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actively with the Soviets and any other people as long as there is sincerity of purpose and a genuine desire to go ahead.

2. "A growing realization by all"—including the Soviets—"that nuclear warfare pursued to the ultimate could be practically race suicide."

3. "A realization that negotiations can be conducted without propaganda and threats and incentives."

4. "A better understanding and a closer unity among the nations of NATO."

Without visible emotion, he spoke of the diplomatic surprise he scored at Geneva—his proposal that this country and the Soviet Union exchange military blueprints and permit aerial photographing of each other's military facilities.

"The principal purpose, of course, was to convince everyone of Western sincerity in seeking peace," he said. "But another idea was this:

"If we could go ahead and establish this kind of inspection as an initiation of an inspection system, we could possibly develop it into a broader one and eventually build on it an effective and durable disarmament system."

Germany Problem Tough "Probably no question caused us as much trouble," he said, "as that of German reunification and European security."

"At first we thought that these could be dealt with separately, but the American delegation concluded that they had to be dealt with as one subject. We held that Germany should be reunited under a government freely chosen by themselves and under conditions that would provide security, both for nations of the East and for nations of the West."

"The Russians, at Geneva, apparently withdrew their objections to Western Germany's membership in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, at least for the time being. They showed no sign of backing down, however, on their opposition to a united Germany as part of the Western security system."

Oakland, Sutherland Ask Additional Postal Room

Sen. Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon reports he has asked the Public Works subcommittee on government buildings to inquire into the need for additional post office buildings or facilities at Oakland and Sutherland.

He also asked for similar action in the cases of Portland, Pendleton, Heppner, Hermiston, Prineville, Redmond and Enterprise.

Neuberger said he is making the request as the result of complaints or statements from residents of the nine communities that the post office facilities should be expanded. He said the committee would probably request both the Post Office Dept. and the Government Services Administration to file reports on the needs of the nine towns.

Neuberger said he had been assured by Sen. W. Stuart Symington of Missouri, chairman of the subcommittee, that he was ordering the committee staff to report back on situations concerning space and accommodations in the nine cities.

Red China Still Knocks At United Nations Door

TOKYO (AP) — Peiping Radio broadcast Tuesday repeated insistence on the need for negotiation on the questions of Formosa and Red China's admission into the United Nations.

The broadcast of Red Chinese newspaper editorial comments followed a Communist Chinese correspondent's report from Geneva saying that these questions should be "settled through consultation among the countries concerned."

The Geneva report of the New China News Agency, broadcast by Peiping, said U. S. obstruction prevented discussion by the Big Four conference of Formosa and Red China's entry into the U.N.

"After the Geneva conference, there is every reason to demand that these questions be settled through consultation among the countries concerned and in accordance with the spirit of Geneva."

Small Lumber Firms Face Log Supply Limit

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possible to maintain current records on timber inventories through the five-year survey, during which the larger figure was tallied.

The 15 billion feet actually stands on 577,000 acres. The rest of the land area included is of less valuable pole stands, reproduction land and cutover land.

There's no quick way of figuring timber volume held by various timber companies, but a picture of the situation may be seen in a breakdown of lands in the ownership or held-on-purchase contracts by some of the larger firms.

Acquire Ownership Shown

The approximate acreages are in the ownership of the following firms:

Weyerhaeuser Timber Corp., 151,000; Roseburg Lumber Co., 43,900; U. S. Plywood Corp., 24,150; Umpqua Plywood Corp. and Fir Manufacturing Co., 21,200; Barber Paul and Markham, 21,100; Whipple interests near Drain, 20,500; E. K. Wood Lumber Co., 20,100; Harold Woolley and Smith River Lumber Co., 16,800; Robert Dollar Co., 15,800; Martin Bros. Box Co., 15,200; North Umpqua Timber Corp., 13,850; Menasha Woodware, 10,300; Crown-Zellerbach, 10,000; Harior Plywood Corp., 7,100; C&D Lumber Co., 5,700; and Thornton-Oar Creek Lumber Co., 5,150.

In addition, several have purchase contracts with the county. Included are: Roseburg Lumber Co. associates and subsidiaries, 50,600; Robert Dollar Co., 19,850; Umpqua Plywood Corp., 15,200; North Umpqua Timber Corp., 6,100; C&D Lumber Co., 5,700; Whipple, 7,900; Thornton-Oar Creek, 5,300; Harold Woolley, 4,200.

One other not listed above is Bell Lumber Co. which has about 80,000 acres of timber held privately through ownership and on contract with the county.

Pre-inventory In Progress

All figures were either taken from the county tax rolls or obtained by DeVoe from a few of the operators. Some large operators may not be listed because of the complex problem of tallying ownerships.

But the above acreages total to just short of 600,000 acres of timberland. And that's just short of 75 per cent of all the privately owned timberland in the county, with just 17 firms in control.

Left annually will be about 255 million board feet in the Umpqua National Forest and 120 million feet in O&C lands managed by Roseburg District foresters of the Bureau of Land Management.

These are the annual allowable cuts in the sustained yield programs of the agencies.

Vondis Miller, supervisor of the Umpqua forest, said a re-inventory of the forest is being conducted. It's expected the allowable cut will be increased slightly because of added salvage in intermediate cuttings. Old inventories were based on utilization standards different from those in use today.

Other timber within the county is located in the Elliott State Forest and the Siuslaw, Willamette, Rogue River and Siskiyou National forests.

