DiMaggio Gains Hall Of Fame

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (AP)—Baseball's Hall of Fame opened its doors to Joe DiMaggio and five other immortals today.

Ford Frick, commissioner of baseball, was scheduled as principal speaker at the unveiling of plaques to DiMaggio, Leo (Gabby) Hartnett, Ted Lyons, Dazzy Vance, Frank (Home Run) Baker and Ray Schalk.

The first four were elected last January by 10-year veterans of the Baseball Writers Assn. and the latter two were appointed by the Hall of Fame Committee on Veterans.

Also on the day's program were the annual major league exhibition game at Doubleday Field, pitting the Boston Red Sox against the Milwaukee Braves this year, and presentation by Maj. Ross J. Young of a certificate to young Billy Capper of San Diego as the outstanding American Legion junior player of 1954.

Tag Champions Upset At Armory

There was no title at stake at the Armory Saturday night, and it was a good thing for Killer Kameronoff and Dirty Doug Donovan, the Northwest tag team kingpins.

A referee's disqualification cost the titleholders the main event match with upstarts Luigi Macera and Johnny Foti. The winners were awarded the match by referee John Arjon when Donovan applied an atomic drop to Macera before the bell starting the third fall.

Kameronoff had given his team a one-fall lead in the match with the treacherous hangman's hold on Foti at 24:46. Macera evened the count by taking Kameronoff, 13 minutes and 40 seconds later, on a backbreaker.

Referee Arjon's decision also decided the evening's semifinal between George Drake and Gory Guerrero.

Guerrero was given the match by Arjon when Drake refused to release a choke hold.

Drake took the first fall over his rival with a corkscrew arm lock at 11:41. The evener came when Guerrero dropped a n and pressed Drake at 7:19.

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Locals Collect Two Straight Wins From Defending State Champions

In a pair of wild skirmishes, Roseburg's Lockwood Motors American Legion Junior baseball team swept a two-game state championship semifinal series from defending titlist Albany Saturday and Sunday to gain a berth in the state finals this weekend.

Playing in Albany's 1,300-seat Memorial Stadium, the locals won 7-4 before 462 fans Saturday night and then clinched the best-of-three game set with a thrilling 10-8 11-inning success Sunday afternoon before a crowd of about 350.

Roseburg's right-handed mound ace, Dick Smith and Jerry Droscher, delivered the wins. Smith fired a four-hitter over the nine-inning route in the series

both coaches in their dugouts over the eligibility of Droscher.

Agreement was finally reached that the Roseburg hurler should not be ruled ineligible for Legion ball after having taken part in a pre-season semi-pro baseball game. Droscher did not take part in Saturday night's game when action on his eligibility was pending.

Bad Fielding Hurts

Faulty play afield kept the Lockwoods in trouble through much of Saturday night's game. Albany, acting as visiting team, took a 3-0 lead in the top of the sixth inning and a shaken Roseburg team, stunned by the apparent ineligibility of pitcher Jerry Droscher, had already committed six errors.

Roseburg gamely came back with a three-run sixth inning to tie it up and then struck back with seventh frame that sewed up the game.

Durable Dick Smith, meanwhile, worked easily, scattering four hits over the final six innings of play, giving up one earned run on a 3-40 home run by big Don Stamps over the left field wall in the sixth inning.

Stamps also scored Renny Moye who had reached base ahead of him on an error.

Smith struck out seven batters, walked one and hit one batter.

A single and three errors on one play allowed Albany's Mike Moore to circle the bases for the game's opening run in the fifth inning.

Centerfielder Gene Polley misplayed the hopping ball. Moore drove toward third base and Hargis' relay got through third baseman Lindbloom. Lindbloom played the ball off the grandstand and fired over catcher Rudzik's head at the plate as Moore headed home.

Defense Wavers

The Albany defense, which had played sharply for five innings, finally wavered in the sixth. An error, two hits, a walk and some quick thinking by Lindbloom tied it 3-3.

Hargis walked, Oerding got life on the third baseman's error, and Lindbloom singled on a liner to center field scoring Hargis. Both runners advanced on the throw to the plate. Bobby McClellan singled to the second baseman, and both Oerding and Lindbloom scored as the Albany infielder held the ball.

Roseburg won the game in the seventh on some well-executed strategy.

