Autopsy Set In Race Death

Hardtop auto race driver Larry Tucker won the B main event, his second major first place win at Friday night's auto races, then collapsed, from an undetermined attack, and died in the car on the Roseburg Speedway last night.

The 29-year-old driver was talking to other drivers in the pits immediately after the B main when he fell backwards to the ground. An ambulance was summoned and he was removed from the scene.

The body was received at the Douglas Community Hospital at 11:08 p.m. An autopsy was to be performed to determine the exact cause of death.

Earlier in the evening, the Roseburg driver had won the B trophy dash and had placed second in the second heat race.

He was one of the season's top drivers, holding tenth position among the local track's top ten drivers for the season. He had driven here since the track's inception in 1953. His car number was 54.

It was the second fatality among racing personnel in two years at the track.

Last summer a pitman, William Reed, was killed when hit by a flying wheel as he stood in the driver's pits.

Larry Tucker Precedes His Death With Two Wins, 2nd-Place Finish

Friday night's hardtop auto races at the Roseburg speedway would have been driver Larry Tucker's most successful of the season before he collapsed and died following a first place finish in the B main event.

The Roseburg driver won both the B main and the B trophy dash and laced second in the second heat race.

Between Tucker's victories, drivers Louis Donelan and Del Graves continued to steal the thunder in the race for top money for the season.

Donelan captured the night's top prize with a first place finish in the A main event. He also took first in the third heat race.

Graves, in a tremendous mid-season surge of scoring, won the A trophy dash and the fourth heat race, and set a new track lap record of 18.01 in the process.

Graves currently holds down third spot among the hardtop scorers, while Donelan is first.

Other first placers Friday night were Don Hein in the first heat race and Jack Beavers in the second heat. Jean Godfrey won the special event race to conclude the show.

Twelve victories in the last 16 games have got the Go-Go Sox going, yet Marty's starters have managed only four complete games in the surge.

It's been the bullpen boys who have kept Chicago within reach for late rallies — and who have made early leads stand up.

It was that way again last night when the Sox thumped Boston 10-7 and took the American League lead by two percentage points over the New York Yankees. The Yanks were made fully aware of their plight by losing to Kansas City 3-1 after the A's had lost 10 straight.

The Sox belted Boston for five runs in the first and five in the third, till, Marion had to go to the relief staff, calling in Mike Fornieles and finally Morrie Martin to pull it off. Martin received credit for the victory by checking the Sox on one hit last three innings.

Reese was given a "night" in Ebbets Field last night and what a night it turned out to be. A crowd of 33,003, largest of the season, turned out to honor the Brooklyn captain, who helped the celebration along by contributing two doubles to the Brooks' 8-4 victory over Milwaukee.

Reese, who celebrates his 36th birthday today was headed down with a staggering array of gifts from fans. Brooklyn merchants and a moving company in the borough said it would move everything free to Reese's home in Louisville, Ky.

He had his pick of seven different make cars. His 11-year-old daughter, Barbara, selected a key out of a bowl. Each of the cars was driven up to her until the key was in one. That was the new Reese car.

Dozens of telegrams were read over the loudspeaker, including one from Vice President Nixon. Dodger President Walter O'Malley said later he had received a cablegram from President Eisenhower wishing Reese well.

Indian Club Launches Drive To Raise Grandstand Funds

Plans for constructing a new football grandstand at Finlay Field are being negotiated between the promoting Indian Club of Roseburg and the Roseburg school board following a meeting between the two groups Friday.

Indian Club representatives announced that they had explained plans for the project to school board members and they are planning to start construction the moment \$2,000 cash is raised.

A fund-raising campaign is now under way. Donations entitle purchasers to a football preference card which in turn entitles the owner to preference for season tickets to Roseburg High school football games for the next 10 years.

Other committee chairmen from the club reported to the school board.

Bob Dishman, chairman of the building committee for the stands, outlined the plans for the grandstand and the pledges that had been received for construction. Harold Backen reported on the lighting project, revealing that a pledge to donate labor to straighten and correct present lighting facilities had been received from Copco.

Bill Garrison, secretary-treasurer of the club, reported on ticket sales and distribution.

Poachers Blast Pool At Falls To Get Salmon

The Oregon Game Commission salvaged a number of adult salmon and steelhead from the pool below South Umpqua Falls, ahead of blasting operations. But the commission has good reason to believe someone took out a lot of fish before the salvage crew arrived.

