In The Library

New books are arriving at the Roseburg Public Library, and among them are some for every taste. Here are a few fiction titles, highly praised by the reviewers, though library staff has not yet had time to read them all: *Sholem Aleichem, The Great Fair*, biographical novel of the author's early years; Sherman Baker, *Hidden Fire*, story about marriage and a country club set in the Midwest; "well-mannered and well told," Donald Barton, *Once in Aleppo*, a romantic tale of a young American vice-consul in the Middle East; "intriguing and stimulating," Patricia Campbell, *Sun and Candlelight*, is set in Puget Sound area in the late 19th century, and is a vivid picture of the expansion of this last American frontier.

Eileen Chang's *Rice - Sprout Song*, a story of present day China, and the effect of the communist regime on a peasant family, is a fine novel about a little-known subject. Catherine Cookson's *A Grand Man* is described as "a grand book, a kindly comfortable tale, healthy and charming."

The *Flower Girls* by Clemence Dane is a long novel, in the tradition of Edith Wharton and J. B. Priestley's early ones. It is modern in time, and full of magic, with the fascination of the theater and present-day London. In Josephine Delves-Broughton's *Find A New Heaven*, the England of Victoria's day comes alive in this

story of a great lady who gives up wealth and position to return to her youthful love. Louis De Wohl's *The Spear* is an excellent novel of the life of Christ.

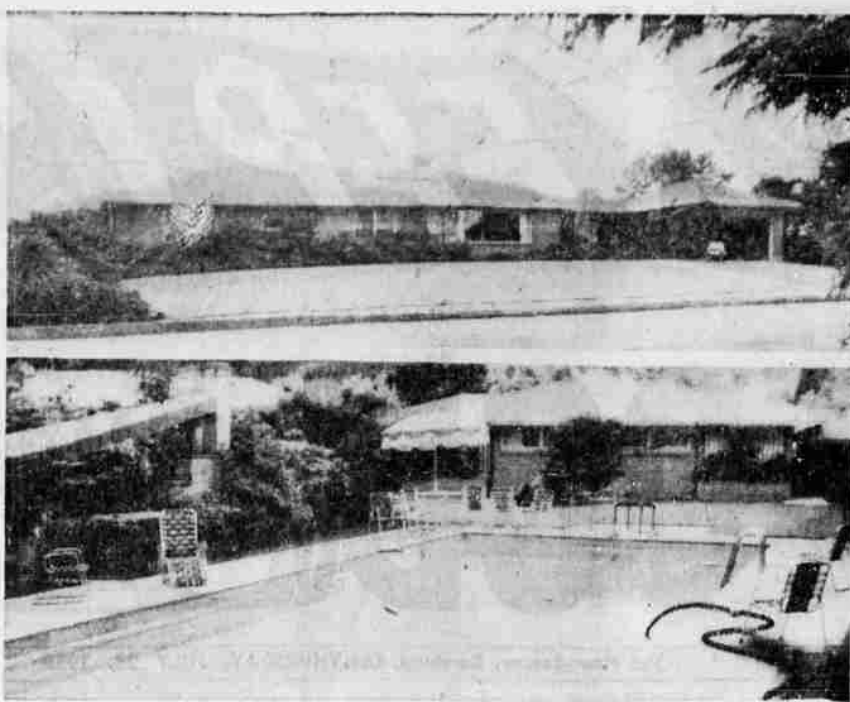
Jean Dutoit's *The Best Butter* is laid in France during the occupation, and is full of amusing scenes, vivid dialogue, savage irony.

I'm Owen Harrison Harding by James Ellison is a picture of adolescent growing pains and "a funny and poignant story." J. B. Priestley has some short stories, *Low Notes on a High Level*, written in his most engaging mood. Diana Raymond's *Small Rain* is the tale of a Swedish summer; Mary Roberts Rinehart's *The Best of Tish* will be welcomed back by the older generation, and for the young, a happy introduction to a hardy perennial: so funny!

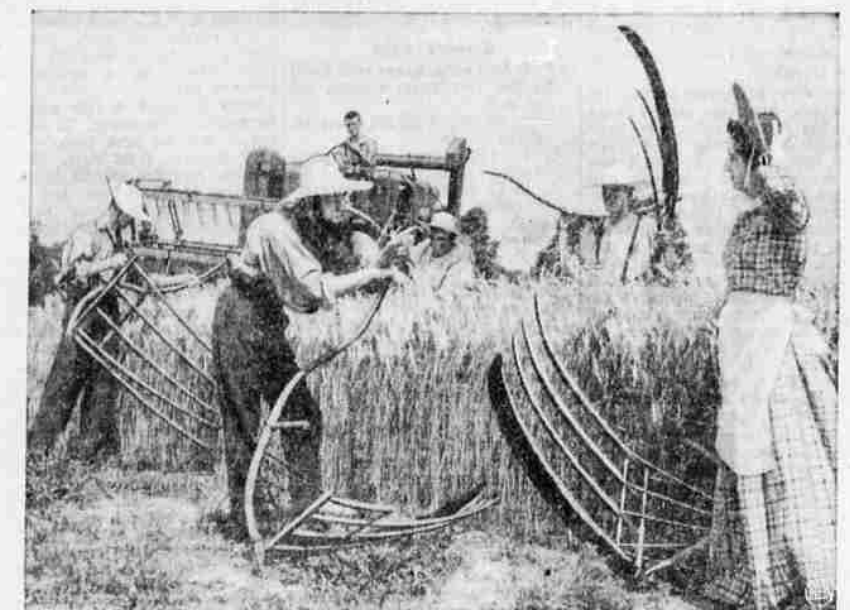

Eight Atomic Subs Navy's Plan, Sec. Thomas Says

GROTON, Conn. (AP) — Secretary Charles Thomas says the Navy, with eight atomic submarines already authorized, hopes to build many others "in rapid succession thereafter."

