She has selected courses in English Literature, swimming and dances of Hawaii for her summer study.

Each year an increasing number of students from mainland United States, representing nearly every state of the Union, come to Hawaii to participate in the summer program of the University. About one-fourth of the summer enrollment is from the mainland and fourteen foreign countries are also represented.

The University of Hawaii, which is a fully accredited institution of higher learning, is not far from some of the Islands' finest beaches, making it possible for students to enjoy surf and sunshine after a morning of classes and study.
