

Sen. Neuberger Proposes McNary Monument

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) Monday proposed a monument be erected on the Capitol grounds to honor former Sen. Charles McNary (R-Ore).

"The people of the Northwest have a constant reminder of the courage and wisdom of Senator McNary in the steel and concrete

of the Columbia River dam which bears his name," the senator said.

"However, another memorial is fitting in the locale where he rendered his distinguished service to the nation and to mankind."

Neuberger suggested Dr. Charles D. Byrnes of Eugene, Ore., retired chancellor of the Oregon Board of Higher Education, as a possible choice for chairman of a McNary memorial committee.

The idea of a McNary memorial was put forward on the Senate floor during consideration of a resolution to authorize placement of a 110-foot bell tower on the Capitol grounds to honor the late Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio).

Neuberger, at that time, drew from Sen. Green (D-RI), chairman of the Rules Committee, a statement that the Taft resolution might be used as a "precedent."

for a proposal similarly to honor McNary. Sen. Chavez (D-NM) said he thought the career of the late Sen. McNary merited a monument on the Capitol grounds.

In a statement Monday, Neuberger said he felt it probable that a McNary memorial would have to be of more modest proportions with respect to size and cost than that proposed for Taft, but added:

"Senator McNary was a kindly man of simple tastes, and I think even a marble bird bath or small fountain might properly symbolize his abiding interest in the outdoors, wildlife and our priceless water resources."

McNary served in the Senate from Oregon for 28 years, during part of which time he was Republican minority leader.

Internal Strife Besets Chinese Reds, Report

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The official Central Daily News predicted here that large-scale purges would take place in Red China.

It based this prediction on the purge of Hu Feng, prominent figure in the Chinese Communist literary world, and Pan Han-nien, deputy mayor of Shanghai.

There were indications, the newspaper said, that internal strife within the Chinese Communist party was becoming sharper and sharper and that dissatisfaction with the Red regime was becoming more manifest.

U.S., Red China Will Discuss Repatriation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and Red China will send ambassadors to Geneva next Monday to discuss "repatriation of civilians" who want to return to their own countries and "certain other practical matters now at issue."

The State Department announcement Monday said U. Alexis Johnson, ambassador to Czechoslovakia, would represent the United States. Johnson is to fly to Washington for quick consultations with Secretary of State Dulles before the talks begin.

Henry Syrdam, State Department press officer, reported India and Burma had arranged for the meeting in backstage discussions with Red China and the United States.

The "major purpose" of the Geneva meeting from the American view, Syrdam said, will be to obtain the release of some 51 Americans held in Red China, including 11 American fliers.

The department in a separate announcement emphasized that keying the talks to the ambassadorial level does not in any way "involve diplomatic recognition" of Red China.