American Turncoats Facing Arrest

Enemy Aid Charge Filed By Pentagon

Action Stems From Information Furnished By Other Ex-POWs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Immediate arrest aboard ship at San Francisco and court-martial later await three young American turncoats coming home from Red China.

Pentagon officials said Monday Army officers will board the ship, a passenger liner, when it docks at San Francisco next Friday and make the arrests there.

The three are William C. Cowart, 22, Dalton, Ga.; Lewis W. Griggs, 22, Jacksonville, Tex.; and Otto J. Bell, 24, Hillsboro, Miss., and Olympia, Wash.

Captured during the Korean War, they refused repatriation in 1953 and decided instead to go to Red China with 18 other Allied soldiers. After a year and a half there, the returning trio persuaded the Chinese to let them come home.

At Hong Kong earlier this month, all three said they were willing to serve time in American prisons if necessary, to pay for their "mistakes."

The Pentagon said they will be held on various charges, including aiding the enemy and misconduct as prisoners. The Army will emphasize that the arrests have nothing to do with the fact that the three originally refused to come home. The Army bases its case on information from other former American prisoners.

Legal Questions Posed

The men will be told they may see any members of their families who are in San Francisco to meet them. But they cannot go home with their families.

Officials said the line of action concerning the trio was chosen after consultations with the State and Justice departments.

Their return stirred up some big legal questions.

All three have been given dishonorable discharges on orders of Secretary of Defense Wilson. However, the Military Code of Justice says dishonorable discharges can be ordered only after a conviction and sentence by a general court-martial, with the defendant present.

Military sources say there thus exists a question whether the three were legally returned to civilian life.

And then there is the question of military jurisdiction over former soldiers in relation to offenses committed in uniform.

Youth, Four Pals Steal Dad's \$82,000 Savings

DAYTON, Ohio, (AP)—Frederick Carl Frowein, 16, has been charged with grand larceny along with four other youths in the theft of \$82,000 from the home of his father.

Fred Frowein, 45-year-old Dayton baker, saved the money for 17 years and hid it in three buckets in his basement. Last Friday, he discovered it was gone. Police said his oldest son admitted taking \$1,350, and four other boys shared the rest.

Another teen-ager involved in the July 15 burglary, Carl Cook, 19, of Dayton, has surrendered to Indiana authorities. He said he was also surrendering \$19,920.

Six other juveniles, two of them girls, were released by police after questioning, but ordered to appear later as witnesses.

Douglas 4-H Club Members Leave For Bridge Camp

Thirty-nine Douglas County 4-H club members left Roseburg Tuesday morning enroute to Camp Myrtlewood.

They join nearly 100 other 4-H'ers from Curry and Coos counties, all between the ages of 9 and 12. Activities at the five-day session are supervised by county extension agents in 4-H club work.

The youngsters receive instruction in camp cookery, wild-life, entomology ("bugs"), forestry, first aid, crafts, swimming and programming. Slated to teach them are experts from the Oregon Wheat Commission, the Oregon State Fish and Wildlife Service and Oregon State College, in addition to the county agents.

A senior camp for clubbers aged 12 to 18 will be held next week. It starts Monday and ends Saturday. A similar program on an advanced level is planned then.

Camp Myrtlewood is situated at Bridge near Highway 42 between Roseburg and Myrtle Point. On hand to help the agents during the two-week session are a nurse and cook and several junior counselors.

Scheduled to serve as junior counselors during the first week are Gail Briner, Scotts Valley; Rolie Tandy, Umpqua; and Judy Connor, Days Creek. Counselors during the second week are Nancy Roberts, Green; Joe Sand, Melrose; and Joanne Sheppard, Myrtle Creek.

'Mother Of Nile' Missionary Will Speak In Roseburg

A world-famed missionary for the Assemblies of God will speak in Roseburg Wednesday night. She is Miss Lillian Trasher, 71, known to many as the "Mother of the Nile." Miss Trasher has been a missionary for the past 45 years. She has won international fame for her work in Egypt.

For the last 25 years she has been associated with the Assemblies of God. She will appear at the Assembly of God Church, 948 W. First St., Roseburg, at 7:45 p.m. The meeting is open to the public.

Miss Trasher has written of her experiences as a "mother to 8,000 Egyptian orphans and widows." Stories of her work have appeared in the American Magazine and the Readers Digest.

Both magazines have referred to her as the "greatest woman in Egypt," according to local church member Mrs. James Stovall.

This is Miss Trasher's first visit to the United States in 25 years. She is making only two stops in Oregon, Mrs. Stovall said. She appeared earlier this year in Portland.

In Roseburg she will show her film, "Mother of the Nile." It tells the story of her work in Egypt. She will arrive in Roseburg at 1:30 p.m. via airplane.

Death Of Reedsport Recluse Due To Fall

The body of a 58-year-old recluse was found Monday at Reedsport in an old sawmill. Coroner L. L. Powers said he had been dead since Friday night or Saturday.

The body of Carl B. Blankenship, 58, apparently of Blakely, Ore., was found by Ray Chambers of Reedsport on the first floor of the old Umpqua mill.

Powers said the man had apparently been living alone in the abandoned mill. He said it appeared the man had stumbled through an 8-foot hole in the second floor ceiling and fallen to the floor of the first. Death resulted from the fall, Powers indicated.

He said death was the result of an apparent skull fracture. The accident was investigated by a deputy sheriff and Reedsport city police and the coroner's office.