His remarks were prepared for launching ceremonies for the second nuclear-powered sub, the *Seawolf*. A short distance away, as if to emphasize the growing speed of the program, workmen prepared to lay the keel for a third during the day. The first was the *Nautilus*.

Thomas referred to congressional action this year in approving four additional atomic-driven submarines and added:

"This means that this fiscal year the Navy will have eight nuclear-powered submarines in being or under construction and, in rapid succession thereafter, many others."

"Of course, our future plans will include nuclear-powered vessels of other types."

He said he is insuring that "the earliest and maximum" attention be given to development of atomic power not only for surface ships but for naval aircraft. "Particular, careful attention is being given to nuclear powered seaplanes," he said.

Russia Lags, Belief

Indicating a belief that Russia so far has produced no nuclear submarine, Thomas told his audience that they were witnessing the launching of the second known nuclear propulsion submarine "in the entire world."

Thomas said the Navy has seven different nuclear reactor project studies under way. The different type reactors for the *Nautilus* and *Seawolf*, he said, "were purposely made competitive, partly to determine which is the better power plant and partly to exploit the rapidly advancing technology of nuclear propulsion."

The purpose of the seven projects, he added, is "to develop a family of reactors which will be applicable not only to submarines, but to surface ships."

"The *Seawolf* is symbolic of the accelerating importance of nuclear power in the American Navy," he said. "We have crossed the threshold of a period of change which promises to alter the face of the Navy even more than did the changes from sail to steam and of wood to steel, combined."

Students In Court

Invoke 5th Amendment

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Five Orlando high school students invoked the Fifth Amendment when questioned about membership in high school fraternities which are illegal in Florida.

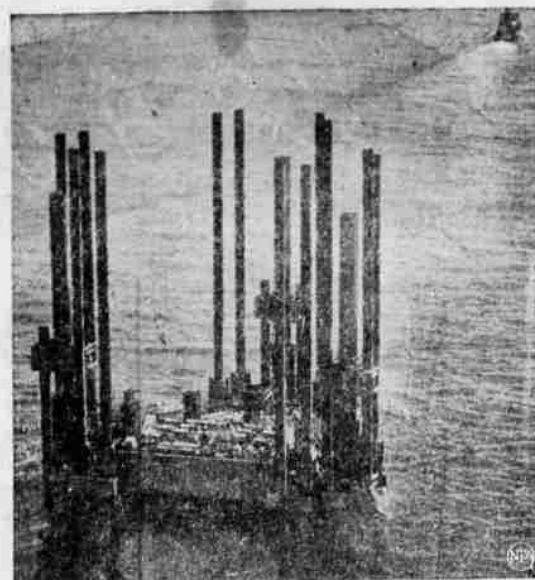
County Solicitor Richard H. Cooper said he subpoenaed the youths to testify on a possible connection between vandalism here and the fraternities, but each replied: "I refuse to testify on grounds it may tend to incriminate me."

Three other youths admitted fraternity membership at Boone and Edgewater high schools. Cooper said, however, they will not be prosecuted. "That's a problem for the School Board to handle," he said.

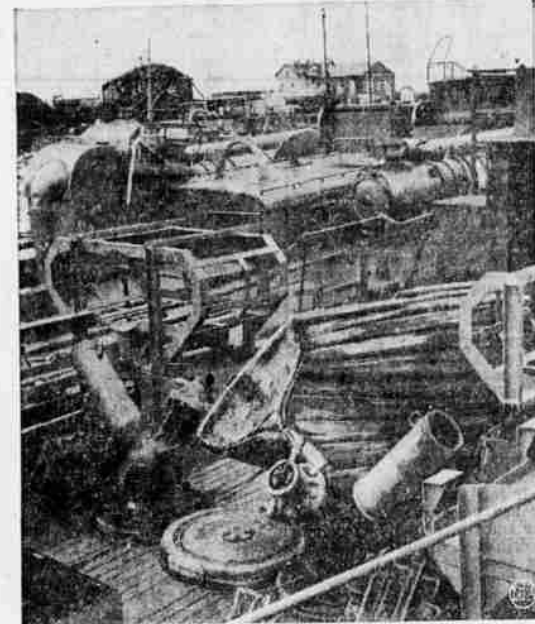
He added no information was uncovered linking the fraternities to recent vandalism that included \$2,000 worth of window smashing, gang fights and petty thefts.
