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to rebroadcast the "ham" reports. He said it is the first time in this area that hams had an opportunity to work directly with a commercial station in presenting a public service broadcast.

Two mobile radio operators will make the broadcast possible, Baldwin pointed out. He will ride with Don Bell, Roseburg, operator of W7SHA. Bell and Baldwin will follow the racing ponies as they attempt to outrun the Southern Pacific train.

A second operator from Coos Bay will relay reports on the position of the train.

Ham Relays Essential

The assistance of the "ham" operators is a necessity, according to Baldwin, since mobile stations don't have the range for direct broadcasting en route. He said "ham" relay stations throughout the state will assist in sending information from the two mobile units to Al Spiker, who will be operating a base station in Roseburg.

Radio listeners will be able to hear Baldwin directly or through the relayed information. "If it weren't for the 'hams,' this would be nothing!" Baldwin emphasized.

He and Bell made a test run Tuesday evening from Cottage Grove. They were assisted on relays then by "hams" from Waldport, Eugene, Coos Bay, Coquille, Toketee Falls, Ashland, Portland and other Oregon cities plus a Sacramento, Calif., operator.

Station KINR will remain on the air until all the race and post-race activities are concluded. Baldwin said the race would be taped and sent to Hollywood for use on CBS "Sunday Desk." He said there was a possibility that other stations in western Oregon might follow the Roseburg station lead and broadcast the unusual event.

People at the celebration here will be kept posted on progress of the race.

The sergeant has been with the Strategic Air Command at Castle for 3 1/2 years. He entered the Air Force in September 1946 and served in Korea from August 1950 to December 1951.

Earlier, he served at SAC headquarters at Andrews Field, Md. (The headquarters were later moved to Omaha, Neb.) and at 15th Air Force headquarters, Colorado Springs, Colo. (now at March Field, Calif.).

He re-enlisted at Norton AFB, San Bernardino, Calif., prior to service in Korea. When his current enlistment ends, in 11 months, he plans to sign up again.

Bulgaria Admits Plane Destruction; All 58 Dead

LONDON — Communist Bulgaria admitted today that her anti-aircraft guns shot down an Israeli airliner near the Greek-Bulgarian border Wednesday, killing all 58 persons aboard.

It said the government felt "deep regret."

Breaking an official 24-hour silence, Sofia radio said the plane was off course.

The announcement said the Bulgarian government had appointed a commission of three Cabinet ministers and the public prosecutor "to inquire into the circumstances of the disaster."

Idleyld Park Logger Reported Badly Injured

Jim Marier, longtime resident of Idleyld Park, received serious injuries Tuesday morning while logging 17 miles north of Remote for the E. L. Paris Logging Co. of Roseburg, reports Mrs. Arthur Selby, Glide correspondent.

Mrs. Marier told Mrs. Selby the injured man is due to have X-rays after a few days in bed. He reportedly has a ruptured diaphragm.

It took two hours for fellow workers to take Marier on an improvised stretcher down the rugged mountainside to a Jeep, another hour to take him to the camp where he was transferred to a car, and another two hours for Mrs. Marier to drive him to Roseburg for medical attention.

The Mariers, with their two daughters, and Bud Watts and Wayne Helm went to the logging location only July 19. All are from Idleyld Park.

Defeat Of Highway Bills Disappointing To Ike

Congress would reconsider this entire matter before terminating this session."

Congress leaders are driving for adjournment as quickly as possible.

After Wednesday's votes, the consensus of House leaders appeared to be that highway legislation was dead for this year, and perhaps also for next year.

"The answer is, everybody wants a road bill and no one wants to pay for it," commented House Democratic Leader McCormack of Massachusetts.

Others said opposition came largely from truck owners who would have been hit heaviest by proposed tax increases in the Democratic measure.

Graveside funeral services will be held Monday, Aug. 1, at 1 p.m. in the Roseburg Veterans Cemetery. Chaplain Nathaniel C. Walpin will officiate. The Roseburg Funeral Home is in charge of the arrangements.

PPL Asks Permit For Power Dam In Washington

WASHINGTON — Pacific Power & Light Co. of Portland, Ore., asked the Federal Power Commission this week for a preliminary permit for a five-dam hydroelectric project in Southwestern Washington.

The application said the company proposes to build dams, several canals and two powerhouses on the Lewis River and four tributaries to increase its average annual output to 325 million kilowatt-hours.

The company said the project is needed to meet expected increases in demand. At the present time, it said, power is purchased from outside sources to supply customers in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming and is unable to guarantee a continued supply.

A preliminary permit, if issued, would give Pacific priority while making studies leading to an application for a license to undertake the project.

Insecticide In Mud Pies Blamed For Child's Death

LEBANON — Insecticide poison in mud pies Wednesday was blamed for the death of Ann Maria Scott, 3, in a hospital here Tuesday.

She and neighboring children found the poison, known as poxaphene, and mixed it in mud with oil, water and other substances. Ann became ill Monday, apparently after eating some of the preparation. The other children, who apparently did not taste any of it, were not stricken.

Two geese on the farm of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Scott of nearby Seio, died about the same time.
