Ann Sheridan Gets Share Of Estate Of Steve Hanagan

NEW YORK — A tax appraisal shows that press agent Steve Hanagan left a gross estate of \$1,109,551, with \$218,399 going to movie actress Ann Sheridan, his friend for many years.

After taxes and other expenses, the net estate was valued at \$768,098 in a report filed in Surrogate's Court.

Hannagan died of a heart attack at the age of 53 while traveling in Africa in February 1953.

Miss Sheridan's share of the estate was in the form of insurance policies that named her as beneficiary. Hannagan, twice married and twice divorced, often escorted Miss Sheridan. They were frequently rumored to be about to marry.

The tax appraisal valued Hannagan's public relations business at \$407,056. Other assets included notes for \$40,000 signed by Miss Sheridan. She said Hannagan loaned her the money to buy two movie scripts. She eventually sold the debt with the estate for \$15,000.

Hannagan's will provides an annuity of \$1,500 for his sister-in-law Elizabeth Nichols, of Lafayette, Ind. There were a number of other bequests to former employees and friends. The remainder was left in trust for his brother Frank C. Hannagan, of Grand Rapids, Mich.
