Ontario Timber Fire Fighters Face Long Tilt

TORONTO (U) — Canadian officials said Tuesday 6,000 men battling more than 150 forest fires in the Ontario woods may be in the fire lines until September. "We are trying to do the impossible," a forest ranger said, "we're putting out 14 fires a day, but that's not fast enough because they are breaking out at the rate of 20 a day." The latest count was 153 fires with 33 burning unchecked in the timber-rich north country. More than 200,000 acres of prime timber have been burned. Firefighters were holding back one of the biggest blazes in the province, a 60,000-acre outbreak near Blind River.
