Cleveland's defending champion Indians, supported by baseball's best bullpen, appear to be poised for the stretch run which they hope will bring them their second successive American League pennant.

Eight games off the pace exactly three weeks ago, the stubborn Red Sox were within one game of the top today after a streak that has produced 15 losses in their last 22 games, the last five of them in a row.

Wins Two
Cleveland won two from Baltimore yesterday 5-1 and 5-2 and once again it was the brilliant co-pitching of Noodles and Don Mossi, the "Blank-Blank Boys," that cemented the victories.

Bob Feller won his third of the season and 265th of his career, in the opener, but it took three scoreless relief innings by Noodles to save the victory for him. Early Wynn registered his 12th of the year and 297th of his career but he needed help from Noodles and squeaked a ninth-inning Baltimore rally, Noodles getting one batter on a popout and Mossi fanning rookie Bob Hale who made five hits in the double-header to end the game.

Noodles, who has now been in 35 games, has a 6-0 record. In his last 18 appearances, the Indians have won 15. Mossi has only a 2-1 record in 21 games but he owns a spectacular 1.71 earned run average, best on the club.

Reagan First
The New York Yankees regained first place with a 7-3 and 2-0 double-header victory over Kansas City to end an alarming downhill slide that brought 13 defeats in the last 18 games. The twin triumphs boosted them to a full game over the Indians and Chicago White Sox, who were held to a split by the fourth-place Boston Red Sox.

The White Sox, who started the day in first place, three percentage points above the Yankees, shut out the Red Sox 4-0 in the opener behind the seven-hit pitching of Billy Pierce but Boston struck back with a 2-1 victory behind Willard Nixon to stay right in there, only four games off the pace.

Commission Reports Final Hunting Rules

PORTLAND (AP)—Eastern Oregon hunters will be permitted to shoot only at bucks with forked antlers in the forthcoming deer season, the State Game Commission has announced.

This was one of the few changes from tentative regulations which were announced as the commission set final rules Saturday. The tentative regulations would have permitted Eastern Oregon hunters to shoot at bucks if they had any antlers at all.

The regular deer season was announced as Oct. 1-14. The general elk season will be Oct. 29-Nov. 23 in Eastern Oregon and the Cascade area, and from Oct. 29 to Nov. 12 in the coastal region.

The either sex season, for hunters with unused tags, will run in Eastern and Western Oregon from Oct. 15 to 21 and in portions of Central Oregon, including the Metolius River region, from Oct. 18 to 21.

Several changes were made in the special controlled elk hunts. In Walla Walla county's Sled Springs area, the boundary lines were cut to exclude about one-third of the area proposed earlier. The number of permits was reduced from 400 to 200.

In the Cheshinnum, Wenaha, Walla Walla, Umatilla, Ukiab, Starkey, Heppner, Minam and Desolation units, the taking of either sex elk by permits will be Nov. 11-23. In addition, the number of permits was reduced from 400 to 200 in the Wenaha unit and from 600 to 400 in the Walla Walla unit. There will be no special hunt in the Burnt River area.

The season for the antelope hunts will be Aug. 27-31 with 200 permits for each of three areas.

The pheasant season will be Oct. 22-Nov. 13 throughout the state, with the taking of four cocks per day but not more than 12 in possession at any one time. Because of the late spring and extremely poor nesting conditions this summer, the commission decided against the taking of hen pheasants in northern Malheur County, as proposed in the tentative regulations.

The season for Valley and Bobwhite quail in Western Oregon will be Oct. 22-Nov. 13 with the exception of Clatsop and Marion counties where there will be no open season.

All areas of Western Oregon will be open for the taking of mountain quail Sept. 10-18. Bag limits for quail in Western Oregon will be five per day and not over 10 in possession. There will be no open season for Hungarian partridge in Western Oregon.

In Eastern Oregon, the season for Hungarian Partridge, Valley quail and mountain quail will run concurrent with the pheasant season with a bag limit of 10 per day and not over 20 in possession in the aggregate.

Mourning doves may be taken Sept. 1-23 with a bag limit of 10 per day or in possession, and the band-tailed pigeon season will be Sept. 1-30 with a bag limit of six per day but not more than 24 for the season.

Migratory waterfowl regulations are expected to be announced by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service sometime in August.

A complete synopsis of the 1955 regulations will be available from the Game Commission and its license agencies about September 1.

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
