortgages Foreclosed On Cloverdale Homes

The Federal National Mortgage Assn., through its attorney Dewey Palmer, continued to be the only bidder on foreclosed homes of the Roseburg Homes' Cloverdale Addition in Roseburg Friday.

Palmer entered bids totaling \$41,396.17. Bids represented the mortgage amounts due the federal agency, which was the plaintiff in the foreclosure actions involving almost 90 homes.

Individual bids were: \$7,114.92, \$7,542.17, \$7,169.90, \$6,699.43, \$7,227.60 and \$6,842.15.

The action on the steps of the Douglas County Courthouse in Roseburg was conducted by Paul M. Hanlin, deputy U. S. marshal from Medford.

Palmer reported Friday that six more homes will go on sale at the courthouse Aug. 2.

Four student religious groups at the University of Florida petitioned the State Board of Control to end segregation at the University. The groups represent Baptist, Methodist, Episcopal and Quaker students.

At Raleigh, N.C., the Wake County Board of Education adopted a resolution calling for racial integration beginning in September, 1956. Segregation rules would apply to regular registration this fall, but the board said any child who does not like his school assignment can apply for a transfer.

The City School Board at Chattanooga, Tenn., announced that it will integrate city schools, but no definite date was announced. The board said it will try to find a method of integration "that will be fair and just to each and every person in the community."

Declaring that activities will be conducted "lawfully and without violence," 40 community leaders organized a citizens council at Kilgore, Tex. They pledged to "assist in maintaining segregation of white and Negro people in the Kilgore area."

Truck Upsets At Spot Near Scottsburg

Victim Amos L. James; Son Taken To Hospital In Cottage Grove

The highway traffic toll for 1955 in Douglas County was boosted to 11 this morning with the death of a 41-year-old Wedderburn, Curry County, Ore., man on Highway 38, about five miles east of Scottsburg near Weatherly Creek.

The victim, involved in a one-car mishap about 6 a.m., was identified as Amos L. James. The accident sent his son, Carl, 19, to Cottage Grove Hospital for observation. An attending Dr. Drain physician said he didn't believe his injuries to be serious.

Investigating state police and deputy sheriff couldn't establish who was driving the 1954 model pickup truck, but said the driver apparently went to sleep. The pickup went out of control, turning on its side in a ditch after hitting a tree. The victim was thrown beneath the vehicle.

Dep. Coroner Vern Little, Oakland, said first man on the scene was Vernon Goodrich, Yoncalla. He said the youth flagged him to a stop to ask for help.

Young James was taken to the hospital by Drain ambulance and he's being held for observation of head injuries. The pickup was demolished.

The elder James' body was taken to Stearns & Little Mortuary, Oakland. The victim is survived by his wife, Pauline, Wedderburn.

The traffic fatality was the second for Douglas County within a week, the two deaths breaking a no-death spell of 3 1/2 months on Douglas County highways.

Boy Under Observation

Fifteen minutes later, a road crew from the Gardiner Lumber Co. was stopped and the truck lifted from James' body. Little said he apparently was dead then.

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Spirited Timber Sale Brings Nearly Twice Appraisals

Spirited bidding in Roseburg Friday by representatives of nine firms saw the winners paying \$790,384 for two tracts of Umpqua Forest timber in the Diamond Lake area, appraised at \$408,155.

Martin Bros. Box Co. of Oregon, Oakland, was successful bidder for 15,900,000 board feet of timber located 42 miles west of Chemult. The company paid \$462,465 on species appraised at \$255,915.

In a second sale for 8,200,000 board feet of timber 44 miles west of Chemult, Roseburg Lumber Co. paid \$327,920 for timber valued at \$152,240.

Eight firms competed against the Oakland firm in the first sale. Of the total of more than 15 million board feet, Martin Bros. Box Co. paid \$45.95 for 9 million feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$23. It paid appraised values on other species: \$5.65 for 6,600,000 feet of hemlock and other species, and \$38.75 for 300,000 feet of pine.

Competing for the timber were: Roseburg Lumber Co.; Donald C. Piper, Roseburg; Ellingson Lumber Co., Klamath Falls; U.S. Plywood Corp., Eugene; Di Paolo Logging Co., Eugene; Trico Timber Co., Dillard; Douglas Veneer Co., Roseburg; and R. A. Briggs & Sons, Chemult.

Roseburg Lumber Co. bid more than 2 1/2 times appraisal price on Douglas fir, and appraised price on other species to become the other winning bidder. It paid \$48 for 6,100,000 feet of Douglas fir valued at \$19.20.

Included in the total volume of 8,200,000 feet was 800,000 feet of pine appraised and sold at \$37.40, and 1,300,000 feet of hemlock and other species at \$4.

Nine other bidders were: Evans Products Co., Coos Bay; Martin Bros. Box Co., Coos Bay; Ellingson Lumber Co.; Donald C. Piper, Trico Timber Co.; R. A. Briggs & Sons; Di Paolo Logging Co., and U.S. Plywood Corp.

MEDFORD (AP) — Protests against the Southern Pacific Railroad's proposal to end passenger service on the Portland-Ashland line Aug. 7 grew Friday.

Live Oak Grange, first of the subordinate granges to speak on the matter, said the service is needed.

William Patton, manager of the Oregon Shakespeare Festival at Ashland, said in a letter to the state Public Utilities Commission the proposal to quit was a continuation of the railroad's "rough-shod policies" which have offended tourists in past years.
