

Work Begins On Roseburg High Grandstand

Indian Club's First Project Gets Results

A first active step toward building a new football grandstand at Finlay Field was taken today with the removal of old bleacher sections from the south side of the field and the start of surface grading.

Indian Club Secretary-Treasurer Bill Garrison, presiding at Tuesday night's meeting of the club at the high school gym, asserted that both the \$2,000 necessary minimum money and the necessary building materials needed to start the building project are now available.

Garrison said that "we hope to actually start construction by the first of next week. Every string will be pulled to have the stands ready by the first game, Sept. 9."

Another encouraging report to come out of the meeting was that work on increasing the lighting capacity on the football field will be started "right away." It was stated that with the aid of donated help and materials, the estimated cost of light improvements at the field has been cut from approximately \$3,000 to almost nothing.

It was also announced that preferential seating for the preference cards which have been selling well to be distributed to several business houses in town within the next few days. These season tickets will then be available to holders of Indian Club football preference cards.

All civic organizations have again been asked to contribute either money or labor towards speeding the conclusion of this community project.

NEW YORK—Al Kaline was only a youngster in grade school when Ted Williams won the American League's triple crown in 1947.

Today, the 26-year-old Detroit outfielder is in a good position to become the first major leaguer since then to finish top in batting, home runs and runs batted in during the same season.

Kaline heads the junior circuit in batting with a .365 average, in home runs with 22 and he's second to Boston's Jackie Jensen in runs batted in—75 to 76.

Teammate Harvey Kuenn moved into second place at .328, replacing Chicago's Nelson Fox, who slumped to fifth at .312. DID YOU KNOW that... Salamanders can regrow an amputated leg or lost tail.

Sea-going birds such as the slender-winged tern drink salt water and thrive on it. Matter of fact, many ocean birds cannot drink fresh water.

At high altitudes a cigarette will not burn.

An African egg-eating snake, no larger round than a man's middle finger, can swallow a goose egg thanks to special equipment and "know how." Instead of teeth, this snake—dasypletes by name—has a series of thick gum folds and its mouth lining is pleated like an accordion. Projections in its throat act as skids to carry the egg to the stomach where sharp spines cut the egg open and the throat muscles squeeze the egg's contents into the stomach. The egg shell is rolled into a compact bundle and ejected from the mouth. The snake gorges on eggs during the two bird-nesting seasons in Africa and lives on stored fat the rest of the year.

EVER NOTICED the foam on certain plants in summer? It's made by spittlebugs. They're expensive pests—cutting alfalfa and clover yields in some areas by as much as 40 per cent.

Horseshoe Pitcher Sets World Record

MURRAY, Utah—The sharp-shooting Ted Allen, Boulder, Colo., led the way into the finals of the world championship horseshoe tournament Tuesday night, setting a world's record along the way.

Allen won seven more matches for a perfect 35-0 record in the round-robin tournament. Also qualifying for the playoff Wednesday night were Don Titcomb, Sunnyvale, Calif., 31-4; Fernando Isais, Los Angeles, 30-5; and Tommy Brownell, Amsterdam, N.Y., 28-7.

The four will pitch in a round-robin for the championship, vacated by Guy Zimmerman, Danville, Calif. Zimmerman did not defend his title this year because of injuries received in a traffic accident.

Allen set the new world record by pitching 36 consecutive doubles—72 straight fingers—against Cletus Chapelle of Portland, Ore. He missed only three times in 92 pitches and compiled a ringer percentage of 96.5—a new high for the 1955 tourney.

The other scores included: 21-4—Ed Fishel, Neilton, Wash. 20-15—Cletus Chapelle.

Western Am Title Chase Is Wide Open

CHICAGO—Four Illinois contenders, headed by giant-killer Mrs. Dwight Anneaux, and three from the state of Washington dominated Wednesday's second round of the 55th women's Western Amateur golf tourney.

The title chase appeared wide open in this test of the nation's top feminine play-for-fun golfers after the only former champion and last year's runnerup were eliminated in Tuesday's first round at Olympia Fields Country Club.

It was Mrs. Anneaux, who knocked out the highly rated Beverly Gammon, St. Paul, Minn., school teacher, 1954 finalist, with a solid 5 and 4 drubbing.

The lone returning ex-champion, Marjorie Lindsay of Decatur, Ill., was bounced to the sidelines by Ruth Jensen, 18-year-old Kenmore, Wash., blonde, 2 up.

Miss Jensen, the lesser known of three sweet swingers who have survived from the state of Washington, took on Mrs. Scott Probasco, an experienced shooter from Chattanooga, Tenn., Wednesday.

This year's collegiate champion, Jackie Yates of Honolulu, was ousted Tuesday by Margie Burns, Greensboro, N. C. Miss Burns, 30, making her Western amateur debut, Wednesday encountered Seattle's talented Pat Lesser.

The third, and perhaps hottest Washington survivor is 17-year-old Anne Quast of Everett, whose second round rival was Eileen Stubb of Augusta, Ga. Miss Quast Tuesday won a 20-hole scrap, 1 up, over seasoned Mary Ann Downey of Baltimore.

Sacramento's Bud Daley almost became eligible for membership in the club, too. He allowed Seattle just one hit—an eighth inning single by Vern Stephens—as the Solons blanked the Rainiers, 8-0.

Van Cuyk's no-hitter came in the first game of a twin bill. Oakland also won the second game, 3-1.

In other games, Hollywood shaded San Francisco, 2-1, and Portland shut out San Diego, 2-0, in the opener of a doubleheader, then lost, 4-1.

The Portland Beavers scored both their runs in the first inning, in the 2-0 blanking of San Diego in the seven-inning opener. Royce Lint scattered seven hits, fanning four, for his 5th win against 8 losses.

Earl Rapp's three-run homer in the second inning of the nightcap gave the San Diego Padres the game. Portland batters not only one run in six hits off Cal McLish.

San Diego now trails pace-setting Seattle by 3 1/2 games.

Southpaw Roger Bowman bested southpaw Gene Bearden in the 2-1 Hollywood win over the Seals, a win that brought an official protest of the game by San Francisco manager Tommy Heath.