Smith got on base via an error after one was out. All runners were safe as both Polley and Hargis batted successfully down the third-base line. After Oerding had fanned, Rudzik blooped a double down the right field line to clean the bases. Lindbloom then followed with an identical hit to score Rudzik.

Albany's final run in the eighth came after Hargis' error allowed batter Pat Emmons to reach second base. Stamps' single scored Emmons.

Leading hitters for Roseburg were Lindbloom with 2-4, Polley with 2-5 and McClellan with 1-3.

Roof Collapses

Lefthander Bill Oerding held Albany in check for the first four innings as the locals took a commanding 7-1 lead in Sunday's game. But the roof collapsed on the Roseburg starter in the fifth inning when Albany scored five runs.

Coach Bill Harper retired Oerding after Jim Richards' two-run homer over the left field fence, then called on Jerry Droscher to halt the uprising.

Droscher retired the side, but lost the lead when he gave up two unearned runs in the sixth frame. Obviously affected by the ineligibility ruling which had just been lifted, Droscher walked three of the first six batters to face him to stay in hot water.

The 17-year-old ace retained her crown with a 5 and 4 victory over Mrs. Dale Hills of Rose City. It gave Carole Jo her third title in five weeks. Previously, she had won the Oregon Junior and Oregon Amateur championships.

The Rose City golfer held Miss Kabler to a 2-up morning lead but sank before a blistering attack on the third nine to go 6 down at the final turn. She rallied briefly on the closing nine, but it was too late.

Miss Kabler shot a two-over par 41 on the front nine in the morning to take a 1-up advantage over Mrs. Hills. Then extended it with a winning par five on the 10th and a birdie three on the 14th.

Carole Jo drove into the water at the 15th, however, and the next three holes were halved.

She had a three-over 79 in the morning. Mrs. Hills had an 81.

Kabler equalled par for the first time in the week-long tourney on the third nine with a 39. She canned a 20-footer for a deuce at the 29th to go 6-up.

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Roseburg Chiefs Stagger Coquille In Two Straight Games, 3-2 And 4-1

After six straight lickings, Roseburg's Chiefs returned to the victory column in the Southern Oregon League Saturday and Sunday on 3-2 and 4-1 decisions over second-place Coquille.

The Chiefs turned in their best performances since an early-season double win over Medford, registering their fifth and sixth league wins behind the capable pitching of Dan Feller and Ron Whittaker.

In winning, Manager Hal Zurcher's forces turned back the Loggers at their own specialty — pitching. Earlier in the season, Coquille beat the Chiefs in 11-9 and 7-3 games. The weekend wins lifted the Chiefs from the league cellar.

Feller, Ferrell Shine
Four-hit pitching by Feller and four-for-four batting by John Ferrell was the final undoing of the Loggers in Saturday night's 3-2 contest at Finlay Field. The following were too much for Coquille.

Feller struck out seven and walked four on defense, while Ferrell batted in the winning run in the bottom of the sixth inning. Ferrell hit for two bases after Larry Buss had reached base on a fielder's choice.

In the first inning, Buss walked. Ferrell singled and Buss scored on an overthrow at third base. Coquille took a 2-1 lead in the

second frame on a walk, a single by Don Mallotte, a sacrifice and a one base hit by Lou Villecasusa.

Roseburg scored the tying run in the third when Ferrell singled, Dan Luby, Les Winders and Dick Weaver walked in succession.

Whittaker held the Loggers in check on a five-hitter Sunday at Coquille as the Chiefs rallied behind him for a 4-1 triumph. The blond righthander walked but one batsman while fanning five.

Roseburg scored twice in each of the third and eighth innings. Coquille mustered one run in the third frame.

In the Roseburg third, Jerry Gregg and Dan Luby singled and Jerry Waldrop drew a pass to load

the sacks. Winders responded with a two-run safety to left field to score two.

Coquille came back with its only run in the third when Villecasusa and Pilgrim singled, moved up a base on Roy Harrington's sacrifice and the Roseburg infield allowed Villecasusa to score on a fielder's choice.

Coquille's only other threat in the game came in the ninth when runners reached second and third bases, but Villecasusa's popout ended the game. He was Coquille's leading batter with 2-4.

Roseburg's two-run eighth was helped by two errors. Weaver and Nick Ladeas took third and second base respectively on the misplays. Whittaker scored Weaver on a fly-out to center field and Buss tallied Ladeas with a single.

Luby and Winders led Roseburg hitting with 2-5 apiece.