William E. Pitney, field biologist in charge of Umpqua River studies, reports that salvage crews took 62 adult spring chinooks and eight steelhead from the pool under the falls. Removal was made necessary because of preparations for a large blast soon to be set off to remove rock during construction of the spillway over the falls. The game commission is dynamiting "steps" into the rock of the river bed to make it easier for fish to reach the upper river. It is expected the fishway will greatly increase the river's spawning capacity. Many fish at present are unable to negotiate the falls, particularly after the water level drops in late spring.

In salvaging fish from the pool, water was diverted by sandbags into a new channel. A dam also was built at the lower end of the pool. Water then was pumped out and big fish removed, together with a number of trout.

The fish taken by the salvage crew were removed to a point a safe distance downstream from the site of the blast.

Evidence was found, Pitney reports, that the pool had been dynamited by poachers earlier in the season. In addition to signs of explosions, the crew found a bomb containing three sticks of unexploded dynamite.

While the Chiefs are arguing with the second-place Coquille ball club, Drains Black Sox, riding the crest of the loop, draw a league bye. The Sox have scheduled a pair of non-leaguers, however, meeting Archer Blower in Portland Saturday night and at Drain Sunday.

In other SOL action this weekend, Grants Pass and Medford, tied for fourth spot in the circuit, meet in home-and-home games while third-place Bend skips to Bandon to meet the sixth-place Millers in a pair.

ULLSWATER, England (AP) — Donald Campbell broke the world's water speed record Saturday, setting a mark of 202.32 miles an hour.

The 24-year-old speed king raced his turbojet Bluebird over the water of Ullswater Lake to break the old record of 178.4 miles an hour set by American Stanley Sayres three years ago.

Campbell, son of the late auto and boat speeder Sir Malcolm Campbell, set the new mark before a small crowd that only got a glimpse of his Bluebird in the spray.

Two men had died trying to break the record since Sayres set it on Lake Washington.

Semifinal Clash Slated In Albany Tonight At 8

Roseburg and Albany American Junior League baseball teams meet in the first two games of a best-of-three-game semifinal series at Albany Saturday and Sunday. A third game, if necessary, will be played next Thursday evening at Finlay Field.

Roseburg's Southern Oregon titlists depart for the scene of play Saturday morning and will return Sunday evening. Coach Bill Harper will embark on the trail with the same 13-member team that has compiled a 12-1 record this season.

Harper named as a probable Saturday night pitching nominee, Dick Smith, winner of five contests this season. Harper would not name a possible Sunday pitching starter.

Winner of this series meets either Grant of Portland or The Dalles in a series next week to determine the state champion.

Robinson Wins Split Decision

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson, fit as a fiddle and raring to go, figures he's ready to bid for the middleweight championship he gave up three years ago for the song-and-dance business.

The 140-pound veteran, punching with both fists, got off his knees last night in the Cow Palace ring to pound out a 10-round decision over No. 1 contender Rocky Castellani in the top effort of his comeback bid. A crowd of 8,230 which paid \$39,819 greeted the split decision with ringing applause.

Robinson, 3-2-1 underdog at the bell, earned the nod from Referee Jack Downey and Jim Frank Carter by 56-64 scores; Judge Jack Silver had Castellani the winner by the same score. The Associated Press card showed Robinson on top, 57-53.

"I'd like to fight (Bobo) Olson if the public wants the match," Robinson said.

Sid Flaherty, the middleweight champion's manager, indicated before the fight that the winner would be given a shot at the title "if terms can be arranged and the price is right."

Robinson surprised the crowd by coming out swinging with both fists at the opening bell and carrying the attack most of the way against his younger foe. The one-time twin titlist, concentrating primarily on Castellani's body, upset the odds with his pressing offensive and at the final bell looked in better shape than his opponent.

Only once did Robinson falter. In the sixth round Castellani caught him with a left hook and a straight right to the head. Robinson made a three-point landing, on his knees and one hand, then straightened up and took a nine-count on both knees. Castellani was on him immediately in his own corner, but Robinson fought his way out and knocked Rocky to the floor momentarily near the end of the round. There was no count.

Castellani was down twice in the seventh, but bounced up without a count both times. The second time he was ruled a slip, apparently when he missed a looping left and lost his footing.
