Final School Polio Shots Set In Oregon This Week

PORTLAND, Ore. — Oregon can begin to wind up its school polio inoculation program this week. The last needed shipment of vaccine left the Pitman-Moore Co. of Indianapolis last week for Oregon, Mark Howard of the State Board of Health said.

It contains 18,000 shots destined for Lane, Marion and Multnomah counties and for Portland. These are the only areas needing more vaccine to finish the mass inoculation program, Howard said.

There is enough vaccine to give second shots to those children taking part in the program and to give booster shots to those who took part in the field trials last year.

Local health officials are to get the vaccine from the state board, then make arrangements for the final round of shots.

Howard said the board's investigation showed the Pitman-Moore Co. to have an excellent record in vaccines.

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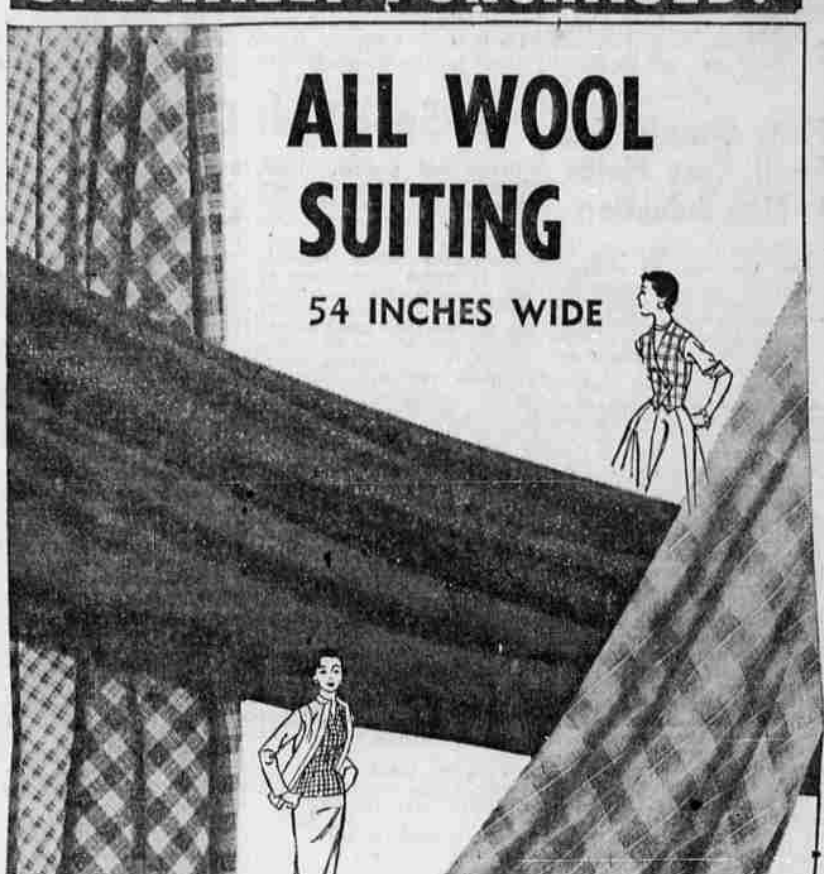
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
